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PASTOR PHIL'S MESSAGE

The below excerpt comes from some thoughts after reading a sermon from one of my hero's Charles Spurgeon. It still rings true this month. God is ready to help, strengthen, and provide for us by His mighty right hand. Let us live in dependence on His help for you.

"I am the very one who helps you, declares the Lord; your Redeemer is the Holy One of Israel." —Isaiah 41:14

This month of February let us hear the Lord Jesus speak to each one of us: "I will *help* you." "It is but a small thing for me, your God, to *help* you. Consider what I have done already. What! Not help you? Why, I bought you with my blood. What! Not help you? I have died for you; and if I have done the greater, will I not do the less? *Help* you! It is the least thing I will ever do for you; I *have* done more, and will do more. Before the world began I chose you (Eph. 1:4). I made the covenant for you. I laid aside my glory and became a man for you; I gave up my life for you; and if I did all this, I will surely help you now. In helping you, I am giving you what I have bought for you already. 

This person has everything all together, they are never tempted and always have their lives and household in order. However, that's not the case. So, when I say I don't want to be labeled a Christian by the worldly standards it's because I courageously will stand up and say I'm not perfect. I'm a redeemed forgiven sinner, by the precious mercy and grace of God, through the blood of Jesus Christ my Savior. And I'm still under constant construction. Does Being Fearful Mean You Are Not Walking In Faith?

We see in the gospels that every time someone had enough faith to come to Jesus, He responded to their need. We see Jesus talking seriously to people about their unbelief on occasion, but we don't see Him sending them away because of their doubt or unbelief. In cancer care ministry you are likely to encounter those who are concerned that their doubts are a barrier to their prayers. When an opportunity presents itself, you may want to open the Bible together and look at the incident in **Mark 9:14-27** where a father brings his child to Jesus and the disciples for healing. The key moment is verse 24: *"Immediately the boy's father exclaimed, 'I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!'"* God welcomes all of us, no matter where we are on the fear-faith continuum. He invites us to seek Him in prayer until His peace overcomes all our fears and anxieties. *"Come near to God and He will come near to you"* (James 4:8).

<u>Pray with Honesty:</u> We should remind cancer patients and their families to bring every concern they have to God in prayer. "*Cast all your anxiety on Him because He cares for you*" (1 Peter 5:7). Remind them it's safe to bring even the tough stuff—anger, desperation, doubt, hopelessness—God is big enough to handle it. We've already seen that it's okay with Jesus if we pray, "*I believe; help my unbelief.*"

<u>Pray with Confidence</u>: Cancer patients and their families often need to be reminded that God is good. He loves us. He doesn't punish people with life-threatening diseases or taking away a loved one. "*There is a thief,*" Jesus told us, "*who comes only to steal and kill and destroy. But I have come so that you may have life, and have it to the full*" (John 10:10). It is help-ful for all of us to read and reflect upon God's goodness in the scriptures. There may be no better place to begin than Psalm 23.

<u>Pray with Certainty:</u> When a cancer patient or family member is struggling with anxiety, they need to know that these anxious thoughts are not from God—"for God gave us a spirit not of fear but of power and love and a sound mind" (2 Timo-thy 1:7). We do not have to submit to a spirit of fear "because the [Spirit] who is in you is greater than the [spirit] who is in the world" (1 John 4:4).

<u>Pray with Simplicity:</u> Encourage patients with the reminder that It doesn't take long or sophisticated prayers to get a response from God. When Peter saw Jesus walking on the sea in the storm, he prayed twice. His first prayer expressed great faith—"Lord, if it's You," Peter replied, "tell me to come to You on the water" (Matthew 14:28). But then his second prayer, two verses later, was born of intense fear—"Lord, save me!" Jesus answered both of Peter's prayers. As Peter was sinking in the waves, he was very afraid—in that moment he thought he was perishing—but also had faith enough to call out to Jesus.

