Use medicine; take potions which can help you; fumigate house, yard, and street; shun persons and places wherever your neighbor does not need your presence or has recovered, and act like a man who wants to help put out the burning city. What else is the epidemic but a fire which instead of consuming wood and straw devours life and body? You ought to think this way: "Very well, by God's decree the enemy has sent us poison and deadly offal. Therefore, I shall ask God mercifully to protect us. Then I shall fumigate, help purify the air, administer medicine, and take it. I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order not to become contaminated and thus perchance infect and pollute others, and so cause their death as a result of my negligence. If God should wish to take me, he will surely find me and I have done what he has expected of me and so I am not responsible for either my own death or the death of others. If my neighbor needs me, however, I shall not avoid place or person but will go freely. ...See, this is such a God-fearing faith because it is neither brash nor foolhardy and does not tempt God.

Coping In the Midst of Social Distancing Plans

It is very likely that the requirement for groups of no more that 10 in gatherings will continue throughout April, so we as you look at the church calendar, you'll note that we are planning accordingly. Should this restriction be lifted we will continue to communicate any changes and seek to get back to a new normal at that time. For now, here are some plans...

We will celebrate the events of Holy Week with online services. Note the ways we will try to make this special...

Palm Sunday April 5th- After the 10:00 am service, we are inviting you to join in a Palm Sunday Parade. At approximately 11::00 am we will begin handing out Palm Branches (yes we will use gloves) in front of the church as you drive by in your car. Please park in the church parking lot or the courthouse area. At approximately 11:40-11:45 am, to allow for people to arrive from out of town, we will be led by Pastor Rob and his family in the church car as we drive around Lexington with our windows down, waving our Palm Branches and proclaiming, "Hosana to the Son of David!" "Jesus is King!" and other appropriate things. Yes, you can honk your horn too. Please be safe and respectful as we do this. If we are asked to stop by a police officer we will follow their instructions, but let's make this Palm Sunday Parade a memorable one!

Maundy Thursday will be a replay of a past Last Supper Drama at 7:00 pm April 9th.

Good Friday will be the traditional Tenebrae Service. As you follow along with the service at home, you may choose to have 7 candles lit, 6 that will be extinguished and 1 that serves as the Christ Candle which remains lit. Families may take turns putting out candles when the time comes in the service. During the time of the loud noise, someone can slam a book or ring a bell to mark that time.

Between Good Friday and Easter Sunday, we will be looking at providing the Lord's Supper for those who wish to partake. This would be done by a reservation process so no more that 10 will participate at a time. Watch for more details as we work through this.

Easter Sunday morning we will have a service online at 10 a.m. Pastor Rob will also be providing a special Easter Sunrise online message at 7:00 a.m. for those who would like to rise with the Son that morning. Watch for more details on this as well.

When we are allowed to have large group gatherings again, the first Sunday after this is permitted will be a special one service Easter Celebration in all of its splendor!

Confirmation- I will be working with the 8th Graders to determine a date that will work for all of the families to celebrate this special day when their families and Trinity can celebrate this special moment in their lives!
