Seventh Sunday of Easter 24th May 2020

*All these joined in continuous prayer, together with several women,
including Mary the mother of Jesus.*

Just as Lent helps us to turn (back) to God, so Eastertide helps us to understand who we are as a church, as God's people brought to new life through the Easter Mysteries and the waters of baptism. One of the most powerful images that we are given is of the church – the Apostles and several women, united in prayer with Mary the mother of God. I have to say that even though I have been physically on my own at the altar for eight weeks now, I have a strong sense of being united with the *whole* church in the work of prayer – whether celebrating Mass, the Liturgy of the Hours or in my other prayers.

The scriptures and other historical sources show us a pattern of prayer that shapes the day and that can be seen even in the lives of the Apostles, and which would settle eventually into what is called the Liturgy of the Hours or the Divine Office, of which Morning Prayer (Lauds) and Evening Prayer (Vespers) are probably the most familiar. Increasingly, since the start of the twentieth century, lay men and women have started praying these offices as part of their baptismal right and duty. But even in the centuries when it was harder to take part in them there were still popular forms of prayer which linked in with those central liturgies. The Angelus at morning, noon and evening mirror the three offices during the day. The 150 Hail Marys of the rosary mirror the 150 Psalms that form the core of the Liturgy of the Hours.

The Mass is the Jewel in the Crown of our Catholic faith and inheritance. It is the most precious sign of God's love for us. But it's not just the Mass but **"The public and communal prayer of the people of God [that] is rightly considered among the first duties of the Church"**.

While I know that being without Mass is hard for many – and watching on the computer or TV is not the same, no matter how beautifully it may be done – I do hope and pray that in these months we might be renewed in our prayer, our sense of it as a sharing in the prayer of Jesus to the Father, and our experience of it as a place in which God himself meets us and fills us with the grace of the Holy Spirit. Where possible pray not only privately but with one another for, as Jesus promised, "Where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them." And yet our tradition has always recognised that even if we can't meet in person we can be united in prayer. For me, T.S. Eliot expresses this mystery well in one of the Choruses from *The Rock*:

What life have you if you have not life together? / There is no life that is not in community, / And no community not lived in praise of God. / Even the anchorite who meditates alone, / For whom the days and nights repeat the praise of God, / Prays for the Church, the Body of Christ incarnate.

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Pentecost Sunday

National Rosary Rally Pope Francis is encouraging Catholics to pray the Rosary in their family homes during the month of May, especially when the pandemic is making us aware of the value of our families and making it possible for us to pray together at home.

He encourages simple Rosaries and joining online Rosary initiatives to pray to Our Lady for deliverance from Covid-19 and he has composed two prayers for this intention.

On Pentecost Sunday the church in England and Wales is holding a Rosary Rally, and each diocese is taking a turn to lead this campaign of prayer. Ours is 9.00-10.00am. **Next Sunday Fr Jonathan will us in praying the rosary for the end of this pandemic at 9.15am** on GoToMeeting.

Solemn Vigil Mass The Roman Missal includes an Extended Vigil Mass for Pentecost (a bit like the Easter Vigil). Parish routines rarely allow for such celebrations and Fr Jonathan is taking the opportunity to celebrate it this year, with the *Veni Creator, Mass VIII (de Angelis)* and *Credo III* being sung, streamed on the parish Facebook page. Plainsong seems to work more effectively in an empty church than more contemporary music – I'm not suggesting it becomes the mainstay for our usual parish masses.

Liturgy of the Word Our Liturgy of the Word will take place as now usual at 10.00am on Pentecost Sunday.

Evening Prayer the final liturgy of the Easter Season will be held online at 5.00pm.

Today is the Fifth Anniversary of **Laudato Si**, Pope Francis's letter about the care of our common home, and the end of a week of prayer <https://laudatosiweek.org/prayer/>. We will be joining this at the end of our Sunday Liturgy of the Word.

Lectio Divina is a very special and fruitful way of praying with the scriptures. St John Paul II said "It is especially necessary that listening to the word of God should become a life-giving encounter, in the ancient and ever valid tradition of *lectio divina*, which draws from the biblical text the living Word which questions, directs and shapes our lives." This week Fr Jonathan will lead us in praying through the second reading for next Sunday, 1Corinthians 12: 3-7,12-13. **Wednesday 7.30pm – 8.45pm** on GoToMeeting.

MAY – THE MONTH OF MARY: WIFE, MOTHER, ETERNAL WOMAN.

Culture, ancient and modern, has always manipulated and fermented the distortion of the uniqueness and essential creativeness of the feminine, womanhood and motherhood. In ancient times, masculine demands made of woman an asset, to be used, abused and frequently discarded. In modern times masculine demands have been subverted by the needs of cultural feminine equality with the masculine. There is a distortion in the complementarities that should exist between man and woman as intended and created by God. In the modern era, woman uses the power of the sensuous to manipulate and elevate herself within the cult of the body. She has lost the unique meaning and power of the feminine.

"I am the handmaid of the Lord" Mary said to the angel. As Gertrud von le Fort writes in her book, *The Eternal Woman*, 'Only the handmaid of the Lord is the Queen of Heaven. Wherever the creature cooperates with utmost sincerity, there the Mother of the Creator will appear, the Mother of Good Counsel. Wherever the creature becomes detached from self, the Mother most Amiable, the Mother of Fair Love, comes to the aid of the tortured world. Wherever the nations of the earth are of good will, the Queen of Peace intercedes for them.'

May is a wonderful month of the year to celebrate the Mother of God. Certainly in the northern hemisphere, Spring flourishes with colour and freshness. The songs of migratory birds fill our mornings with hope and joy. May is the only month that has three letters; it could just as well be called the month of the Mother of God the Holy Trinity.

Mary personifies the eternal contribution that woman gives to the eternal plan of our creator. There have been no greater women on this earth than our women saints. Indeed many of the Church's saints have shown their love of the Mother of God as a key element in their way of life here on earth and their relationship with our Creator. May we, in our simple but devoted lives, never cease to make Mary the Mother of our belief?

FREEDOM

Freedom is a word much used especially in every sort of protest movement. It is also used in many other contexts as well, for example with relationships, work places, of thought, and especially the freedom to choose. It is in the latter category that we experience the real challenges of life and as Christians, our relationship with God.

It is often said that if God existed why did he allow this or that to happen especially to the innocent and vulnerable? The many thousands of victims of the present Corona Virus can be a perfect example for asking such a question. It is difficult, but we have to try to understand that without that sense of freedom, which gives us the ability to reason and choose, we would not be the unique creature which reflects the image of God, our creator. He has put us, deliberately, in an environment where we are free to live, use the benefits of the world and our human talents, to improve not only our existence but that of our fellow human beings. Fr Jose Millas, SJ, writing in a recent edition of *La Civiltà Cattolica* about the weakness of Christ, states that: "*If God were present in creation showing infinite superiority, the freedom of the creature would not be possible. But freedom is the greatest good that God created, and God wants to preserve and respect it unconditionally, even at the cost of the presence of sin and evil.*"

Part of that evil of course is suffering. It is an experience that challenges our faith in the love and goodness of God. For many, their suffering alienates them from any conception of a loving God. For those with faith, it brings them closer to that love. Faith and freedom go hand in hand. Our faith will encourage us to persevere, to trust that the apparent silence of God in our suffering, the apparent silence of God the Father while his Son hung on the cross, was and always will be, the gateway to our everlasting freedom.
