**A Note from the Pastor
February 2020**

On February 14, around the year 270A.D., Valentine, a holy priest in Rome in the days of Emperor Claudius II, was executed. Under the rule of Emperor Claudius the Cruel, Rome was involved in many unpopular and bloody campaigns. The emperor had to maintain a strong army, but was having a difficult time getting soldiers to join his military leagues. Claudius believed that Roman men were unwilling to join the army because of their strong attachment to their wives and families. To get rid of the problem, Claudius banned all marriages and engagements in Rome. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Valentine was arrested and dragged before the Governor of Rome, who condemned him to be beaten to death with clubs and to have his head cut off. The sentence was carried out on February 14, on or about the year 270. Legend also has it that while in jail, St. Valentine became friends with the jailer's daughter whom he healed from blindness. It is said he left a farewell note for the jailer's daughter, who had become so dear to him, and signed it "From Your Valentine." A Pope in the 400's declared Valentine a Saint. Because of his support of marriage, he was made the Patron Saint of lovers. (He was also the Patron Saint of epileptics and beekeepers.)

Because of Valentine, February is often called the month of love. Many proposals are made on Valentine's Day as men publicly declare their love with a ring and women publicly declare their love by wearing it. Fortunately, we don't have to hide our weddings. We gather for the celebration of marriage with joy and happiness. However, after the wedding it takes effort to continue in the relationship declared at the engagement and consecrated at the marriage. Many of you are, or have been before losing your spouse, married many years. It was not always easy, but you knew the love you declared, and the relationship based on that love was worth the effort. The relationship grew. Not because everything was easy, but because you stuck together when things weren't easy. As you went through the years every month became the month of love.

Such it is with our relationship with God. In the Bible God many times refers to Himself as the husband with individuals, the people of faith, or the nation referred to as the bride. That is not by accident. God declares His love for us and draws us to Him. John Wesley referred to it as, "God wooing us to himself" in the same way a suiter woos a person into a mutual relationship. We declare our intent to enter into that relationship when we accept Christ into our life. Then, as in a wedding, we declare that commitment to the lifelong relationship in church at baptism, confirmation, or declaration of faith. Just as in a marriage, it won't always be easy. Wesley also stated the 3rd of his three principles for Christian living in, "Stay in love with God." The way to get through the hard times is the same in marriage and with God, STAY IN LOVE. We can't do anything to drive God away. We can disappoint Him, hurt Him, and at times even anger Him, but He will never stop loving us. He celebrates with us, cries with us, carries us when we can't go on, understands us, and wraps His arms around us. So, if you hear someone say February is the month of love, correct them and tell them every month is the month of love when you have a relationship of love with God.

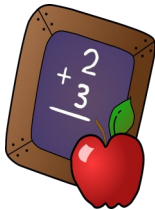

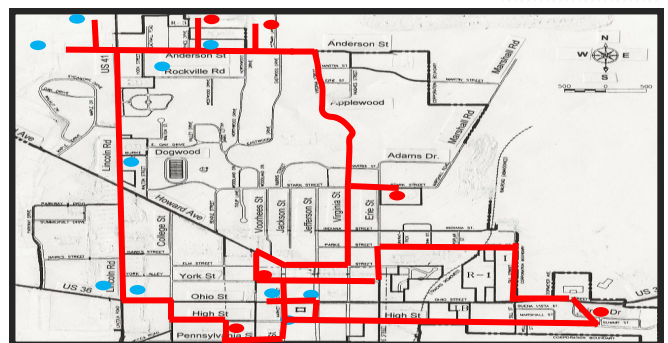

Ministries of the Rockville First United Methodist Church

Sustaining ministries;

Buddy Bags: In cooperation with people from 2 other churches we gather on Thursday evenings to pack bags with food for Children. These bags are placed in the backpacks of children in our local elementary school who would not have food to eat until Monday. The group applies for, and has received, grants that help to pay for the cost of the food. Members go to Terre Haute weekly to buy the food. We feed about 85 children each week.

Fellowship Diner: 11 times a year (November and December are combined) folks in the church buy food and prepare a full course meal, at no cost, for folks in the community. It is generally held on the last Friday of the month when food assistance has typically run out and people are in need of a substantial meal. Members and friends of the church gather early to prepare the food, then serve to whoever comes in the door. We also provide take-out to those who may not be able to come to the church, or who may be in need of more food. We fellowship with the folks who come in order to let them know they matter to us and to see if there are any other pressing needs.

Angel Tree: We partner with the Angel Tree organization to provide Christmas gifts to the children of women who are incarcerated at the local state prison. These gifts are often the only one these children may get on Christmas. The women get to include a note to their child with the gift. We are also able to assist with providing Bibles to the women.

