

PASTOR ROD'S MESSAGE

But alas, we find yet once more that it fails to live up to the hype. We sold out for it, but then we're on a search for another "fix". It's as Paine would say, "too cheap".

The real thing is only found at an extreme price. The price is a cross. It cost Jesus the agony of The Cross and now He calls us to the same. And He was saying to *them* all, " If anyone wishes to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me. Luke 9:23 The cost is high, few there are that are willing to pay that price. It's easier to find a substitute, but the result is always the same slavery. Any chance that you'll quit looking for substitutes and say, "Yes" to following Jesus heart, soul, mind and strength?

PASTOR PHIL'S MESSAGE



Pastor Phil

Paul sat in Corinth after a long day of tent making and teaching. He began to write the letter to Rome that had been in his heart for some time. The words flowed from his heart and the Holy Spirit was centered on the need to see self rightly and appealed to the Gospel, Good News, to transform hearts, minds, and lives. The culture of the church in Rome was being influenced by the culture around them. This is our context today, we have been influenced by the culture around us. We need to come under the Word of God and be transformed.

The Roman Emperor Nero was the Ruler at the time of Paul writing the letter to the Romans. Nero's reign was one of evil tyranny and perverse-

ness. He was corrupt and wicked in all that he did. He was adopted as the heir not the actual blood heir for the throne. Tacitus called him the most wicked of all the emperors. So if there was anyone to possibly rebel against Nero would have been a good candidate. But this was not what God has called the church to do in the face of evil rulers.

Romans chapter 12 reminds us to submit to God's Word. I hope many of you have memorized verses one and two "I beseech you therefore, brothers by the mercies of God, that you present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. And, do not be conformed to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God." We are to submit to God's Word and God's Holy Spirit in order to grow in faith. God calls us to be discipled into the gifts He has given us and to behave in a manner like Christ. God ends the chapter by stating, "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

Romans chapter 13 then opens up with a surprising command for we are called to come under the authorities (like Nero) that rule or govern over you for they have authority and power. There is no power and authority except from God Himself and those who have been placed over us are put over us as determined by God Himself. This is fascinating to think that God has placed over us even authorities that are evil and corrupt. We are called to submit even to them. God goes on to explain that those who resist authorities are resisting what God has appointed and are incurring judgment. We must continue to follow God while submitting to those who hold positions of authority over us.

The one exception is Gospel proclamation. We preach the Good News of the Kingdom by the Authority Christ has and this means following God rather than men (Acts 5:28-29). Christ is worth more than prison and death so we proclaim Good News to the captives through any and all means that we have at our disposal. Jesus is the one we proclaim warning everyone and teaching everyone with complete wisdom, so that we will present everyone fully grown up into Christ's life (Col. 1:28). So may our lives show Christ's greatness to a watching world!

So how do you speak of the Governor or state officials around us? Do we respect their office while we disagree over laws? When was the last time you spent time praying for those in office? Have you prayed for their salvation and good? Have you spent time repenting for rebellious attitudes towards those in office? We know the Bible is clear that rebellion is as divination and arrogance as idolatry (I Samuel 15:23) so we must root out attitudes of disrespect and allow God to act and do what only He can. Let's pray for those who are in office and seek to tell others of the Good News for when God changes the heart, that's when transformation begins!


Deacons Devotional

What is a pollen allergy?

Pollen is one of the most common causes of allergies in the United States. Pollen is a very fine powder produced by trees, flowers, grasses, and weeds to fertilize other plants of the same species. Many people have an adverse immune response when they breathe in pollen. The immune system normally defends the body against harmful invaders — such as viruses and bacteria — to ward off illnesses. In people with pollen allergies, the immune system mistakenly identifies the harmless pollen as a dangerous intruder. It begins to produce chemicals to fight against the pollen.

This is known as an allergic reaction, and the specific type of pollen that causes it is known as an allergen. The reaction leads to numerous irritating **symptoms**, such as:

Sneezing Stuffy nose Watery eyes

What are the different types of pollen allergies?

There are hundreds of plant species that release pollen into the air and trigger allergic reactions. Here are some of the more common culprits:

Birch pollen allergy: Birch pollen is one of the most common airborne allergens during the spring. As the trees bloom, they release tiny grains of pollen that are scattered by the wind. A single birch tree can produce up to 5 million pollen grains, with many traveling distances of up to 100 yards from the parent tree.

Oak pollen allergy: Like birch trees, oak trees send pollen into the air during the spring. While oak pollen is considered to be mildly allergenic compared to the pollen of other trees, it stays in the air for longer periods of time. This can cause severe allergic reactions in some people with pollen allergies.

Grass pollen allergy: Grass is the primary trigger of pollen allergies during the summer months. It causes some of the most severe and difficult-to-treat symptoms. However, the <u>AAAAI reports</u> that allergy shots and allergy tablets can be highly effective in relieving symptoms of grass pollen allergies.

Ragweed pollen allergy: Ragweed plants are the main culprits of allergies among weed pollens. They're the most active between the late spring and fall months. Depending on the location, however, ragweed may begin spreading its pollen as early as the last week of July and continue into the middle of October. Its wind-driven pollen can travel hundreds of miles and survive through a mild winter.

What are the symptoms of a pollen allergy?

Pollen allergy symptoms most often include: nasal congestion, sinus pressure, which may cause facial pain, runny nose, itchy, watery eyes, scratchy throat, cough, swollen, bluish-colored skin beneath the eyes, decreased sense of taste or smell, increased asthmatic reactions.

Medications

If you still experience symptoms despite taking these preventive measures, there are several over-the-counter (OTC) medications that may help: <u>antihistamines</u>, such as cetirizine (Zyrtec) or diphenhydramine (<u>Benadryl</u>); decongestants, such as pseudoephedrine (Sudafed) or oxymetazoline (Afrin nasal spray); medications that combine an antihistamine and a decongestant, such as Actifed (triprolidine and pseudoephedrine) and Claritin-D (loratadine and pseudoephedrine)

Allergy shots: Allergy shots may be recommended if medications aren't enough to ease symptoms. Allergy shots are a form of immunotherapy that involves a series of injections of the allergen. The amount of allergen in the shot gradually increases over time. The shots modify your immune system's response to the allergen, helping to reduce the severity of your allergic reactions. You may experience complete relief within one to three years after starting allergy shots.

Home remedies: A number of home remedies may also help relieve pollen allergy symptoms. These include: using a squeeze bottle or neti pot to flush pollen from the nose ~ trying herbs and extracts, such as PA-free butterbur or spirulina ~ removing and washing any clothing that has been worn outside ~ drying clothes in a dryer rather than outside on a clothing line ~ using air conditioning in cars and homes ~ investing in a portable high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) filter or dehumidifier and vacuuming regularly with a vacuum cleaner that has a HEPA filter

When to call the doctor

You should tell your doctor if your symptoms become more severe or if your medications are causing unwanted side effects. Also, be sure to consult your doctor before trying any new supplements or herbs because some can interfere with the effectiveness of certain medications.

'What is more important: a candy store or worship?' Winnebago residents pack council meeting to discuss church

Approximately 25 members of the public attended the Winnebago City Council meeting on Tuesday, May 12, to express their concerns with the ongoing Stay Home order, busimesses not being allowed to reopen and churches not being allowed to hold worship services.

The attendoes were spread out in the commusity room in order to practice social distancing

Upon learning the people were all in attendance for the same reason, mayor Jeremiah Schutt told the crowd he would limit speakers to direc minutes to ensure everyone who wanted to speak would have the opportunity to do so.
