# **WORSHIP COMMITTEE MEETING**

The Committee voted to ask the Session to combine the first and second services into one worship service for the following Sundays: July 7, 14, 21 and 28, at a time and place to be determined.

This was proposed as an experiment to see what the reaction is afterwards. The thinking is that some combined services may help to build relationships between the 9:00 a.m. and 10:30 am congregations and reduce the workloads of church staff.

The Committee noted that Page Hall would be better for contemporary music. Utility savings are not a significant reason for one service, but, even if they were, the African service would still be using Page Hall anyway. The temperature will be maintained, as needed, in the Sanctuary for the organ.

The Committee voted to set a \$100 music consultation fee for the OPC Organist and Choir Director when outside groups are included in OPC weddings and funerals.



A gift to the Pentecost Offering helps the church encourage, develop, and support its young people, and also address the needs of at-risk children. 40% of the Pentecost offering can be retained by individual congregations wanting to make an impact in the lives of young people within their own community. The remaining 60% is used to support ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency:

- Young Adult Volunteers
- Ministries for Youth
- Children-at-Risk

Pentecost Offering Financials

This year's locally retained portion of the Pentecost Offering will go to the Angel Tree 180 Camp for children of persons who are incarcerated. This program is an extension of the Christmas Angel Tree program of Prison Ministries.

# FINANCE/STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

The committee is happy to report that financially, Orangewood is on plan through April.

The Finance/Stewardship Committee is working with other OPC committees to identify needs and opportunities. The team is investigating additional opportunities to share our facility space with organizations needing a place to meet. Other things are being considered to support the best use of our resources including use of volunteer help rather than paying outside contractors.

Preliminary work on the 2020 budget is starting with the Stewardship campaign to take place in the fall. We are truly fortunate that the gifts OPC has (both financial and talent) allow us to be a blessing to our community and members!

# **HUMANITARIAN RELIEF**

OPC is a collection station for humanitarian relief efforts at the Douglas/Agua Prieta border. Churches there are overwhelmed and welcome any help. We will have a collection box on the patio on Sundays. A list of needs includes diapers, hygiene products, clothing and more. Presbyterian churches in the Central Phoenix area will be bringing collections here. A Presbytery volunteer will transport all collections.

# **FACILITIES UPDATE**

We completed 16 projects this year, there are 12 in progress/planning, and we have another 14 new requests this month.

#### **New way to give to Orangewood:**

Vendors tithing your business with them to help pay our OPC bills! When you call our list of vendors to do work at your home or business, they will give OPC a 10% credit for work performed at our facility.

How it works: You call a vendor from our list of "tithing" vendors to perform work for your home or business, and you turn in a copy of your paid invoice to the church office/ facilities mailbox, When the church needs work done, we receive 10% of all the money you spent as a credit for work we contract with that vendor.

#### **CHRISTIAN FAMILY CARE**

The Christian Family Care ministry provides adoption, foster care, and support Family Care programs. To give a little background on foster care, CFC advises we should be aware that the services provided by the state of Arizona for these children are woefully inadequate. Children are placed in foster care because their home is unsafe for them—and right now, there are nearly 16,000 of these boys and girls in Arizona. With numbers so large, it's easy to forget that each one of them is uniquely made in God's image, with their own dreams. Tragically, many will never achieve their best hopes. In fact, a full 20% will be homeless when they age out of foster care at 18. Even more will experience PTSD from the sheer trauma of their childhoods. As we celebrate the season of Pentecost and think about children at risk, a new opportunity has presented itself. Christian Family Care offers a large variety of volunteer opportunities, such as being a mentor to a child, working in one of the thrift stores, office and administration, and handyman services. We worked with them several years as they built houses, added doors and windows, and built a school and a water filtration facility (named for Bernale Wright!). The children in Cerro Azul have received scholarship funds. When we were there, they told us that they plan to celebrate "Presbyterian Day" on July 17 not because they are Presbyterians, but because of all the Presbyterians they have worked with through the years.
