At least a day, or two, my friend Terry and I spend walking the mountains on a trail we have not previously explored. It is awe inspiring to see the mountains that God created and what they behold in the majesty of His creation. It has been so wonderful to watch the mountain goats skip along the sides of shear cliffs. Seeing the bighorn sheep lying in the green meadows along the still waters of a mountain lake brings Psalm 23 to mind. Standing near a waterfall that roars so loud that nothing else can be heard. Sometimes we think that all of God's beauty is somewhere else but where we live. We become so accustomed to our surroundings that we miss the beauty that is here too. All his life was in a desert. DJ and Kristen were married on Memorial Day weekend and DJ wanted Kako to be a groomsman. Kako was flying into Chicago to visit family and then driving here. DJ told him how to get here (this was before direction finders) and stated the scenery from Chicago to the rehearsal in Clinton was as boring as it could get. I will never forget what happened when Kako arrived. He came busting in the door, grinning from ear to ear, jumping up and down, exclaiming "This is so beautiful" over and over. We thought he was talking about the wedding. No, he told us, he said, "This was the most beautiful place I have ever been, green, green, green, everywhere you look it is green! The grass is green. The trees are green. The fields are green. Everywhere you look it is green! I've never seen anything this beautiful!" That gave us a new appreciation for the part of creation that we inhabit.

I think that is the way it is with a lot of things. We see what God is doing in other places or with other people and we think about how great it is in those places. We become so accustomed to the beauty that God places around us that we no longer appreciate or even notice that beauty. God graces us where we live. He blesses us here. We don't have to go other places to see God's beauty. We just have to look around and realize the beauty of His creation, the blessings of His grace, and the glory of His presence are around us no matter where we may be. 



Dine with a Doc $\ensuremath{\mathbb{R}}$ is a FREE educational program that welcomes senior citizens to get to know the



April Administrative Council Meeting notes:

Parsonage—The water damage to the parsonage has all been repaired. We have settled with the insurance company and the claim is closed. A rental agreement has been written, reviewed and approved. The parsonage is almost ready to be rented. Talks with a rental agent have been reviewed. There is some cleanup work inside and out that needs to be completed.

Buildings and grounds—Quotes were reviewed for the replacement of the two west windows in the Chapel. A vendor was selected and the windows will be replaced late in May. Along with that work, the louvers for the old heating and a/c system will be removed and replaced with white maintenance free materials. We will have the big window at the top of the stairs between the old and new buildings reframed to stop water infiltration.

The stained-glass windows have been inspected by a stained-glass company and are in good shape. The outer protective plexiglass need replaced in the next couple of years. Quotes will be coming in for that work.

The south Sanctuary doors will not open and the stone framing is broken. There is a concern about the integrity of the towers and the brick work.

The Pastor met with architects in Indianapolis on Monday April 29. On May 10 the architects will be at the church to give a free quick look at the church and an idea of a scope and seriousness of the work.

A tuck point company has inspected the bricks. They are preparing recommendations and costs analysis for the Council.

(See Special Meeting notes below about grants and funding)

The Sanctuary roof lost over 100 shingles in the last windstorm. We have started a claim. An inspection and quote was received from Pell's roofing which was submitted to the insurance company along with pictures. We are waiting on the adjuster.

Solar, motion detection LED lights have been installed for the sidewalk and handicap sidewalk and ramp.

The church has been re-keyed. If you have an old key it will no longer work. Check with Aaron or the office to get a new key.

The roof drains for the fellowship hall have been cleaned and the north gutter has been replaced.

Budget—The budget is completed. A copy is in this newsletter and additional copies are on the bulletin table in the hall outside the Chapel.

Special meeting—A meeting was held with a representative from the Historic Landmarks Grant program. He gave the Council guidance for grants available and application for those grants. The largest is a matching grant and could cover about ½ of the funds needed for the restoration of the bricks, the towers, and the Sanctuary. There is also a grant that may cover architectural costs. There is no guarantee that we will be awarded any of the grants, but we intend to apply for whatever is available.