<u>Pray with Thankfulness</u>: For some cancer patients and their families, their fear can be overwhelming. But instead of surrendering to their anxious thoughts, they may find it helpful to use this scriptural "treatment" to fight fear directly: "*Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus*" (Philippians **4:6-7**). When they feel anxious, they can simply bring their requests to God with as much gratitude and thankfulness as they can muster—and then God will respond by giving the gift of His peace to protect their hearts from their anxious thoughts.

It is true that fear can involve doubt, and doubt is the opposite of faith; but let them know that their fear does not negate faith. Remind them that Peter expressed his faith in the Lord at the exact moment he was experiencing terrible fear. The opposite of fear is peace. When we are experiencing peace, we are not experiencing fear.

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In your ministry to cancer patients and their loved ones, you may wish to begin by sharing this passage from Philippians as they struggle with their fears—encouraging them to not be anxious, but to pray with thanksgiving, so that God will protect their hearts with His peace—and then you may wish to share the very next verse, **Philippians 4:8**—"*Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if any-thing is excellent or praiseworthy— think about such things.*"

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We need to keep in mind that there is a link between our prayers and our thoughts, an intersection where our fearfulness merges with our walk of faith. Whenever anyone — both those who minister and those who receive ministry — find ourselves anxious about anything, God invites us to pray with thanksgiving and He will give us His peace to protect our hearts. Then He urges us to protect the peace He puts in our hearts by keeping our thoughts positive and focusing on only excellent and praiseworthy things. It is in this place of peace we find freedom from our fear and anxiety.

A Brief Encounter with SCOTUS January 04, 2019

When the Supreme Court agreed to hear the case of a 93-year-old war memorial in Maryland, deep down everyone knew: this wasn't just about one cross. It could be about all of them.


That's what conservatives are hoping anyway, heading into one of the most important religious liberty cases in a generation. For years, men and women of faith have watched wave after wave of secularism try to wash away any mention of Christianity. They've gone after nativity scenes, national cemeteries, even Ten Commandments statues. Just last month, we watched humanists take on Christmas using the same faulty "separation of church and state" logic they're arguing with Bladensburg.

Based on a flawed understanding of the Establishment Clause, FRC's Alexandra McPhee points out in an <u>op-ed for USA Today</u>, "faint-hearted politicians or secular legal groups prevent the <u>three wise men</u>, <u>baby</u> <u>Jesus</u> in the manger, and the likes of '<u>Silent Night</u>' from ever making their way onto public property. A decision in favor of the Bladensburg Memorial could mean public officials would feel more empowered to recognize the reason for the season in the public square."

And the war on Christmas isn't the only thing at stake. As FRC's Vice President for Policy, Travis Weber, explains, "This is an incredible opportunity for the Supreme Court to not only rule for this cross -- but to clarify the tangled confusion of current Establishment Clause law, which is currently being used to remove religious messages, signs, and symbols from public squares around our country." That's a point FRC's legal team made in a new amicus brief just authored and submitted to SCOTUS by Travis and Alexandra. "As we make clear in our brief, religion has a natural, proper, and even essential role in our public life and the life of our military. The cross shape of this memorial is an eminently understandable public expression of faith by a community enduring loss."

Thanks to President Trump, Americans will have the benefit of two more strict constructionists hearing the Bladensburg case: Justices Neil Gorsuch and Brett Kavanaugh. Hopefully, they'll agree with us that finding the cross unconstitutional would mean "a total hollowing out of the right to religious expression in the public square. The cross sits at an intersection of National Defense Highway among many other monuments dedicated to our nation's military but is being targeted for its shape. The use of the cross is a poignant reminder of the sacrifice of service members for our country. The government and the public should be able to honor that memory, not erase it."

When God Weeps; Why Our Sufferings Matter to God - Joni Eareckson Tada, Steven Estes


Do you think that your problems and sufferings matter to God? Or do you just think He doesn't care?
