



From The Pastors Heart

Celebrating Easter will be different this year after all we have been through in recent days. Even though this year will be different it's still something we can look forward to and celebrate. We look forward to a special online service and communion service this year as well as encouraging one another along the way.

Looking to the days ahead reminds me of a "Peanuts" story. Lucy and Linus were sitting in front of a television set, when Lucy said to Linus, "Go get me a glass of water." Linus looked surprised, "Why should I do anything for you? You never do anything for me." "On your 75th birthday," Lucy promised, "I will make you a cake." Linus got up, headed to the kitchen and said, "Life is more pleasant when you have something to look forward to."

As we focus on Easter, let's remember what Jesus said in John 11:25-26, "I am the resurrection and the life. Greetings First Church Family!

As we continue to journey together in these unusual times, we want you to know you are in our prayers and thoughts. During this extraordinary time where we are all doing our part to safeguard our health and slow the spread of the COVID-19, we also need to be aware that a drop-off of personal fellowship is only one of the challenges that we as a church are facing. To practice social distancing in the attempt of keeping as many people safe as possible we temporarily have suspended all our worship services and meetings in the building along with traditional office hours. However, there are several new ways we will be connecting.

We as a staff have been meeting regularly now virtually. Praying and planning ways to care for you and one another and beyond for Christ for such a time as this. Please check in on our Facebook and website for messages, music and other notes of encouragement from your staff.

We will try to keep things on both of these sites that will guide us in these difficult days. We hope the content will be a blessing in the days ahead. We also will have an opportunity for the church family to sign up for weekly prayer slots. Taken from God's promise "If my people...will pray and seek my face..." God can do amazing things! There other things we are working on that we will be sharing. We also will be sharing things that will be postponed or cancelled for now. We have now officially postponed the Good Friday Breakfast to 2021 with the same speakers!

Now, we will be using new virtual ways on our phones, internet, Facebook, website and emails to reach out and connect with each other. Please note our church phones and email will be checked regularly. You can send mail to the church, including your offerings or requests. Please continue to send in your prayer requests to maria@fumccollingswood.org.

We know right now many are facing financial challenges and have needs that are pressing or will be. So, as a church family we will be praying. We want to walk with you in your journey in the days ahead, so please inform us how we can help and support you during this time. We have a limited stock of extra toilet paper we can provide especially for our senior population or anyone who cannot find it.

Understandably, the financial health of the church is also something to be monitored. Our leadership team has been doing this regularly, and we want to be sure you have the correct and current information. The good news is that church giving increased significantly at the end of 2019, so much so that we were able to fulfill all of our financial obligations and enter 2020 with a small surplus! (Praise the Lord!). Unfortunately, that year-end surge was short-lived, and giving has fallen short of actual expenses for both January and February, resulting in a deficit of just over \$30,000 for those first two month. This is a concern that had emerged even before the many closures we are now seeing.

While we are very thankful for the many people who choose to support the church through automatic online donations, there are still many who prefer to donate in person at the worship services. With the temporary suspension of group events, we can only anticipate that there will be some additional drop-off in giving patterns for March, and possibly into April as well. So, other than simply being aware of current state of church finances, what can you do?

First, be in prayer for the health of the church... yes, your brothers and sisters in Christ as individuals (especially those most at -risk), <u>but also for the church as a whole</u>. How critical it is for Christ's church to be strong and vital during times like these that shake the confidence of the world around us.


Second, remember to be intentional in practicing your faithful, personal tithing to financially support the ministry of the church. You can do this by committing to send your tithes and offerings to the church regularly, especially during these times when you will not be personally traveling to the building. Third, prayerfully consider how the Lord is leading you to increase your giving to His work through the church. Certainly, we face challenging times. Yet, it is often in these times that we fully recognize how blessed we are to be called His children, and to be part of this church family. That leads us to want to expand that ministry of hope to those around us.





Jesus ate the Passover meal with his disciples as a symbol of the new covenant.



Scripture AND NATURE


Conduct a simple experiment to illustrate Easter's meaning.



- White carnations
- Scissors
- Vase
- Water
- Red food coloring
- Bible

What you do:

- 1. Cut the carnation stems (at an angle) to about 8 inches long.
- 2. Fill the vase halfway with water. Add 10 drops of food coloring. (More may be needed to darken the water.)
- 3. Add the cut flowers and observe what happens to the petals over time.
- 4. Discuss how this is like Jesus' work on the cross. Read 1 Peter 2:22-24 (NIV) and reflect on what his death means for us.
- 5. To learn more about this experiment, research capillary action.

EASTER AROUND THE WORLD

Easter traditions are important, but they vary widely. While Americans dye hardboiled eggs, Kenyans carve soapstone eggs and present them as gifts in banana-fiber boxes. In Bermuda, locals fly homemade kites on Good Friday — a tradition that began when a teacher illustrated Christ's ascension to heaven using a cross-shaped kite.

Ethiopian Christians observe a 56-day fast from meat and all animal products. On Easter, they dress in white to worship in churches decorated with handmade fabric. Then they feast with non-Christians on roast chicken, goat and rice.

In France, church bells are silent between Holy Thursday and Easter to observe Jesus' Passion. According to legend, the bells grow wings and fly to Rome to be blessed, returning on Easter with chocolate and presents. In one town's main square, chefs make a giant omelet with 4,500 eggs to feed 1,000 people!
