About 30 years ago, there was a minor worship reformation in the Presbyterian Church. The rubric of this reformation was to get back to the practices of the Early Church. The assumption was that the closer we got to Jesus' time, the closer we got to Jesus' practices. It was during this reformation that we got our Book of Common Worship.


People have commented to me that my communion prayers sound "awfully Catholic." They are correct, but not because I am copying the Roman Catholics, but because we are both copying the practice of the Early Church. I consider it a benefit that this draws Presbyterians and Catholics closer together.

One of the additions to Presbyterianism from this mini-reformation is the office of Daily Prayer. There is a section of our Book of Common Worship entitled "Daily Prayer." You can also buy just that section in the *Book of Common Worship: Daily Prayer* (Westminster John Knox Press). My favorite is that there is now an app for that. Go to your app store and search for *Daily Prayer PC (USA)*. Any of these resources will give you the prayers for different hours of the day as well as morning and evening scripture readings, to assist you in daily prayer.

In Lent, we will be praying together, the service of Evening Prayer on Wednesday evenings. You will find this service to be simple, yet profound, with lots of time for silence and a strong use of the imagery of light and darkness. It harkens back to a time when survival through the night was much less assured than today. People prayed before bed in the knowledge that it might be the last thing that they did, and to remind them of their hope of heaven. I suspect that this is something all of us could use!

Your Mission \$ to Presbytery at Work

Perhaps you have wondered why a portion of the Mission budget goes to support our Presbytery. What does it actually do? Well here it is:

Last year our funds supported four leadership training workshops, two for Grant Writing and one each for Officer Training and Conflict Management. The Congregational Resourcing team was able to allocate funds for 15 grants totaling \$76,740. These funds primarily go to special projects in small churches with fewer assets and to supplement salaries of pastors serving such churches. Your money also goes to support First Light Fellowship, a new worshipping community in Anthem, led by Revs. Kristin and Brandon Willett, and the Evangelical Arabic Church led by Rev. Estawri Khjeek, which is a growing presence in the Middle Eastern refugee community. Our Presbytery mission dollars work hard to ensure that our brothers and sisters in Christ continue to worship and serve in their communities.

The Peace and Justice Network of the Presbytery is looking for Bibles in different languages for the detainees in Eloy. Selena Keesecker brought to our attention the need for these Bibles and said the most needed are African languages and Spanish. Bilingual NIV and Good News New Testament Bibles are fine. If you are out browsing in used book stores and come across any non-English Bibles, the Network will reimburse you for the cost of purchase. Let's get out and hunt!

Honduras 2020

Our trip to Honduras this year was filled with many great experiences. We will be doing Minutes for Mission over the next couple of months to share details from team members, but here is an overview:

- We assisted the people in Estanzuela (also now known as Estanzola) in getting six houses ready for roofing. We were able to purchase the materials for all six tin roofs. We also donated funds to a family with special circumstances who are building a house on their own. This photo shows women carrying roofing up a hill to that location.
- We saw more than 335 patients in six clinics held throughout the week in five different communities. We have worked in all of these communities before, so it is like returning to visit people we know. Very special.
- We gave funding to support 6 students in Trinidad and 24 students in the Copan area for school this coming year. Last year we met Kenia and Luis Ramirez and their mother, Hilda, who told us about riding three hours standing up in the back of a truck to go pick coffee so that Luis could go to school. This past year we gave scholarships to both Luis and Kenia and they achieved the top grades of all the students. This coming year we will support them again, along with their younger sister.



- We took three prayer shawls with us. One went to Angelina, the community leader from Copantle where we worked in 2009 -2011. One went to Dona Irma, whose house we stayed in several years in Trinidad. The third went to Luisa, who prepared delicious hot lunches for us each day out in Estanzuela, using a propane stove that she carried up the hill to the community!
- We took Sunday off from our labors and went by bus to Trinidad, where we visited with the mayor's assistant and attended a celebration in Cerro Azul. It is always a treat to sit beneath that fig tree in Cerro Azul, their symbol of community. This day it was dripping with rain but still a wonderful place to be. The community is thriving.

We give heartfelt thanks to everyone in the congregation who supports the work in Honduras in so many ways.

Habitat For Humanity

OPC will be working on a Habitat home in downtown Phoenix. The work dates are March 21, April 18, May 16 and June 6. No experience is needed to help with the house. There are Team Leaders, like Dirk Oosterwyk and Spencer Case from OPC, who will be able to find a project for you to learn and work on. If you haven't filed your 2019 tax return yet, you might be able to help fund this house by allocating part of your state income tax payment to Habitat for Humanity Central Arizona, with a memo line of Orangewood Presbyterian. There is no additional cost to you for this allocation. The designation just needs to be done with your tax return to be filed before April 15, 2020. There is a pamphlet available at the Mission table with more information.

Lisa and Glenn Campbell have volunteered to lead both the Angel Tree and the Beans & Rice campaigns for 2020. We are in the process of establishing an "Opportunity to Serve" board on the patio which will have listings of small, medium and large opportunities.