Clothes Pantry (New)—In 2019 we started a clothes pantry in the lower level of the Fellowship building. Every Thursday from 1:00 to 5:00 anyone is welcome to come and get free clothes. We average about 10 people coming to the pantry each week to get clothes, shoes, coats, gloves, hats and other items for themselves and their families. We were also able to immediately aid a family of 8 whose house burned down on a Saturday night. By Sunday noon they were outfitted with almost all the clothes, coats, and shoes they needed. We also assist the pregnancy center and other ministries with clothing items.

Hygiene Closet (New)—This year we also started a hygiene closet in the middle school and the high school. The hygiene closet supplies item for the students who are not able to get them at home. We stock the shelves with items such as deodorant, soap, shampoo, washcloths and towels, dental items, undergarments, women's feminine products, laundry detergent and others.

Bus Ministry (New)—Some of the men in the church began a bus ministry. The bus runs on Wednesday afternoons and makes a 1 hour repeating route four times. It stops by all low-income housing locations, certain intersections in town, and provides transportation to grocery and drug stores, medical clinic, Dollar General and Family Dollar, and other necessary location for anyone who needs a ride.

Ministries cont'd

Food Pantry—During office hours needy families can stop by to get food from our small food pantry. We try to provide enough food to supply a family of four until the larger food pantries are open.

Celebrate Recovery—This ministry assists people who suffer from all kinds of hurts, habits, and hang ups. It goes way beyond drug or alcohol addiction. This group meets on Thursday evenings and provides Christ centered support, lessons, and fellowship to all who attend. We have seen people change their lives, families reunited, children back with their parents, and many other God provided actions in these folks.

Bible Study—In the spring of 2019 we started a multi-generational Bible Study. It meets weekly on Sunday evenings. We have participants from our church as well as 2 other churches who attend.

Cooperative Ministries

These are events or ministries that we share with other churches or organizations.

Illini 4000—This is a group of University of Illinois students. After training all of the school year they ride the 4000 miles from the Atlantic Ocean to the Pacific Ocean to raise money for cancer research, support of families with someone battling cancer, and youth camps for children with cancer. They come to the church for one night as they pass through Rockville on their way west. We feed them a hearty meal, transport them to shower facilities, set up swim time a local homeowner's house, feed them breakfast and send snacks with them. They spend the night in the church before starting out again on their long journey.

Kairos—A Biblical term that means "in God's Time". Kairos is a prison ministry that twice annually conducts a "Walk to Emmaus" event within the walls of prisons. We host the Kairos group that serves the local women's prison. They use our fellowship hall to store products and to meet. The kitchen is used to prepare food for the event. Many hearts and lives of women prisoners are changed or enhanced by the work of this ministry.

Community Hand Bells Choir—Women from several churches gather at the church to practice hand bells. We store the bells and associated equipment and provide the facility for their practice. The group goes to churches and other location to share their gifts with others. They performed at our church a couple of times and inspired the children of our congregation to start their own bell choir.

Kentucky Mountain Mission—Each spring we collect clothes, nick-knacks, small appliances, housewares and such. The Kentucky Mountain Mission comes around and picks them up. Appalachia Kentucky is one of the most impoverished areas in our country. The Mission sells the items for nickels, dimes, and quarters. This allows the people to retain their personal dignity by buying what they need instead of taking handouts.

Ministries cont'd

Children

In 2019 we renewed our focus on the children (future) of the church. We added some programs and celebrated those already up and running. We have 7 very active elementary children and sometimes we have as many as 12 come to the church.

Children's Sunday School (New)—A few months back we started a Sunday School class for the grade school children. We are averaging about 7 per week. It meets at 9:00 and runs until just before the Worship service.

Children's Church—We continue to have our Children's Church also. After the opening music, the Call to Worship, and the opening prayer, the children come forward for a few minutes with the Pastor. Following a prayer, they go to the lower level for age centered instruction. This has been going on for several years and we are delighted to continue this focus on the children.

Vacation Bible School (New)—For the first time in many years we presented a Vacation Bible School. It was complete with a market, a time with the Apostle Paul, games in the arena, and crafts in the artist's center. It was a wonderful success due to the many adult volunteers. We hoped for 10 children and that was exceeded several times over. Our children are already asking about the 2020 VBS.

Youth events (New)—We began to plan youth events. The first of those was to go caroling at the homes of our shut-ins and senior members of the church. Several children, and a few adults piled into the bus. We got about ½ way through our schedule when we had to stop due to the heavy snow that was falling. We took a bus trip to the Indianapolis Zoo to see the Christmas lights and, on the way home, ventured through the Winter Wonderland at Danville, In. We plan to schedule several events through 2020.

Children's Bell Choir (New)—In 2019 the children expressed an interest in the bells played by the Community Bell Choir. The church purchased children's bells for the group. They made their debut at our Christmas dinner. It was a great enjoyment and blessing to see them playing.

