The summer of 2018 is quickly coming to a close and the fall season will be here before we know it. Many of us are wrapping up vacations, preparing for school, college and moving to a different schedule, to say the least. Changes are sometimes welcomed. However, when change is not expected or desired, life becomes more difficult. Things don't always seem to happen as we would hope or design them to. Many people today are looking for something more in their lives, something in which to place their trust and hope.

I was reading <u>Undaunted</u> by Christine Caine and she had some encouraging words about placing our trust in God. She reminds us of the story of Joseph, a time when the Jewish nation was looking for hope. This is a story of jealousy and dysfunctional family situation. At the end of the story, Joseph forgave his brothers for selling him into slavery in Egypt and told them that the things they did to harm him, God intended to use for good.

In this amazing Bible story, Joseph is abused by his brothers and sold into slavery, then repeatedly scarred and neglected by his enemies. But Joseph made an amazing discovery: Anything meant in this world for evil, God can use for good. This is no less true for us today. God is able to take the mess of our past and turn it into a message. He takes our trials and tests and turns them into a testimony.

Romans 8:28 does not say that all things that happen to us are good, but it does say that God is able to work all things together for the good of those who love Him and are called according to His purpose. If we trust Him with our broken and wounded hearts, He will bring healing, restoration, and wholeness. He takes the weak, the marginalized, and the oppressed and makes all things new. What someone else would leave for broken. He sees as beautiful. Verv often, the thing the enemy uses to try to destroy our lives is the very thing God uses to help others. God can heal hurt and turn scars into signs of strength for his glory. Our past mistakes, hurts, and pain can help give someone else a future. Whatever we have gone through enables us to help others. God does not waste one experience of our lives. He uses everything to help someone else. He does not want us to remain crippled, immobilized, or paralyzed by the past. Instead, he sent us Jesus to show us how to step into the future.

As we have been reminded in our "Jesus Gives Me Joy Series" from the heart of Apostle Paul right from prison he says here's how you keep on going in life: 12 Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. 13 Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, 14 I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus. Philippians 3:12-14 (NIV) So, as I shared, about 4:00 am last Sunday morning the Lord gave me this acrostic in my mind as I was praying for many of you!

Returners – those who have some church experience, but have been away for a while














JULY 2018 FIRST CHURCH FINANCIAL REPORT - We appreciate your consistent, generous giving as we build the kingdom together. Finances through July were as follows:





Local ministries/operations Account - This account supports our church's personnel, property, program and administrative expenses and the Greater NJ Annual Conference shared ministries. The 2018 local ministries/operations budget is \$464,763. It is funded by 90% of the 90%/10% local ministries/operation-missions offerings, 100% of the local ministries/operations offerings, 90% of loose plate offerings, conference apportionment-world service offerings and miscellaneous income.

Missions Account - This account supports First Church-related missionaries, First Church-related ministries and other missionaries and ministries. The 2018 missions budget is \$104,288 or \$8,691/ month. It is funded by a 10% tithe of the 90%/10% local ministries-operations/missions offerings, missions offerings, 10% of loose plate offerings and the Easter and Christmas missions offerings.



Discipleship/Sunday School Account - This account supports the Sunday School, Vacation Bible School and certain youth expenses. The 2018 Sunday School/Discipleship budget is \$17,000. It is funded by offerings given in Sunday School classes and by offerings (Continued on page 16)

July 2018 Designated Funds Report: In addition to their support of the local ministries/operations, mission and Sunday school/discipleship budgets, members and friends of First Church gave as follows to designated funds during July:

- A total of \$466 for the Sunday school, VBS, youth and arts/science camps. These funds have been transferred to the Sunday school account and are in addition to offerings taken in Sunday School classes. They will be reflected in the Sunday school/discipleship portion of the August 2018 First Church Financial Report.
- \$145 for the Local Benevolence fund. These funds have been transferred to the Benevolence account.
- \$100 for the medical needs of a church family which have been transferred to the family
- Other funds receiving smaller amounts.


Total July designated funds giving totaled \$750.

We are all broken in some way. We all have wounds. Some of us use that as an excuse to do nothing, to serve no one, but rather to sit and nurse our misfortune. That's not what God wants and not the model we see over and over again in God's Word. The biblical model is that God deliberately chooses imperfect vessels—those who have been wounded, those with physical or emotional limitations. Then he prepares them to serve and sends them out with their weakness still evident, so that His strength can be made perfect in that weakness. More often than not, it's our weakness that makes us capable of serving because those we serve identify with our pain. As always, God works in us so that He can work through us. May God use us and whatever we are going through to make us stronger to encourage others for his honor and glory. God can use anyone willing to be used. Lord, begin with me!

