I've just started on my Christmas projects, so I've got a lot to do. My biggest project is shopping for Gale, which would be easier if I had any idea where to go or what to buy. For our family Christmas is a very special time. It starts with all of our kids and grandchildren coming over go pick out and cut down a live tree. If someone comes in and looks at our tree they may think it is the ugliest, most lopsided tree in the county, but it is the most beautiful tree in the world to us.

The next on the list are the grandkid's school and church programs. Drive 2 hours over and 2 hours back, then set for an hour (you've got to get there early to get a good seat), and then watch every other group of kids sing. All that for a 10-minute program because a smiling little one said to us, "Will you come and watch me?" Wouldn't have it any other way.

About a week before the big day, the boys and I meet in Avon for a night of shopping for our wives. Not a one of us has any clue about what we are doing. It is a prime example of the blind leading the blind! We just hope that at least one of the three of us is successful.

We always pick a night and following day that we can all gather for our family Christmas. Everyone comes to the house and the grandkids all sleep in our bedroom. They get up the next day, and thanks to grandma, Santa has made another delivery. After Grandpa's pancakes we spend all day opening gifts and playing with the new toys.

However, the highlight is actually the night before. Just before we all go to bed to wait on reindeer, we gather at the kitchen table with our Bibles, a candle lighter, 4 Advent candles and the one white Christ candle in a table centerpiece. We take turns reading passages from the Christmas story in Matthew and Luke. As we read we stop to talk about Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace and one of the children lights the candle that matches. Finally, we light the Christ candle and have a quick prayer before the younger one's head upstairs. By the way, that is everyone but Gale and me. Then Mrs. Santa tells her helper where to put the overstuffed stockings, the presents, and anything else she thinks needs to out for the kids. I finally get to bed only to hear 4 kids rustling around until they think its time to go down and see what is awaiting them. Seems like a lot, but we wouldn't trade it for anything.

You wonder sometimes if the traditions of the family matter and are they sinking in? Just before Thanksgiving, DJ and Kristen were wondering what to get their kids. He asked Norah what she was looking forward to about Christmas hoping to get gift ideas. She said doing the tree, the candles, and Christmas at Grandpa and Grandma's. She gave me my biggest Christmas blessing for this year! The rest is just icing on the cake.




