EASTER SERVICES IN 2020

Pastor's Pen

Jesus will Break through the Darkness

This has been a difficult time in the life of this community. It seems as if we are weighed down by bad news, and we cannot even gather together in our sanctuary to offer one another support and comfort. We are, my beloved friends, traveling through a dark valley right now, but we have the hope that our Holy Shepherd will lead us to still waters soon. But, as we travel out of Lent and towards Easter, we

are assured that we are not alone. Our God is a God of tremendous promises, and our God has shown us time and time again that those promises are always fulfilled. We may be in a dark place right now, but not only does God understand our grief and God pain, has experienced it through the life and death of Jesus.

We, as people of faith, know that the darkness

cannot stay in place. The day of crucifixion was the darkest day of all, but it was also a day that changed history. The light that bursts forth from that empty tomb pushes the darkness back. This Easter morning, watch carefully and you will see the light push back. The darkness will roll away and we will see the first bright rays of new life shining through.



New Piano Fund Donations Needed


If you are thinking of making a donation to the church to commemorate the 250th anniversary, a piano fund has been set up to receive donations to enhance our music

March Consistory Meeting Highlights

The condition of our properties comprised most of the agenda for the meeting. The latest breakdown was the freezer in the closet upstairs. It was replaced by one which was moved from the basement. Work in the cemetery, which will be done by Mosko, should begin in late spring or summer. Estimates to repair sanctuary problems have been very high, between \$180,000 and \$225,000. Masonry and gutters as well as the truss are involved. We need further assessment of this project. Plumbing estimates for the parsonage are being accepted. The consistory voted to winterize the property to save us some money as we ponder its future. It turns out that the city is revising its zoning policies. Changes in zoning may affect how we proceed. Becky has been in contact with the city, hoping to get answers to shed light on our situation.

Showing movies on a regular basis was discussed. The next movie will be "Jesus Christ Superstar" and will be shown on March 15th at 1:15 pm.

Becky Owens has contacted three companies regarding website design. They are: Fellowship One, UCC Everywhere, and Hagerstown Community College. Next month the consistory will brainstorm in the chapel on the subject of developing a new website.

Rev. Penick announced the formation of a committee to coordinate worship and music in our services. Amber Nilson will be the chair of the new committee.

Moving toward Easter, Rae Smith is planning the Seder dinner. Kim Ridenour spoke about decorating the flower cross on April 11th to be followed by dinner at Western Sizzlin. Service Workers will be filling Easter baskets for children at CASA and taking flowers to shut-ins.

Get Ready!! A Parish Nurse Note April 2020



It's time---time to get more active and shake off those winter blahs. Warmer weather makes it more appealing to go outside and get moving. Walking is one of the best exercises around and it's free! Just be sure to wear a sturdy pair of shoes. Walking burns calories; the faster you walk and the more difficult the terrain (i.e. going uphill) determine the number of calories you burn. Walking also strengthens your heart and cardiovascular system. Studies also show that diabetics' blood sugar is lower when walking.

Because walking lubricates your joints and strengthens the muscles supporting those joints, you can actually ease joint pain by walking. Your leg muscles will also get toned in the process. Walking improves your balance and strengthens your bones. Both your immune system and your mood get a boost from walking.

Studies have also shown that walking can clear your thoughts and increase your creative thinking, especially if you walk outside. You might even live longer if you are an active walker; walking at an average pace (not slowly) has been shown to reduce your risk of death by 20%! An even faster pace bumps that up to 25%. Just remember to drink plenty of water before and after walking. Be safe and walk in a well lit area; walking with someone else is also a great idea. Wear light colored clothing if you are out in the early morning or in the evening so you are easily visible. And don't forget the sunscreen, even on cloudy days!

Although walking is a great way to exercise, I want everyone to start thinking outside the box about exercise. Beginning next month we will all start a journey of many miles. If walking is not your thing, or you are unable to get out, you're not off the hook! You can still participate in our journey. Anything from organized sports, to gardening, to vacuuming and dusting can be counted toward our goal.

As springs blossoms, so will we. Stay turned for more information and instructions about our journey and its destination. You can even get a head start and walk, walk, walk!



What you need: • White carnations Scissors Vase • Water • Red food coloring • Bible What you do: 1. Cut the carnation stems (at an angle) to about 8 inches long. 2. Fill the vase halfway with water. Add 10 drops of food coloring. (More may be needed to darken the water.) 3. Add the cut flowers and observe what happens to the petals over time. 4. Discuss how this is like Iesus' work on the cross. Read 1 Peter 2:22-24 (NIV) and reflect on what his death means for us.