When the North Leicester Bible Fellowship was born in our home back in the mid '70s, four of five Gujarati siblings began attending, one by one trusted Christ, and were discipled. Champa, already working, was Barbara's faithful partner in visitation, Vijay blessed us with his guitar accompaniment, and two younger sisters, Bharti and Harsha, were also present each week. Mr. and Mrs. Pandya, very devout Hindus, along with others attended evangelistic Gujarati Bible studies but never exhibited any signs of spiritual life, and frequent visits in their home often left us very discouraged. An older sister had already married and while Champa resisted an arranged Hindu marriage for several years, eventually she agreed to marry Ajay who was a dentist in the U.S. military. After years and hours of investment in the family, it felt like a total defeat. Meanwhile, Vijay became addicted to a cold medication, and the elder sister's marriage was on the rocks with one of the younger sisters being molested by her husband. What was or wasn't happening? Would there be an after many days story to tell?

Last month we had a surprise telephone call from Harsha who was calling from Missouri, USA. We aren't certain how she found us. This story will bless your hearts as it has ours. Just a couple of months after Champa's marriage, Ajay trusted Christ and they have been actively serving Him for nearly 40 years! The elder sister and her husband emigrated to New Jersey, both were saved and their marriage rescued! Vijay followed them to the States, married an Indian believer who has since gone to Glory, and last week after heart surgery Vijay, too, went to Heaven. He had been very active in a Baptist church in Missouri, where he moved to join Harsha and Bharti who recently followed their siblings to America. Harsha has served with O.M. and shared that both of her parents, whose hearts seemed so hard, trusted Christ before they died. Her mother had become a spiritual powerhouse in encouraging each of the children to walk with and to trust the Lord!

Somehow I think Heaven may be filled with many surprise meetings—those we may have not expected to be there—who are a fulfilment of God's promise that His Word will not return to Him empty—that spiritual bread cast upon the waters will take root like grain scattered on flooded fields takes root and matures. We are certainly encouraged to keep watering that scattered seed with our prayers; what may be hidden now will be revealed. He promised!

TWR360 Turns Five!


You know all about TWR and their radio ministry. You know it reaches out fluently in more than 230 languages and dialects to a potential audience of nearly four billion people. And we have mentioned to you in our visits and previous newsletters about TWR360, TWR's global, digital platform. Well, TWR360 is five years old already and what an amazing history it already has.

Unlike her radio sibling, TWR360 is a multi-language platform that allows a person access to resources anytime,

anywhere, on any connected device, all on one website. Imagine talking to a friend who has doubts about her salvation, or is grieving the loss of a loved one, or is just asking questions that you don't think you can answer. By directing them to TWR360 they can do a simple search by topic, book of the Bible or ministry and have access to content via video, audio or text files in their heart language.

TWR360 is currently available in 54 languages and features 600 programs featuring Bible studies, music, and devotional commentaries from 200 ministry partners. The current outreach goal is to add another 46 languages by the end of 2018.

TWR has created "invitation cards" in multiple languages. If you would like to share TWR360 with an international friend, you can do that. And there is no need to fear that your friend would not find their way around. TWR360 has language recognition capability that automatically recognizes the default language on their device. So, if you were wondering about how you can share Christ in a personal and friendly way, visit TWR360. Download the TWR360 app, and start to share the Good News!







I recently read a book by Lee Strobel titled <u>The Case</u> <u>for Miracles</u>. Do you know about Mr. Strobel? He received an undergraduate degree in journalism from the University of Missouri prior to attending Yale Law School. He was an award-winning journalist for 14 years. After his wife became a Christian, Strobel decided to use his skills to investigate the


biblical claims about Jesus. Based on what he found, he became a Christian and has been writing and teaching ever since.

Back to his book <u>The Case for Miracles</u>. Before opening the book, I thought I knew what it was about. Sure, I'm a Christian. I believe in miracles. Jesus did some pretty amazing stuff like feeding over 5000 people with a kid's lunch and walking on the Sea of Galilee (a fresh water lake with an average depth of 84 feet and a maximum depth of 200 feet, in case you were wondering). And I've heard reports of miracles in more recent times. I hesitated to read something I thought probably couldn't really teach me much.

But then I opened the book, started to read and got a surprise. And a challenge! Strobel said our prayer life reflects our belief in miracles. What? I thought my prayer life was OK. Yet I had to admit I didn't really pray for or expect miracles. I wasn't bold in my petitions to God. I wondered if I really expected God to heal someone when I prayed. I made it sound pious always inserting "if it be Your will." Yes, I do want God's will to be done. But does that mean sometimes I'm not really believing "ask and it will be given you?" (Matthew 7)

I've pondered this for weeks. I realize we can and should ask God for things – little things and big things. Like the 4th grader in my Sunday School class whose prayer was that God heal his dog. Or my praying over and over for a neighbor to accept Jesus as her Savior before she died from rapidly advancing caner. I believe God wants to hear us. He wants us to tell Him what we need or want. He wants us to know – to believe – He cares and will answer our prayers. They may not always be answered the way we want, but God always answers in the way He knows is best.

Let's pray boldly for ourselves, our neighbors, our church family, our enemies, our country, persecuted Christ-followers around the world and whatever else God puts on our heart.
