Wow, October is upon us already! That means the Festival is about to erupt upon the town again. I don't know whether looking forward to seeing the church's

First of all, in this note, I want to thank everyone for what you all did for Brenda. Those of you that hauled her around, the ones who visited her in the hospital and the nursing home, the ones who took her daughter to see Brenda, those of you who baked her cakes, and all of you who brought food for the funeral and attended the service. Brenda didn't have much. To many, her daughter seemed to be the only family around. What they didn't know was that Brenda had a big family, her brothers and sisters in this church. I don't know how many times I heard Brenda tell someone how much she loved everyone in this church. You all demonstrated to the nursing home, the community and to her family that she was loved by us as well. Caroline's aunt from Chicago had told Caroline to not plan on a memorial service because the funeral homes were way too expensive and that the church would be a charge of \$200 or \$300. They were taken back to find out there was no charge to use the church and that a meal would be provided. They asked why we would do that and were told because Brenda is a part of our family. I am honored and pleased to be a part of a church that shows love for one another. Many churches talk about it, but you all demonstrated it. Not just with Brenda, you have shown it with Connie, Phyllis, Dave, Jim, Wanda.

Secondly, you have shown a love for others outside the church. My office is full of items for the two hygiene closets being set up in the schools. The love is demonstrated by the Angel Tree and other giving. The quickness and willingness to diligently pray for others when the call goes out is a sign of people that care. We have a clothes closet being set up for people in need to share Christ's love for them. The Fellowship Diner tells people that we care for them. All of these things are done for people who can give back nothing in return. Jesus said when you do something for those who can return the favor you are no better than the ungodly. When we reach out in love and service to those who cannot return it, we have done it for Jesus Himself and build up rewards in heaven.

I want to remind those who were at church earlier in September, and let those know who were not able to be there, that we are entering a huge capital campaign for the structure of the church. We have brick problems on the towers that are allowing water to come in the church and starting to affect the strength of the towers. The walls on each side of the front stairs are leaning over and one has holes in it. The roof over the Sanctuary is missing over 100 shingles. The frames on the stained-glass windows is in need of attention.

Every carpet we have is in bad shape and becoming fall hazards. Some plaster in the church is needing repaired in due to the brick problems. Our sound system needs attention. The projector is failing. This is only a part of the problems. We have a group that is examining every aspect of the buildings. They have been tasked with identifying everything that needs done. Then they will prioritize all work. That will be followed with construction estimates for budgeting purposes. Then presenting the plan to the Ad Council. That group is Marty Evens, Richard Keller, Bob Pound, Doug Dixon, Bill Russell, Aaron Mathis, and Carol Milligan. They will also put together a task and chore list of things we can make available for volunteers to do. We are also having a historical architect examine the structure and make recommendations for repairs.

I will always be straight with you all and the straight truth is this going to be expensive and not quickly accomplished. Just in the roof, bricks and windows the estimate is about \$160,000. The total will be at least \$200,000 and chances are it could be significantly higher. We are applying for grants. One will pay for about ½ of the architect bill. One is from the UMC Foundation for the audio/visual system assistance. Another is from the Historical Landmarks, but any money we may receive from them has to be matched dollar for dollar (up to \$50,000) before we can get it. The other thing to know is that most of these things cannot wait years to accomplish. They are structure and safety issues. We need to stay vigilant, dedicated, and purposeful in the repair of our church. We are doing all we can to find available money from other sources. If you know of resources and grants available, please let me or Rob know. Still, other sources won't cover all we need. That means we may have to dig deep into our resources. I am committed to contributing toward this cause. I hope you are too.

We have one of the most beautiful and historical buildings in the county. It is also a witness of what we think about the God we serve. Let's honor God and the building by returning it to its intended splendor.