Girl Scouts (New)—We now have a Girl Scout Troop meeting weekly at the church again. It is small, but it is here.

Cub Scouts—Cub Scouts continue to meet monthly in the church during the school year. They filled the fellowship hall for the pinewood derby and their awards night.

Ministries cont'd

Other things we do

Rotary Youth in Government Day—The church is proud to host this event of the Rotary Club. Senior students from our county high schools spend the morning partnered with Parke County Officials. The students and their partner gather in the fellowship hall for lunch with the Rotary Club. After a short meeting the youth are split into groups for roundtable situations to consider. The students present their findings to a panel of elected officials from state, county, and local leaders.

Hospitality House—During the Covered Bridge Festival the church is a Hospitality House for festival visitors. They have refreshments, water, and a place to rest provided to them at no cost.

Halloween on the Square (New)—The church has joined Mainstreet Rockville. We had a booth at the “Halloween on the Square” evening. We gave out church information and a lot of candy to over 500 children. We had 5 members manning the booth who came in costume.

Parke County Fair—The church set up a booth at the fair this year. Volunteers manned the booth for 4 evenings handing out information and answering questions about the church and congregation. The Pastor was a part of the minister’s float in the parade.

Special Services

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday—The church hosted both an Ash Wednesday and Good Friday Service in 2019. They were advertised and we had participants from several churches that worshiped with us in those services.

Christmas Eve—We held a candlelight service for this wonderful occasion. We invited families from the church and around town to bring their children in pajamas and had a few that did just that. It was a Service of Scriptures and Carols with songs intermixed with Scripture readings. We had 85 in attendance that evening.

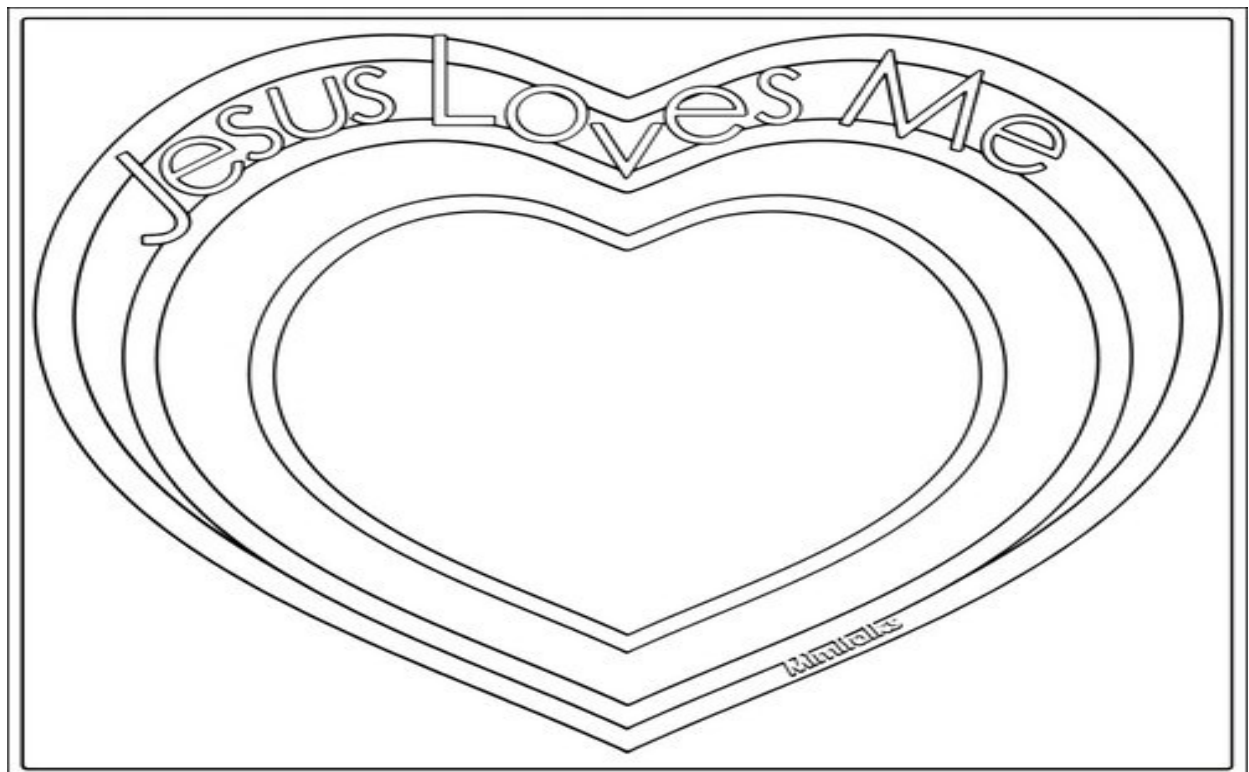
