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

Dear FUMC Family

First of all, we want to say *thank you*! The prayers, encouragement, and support you've given to us as a staff during this difficult time have been such a strength and blessing. We love you and are tremendously thankful for you!

Second, we recognize that this quarantine has been tough. And as time goes on, we're all longing to see each other again. But along with those feelings come many different - even confusing or conflicting - messages. So it seemed crucial to us that we communicate some clear direction to you in regard to where we are and where we're going as a congregation.

Moving Forward: When and How Should We Meet?

There is a lot on the line when it comes to this question. The matter of re-gathering together includes the emotional and spiritual well-being of each person in our congregation - and we do believe that being together with the Body is crucial. It also involves the physical well-being of people, and we must especially consider those connected to our ministry who are most vulnerable to this dangerous and not-yet-understood disease. So we as a staff are seeking to make a decision that is both Spirit-led and well-informed. We are praying a lot, individually and together (over Zoom, of course.) We are also paying attention to statements from our Governor and other authorities, from our Bishop, and from other faith-communities locally and around the country. Given the uncertainty and ever-changing nature of this pandemic, **it is not possible to declare any definite long-term plans or dates**; however, we also don't want to keep you guessing. So for now, we are sharing our decisions for the summer.

Small Groups

In cooperation with the Governor's proclamation that smaller groups can begin meeting, and because of our need as humans to be with each other, we are allowing smaller groups (including life groups, prayer groups, etc.) to consider reconvening. But first, recognize that not all group members may feel comfortable doing so just yet. We call all leaders to show grace in your invitations, and consider allowing a hybrid gathering with some joining in-person and others joining virtually. And second, all groups must meet safely. The following is our "Top 10 List" of precautions for small groups this summer:

- 1. Keep it to 25 people or less
- 2. Stay outdoors
- 3. Stay 6+ feet apart
- 4. Wear a mask (if you can't keep 6 feet apart)
- 5. Bring your own chair
- 6. Bring your own food/drink (or none at all)
- 7. Don't use the restroom (We suggest a time limit of approx. 60-90 min)
- 8. Wash hands/use sanitizer before and after
- 9. Anyone with symptoms of any kind for the previous 48 hours (fever, sore throat, respiratory symptoms, etc. even if you *think* it's allergy related), should not attend
- 10. Anyone with symptoms of any kind within 7 days after meeting in-person with the group, should contact the group, and Pastor Sam or the staff, immediately

Large Groups

We all want to be together again! But in light of the information we're receiving, and through much prayer and discussion, we have decided to continue our quarantine from large-group gatherings. So we are planning on having no activities at the building, but keeping all services, meetings, and ministries virtual through the summer (including VBS - the children's team will evaluate other options for ministry this summer.) We will continue monitoring the situation. Let us all keep an open mind and be prepared to adjust restrictions looser or tighter, sooner or longer, as necessary.

Moving Forward: Our Posture

In everything, we're asking <u>all</u> of us to remember that what is most important - more than any position held, or decision made - is our <u>posture</u> as God's people. Don't forget that we are reflections of Christ in this world, and everything we say or do (<u>or post</u>), and the attitudes and tones behind it, creates positive or negative ramifications. In light of that, may we embrace the following posture toward God, each other, and others around us:

Humility. Yes, all the uncertainty surrounding COVID-19 is frustrating, and our temptation is to believe "I know best." But NO ONE - including our government, the experts, our staff, and even you - knows the right answer in any of this. May we all recognize that people are trying to make the best possible decision for the most people possible.

Unity. As God's people, we have a different goal than the world does. We must not seek our own comfort or well-being at another's expense; rather, we work *for* and *with* each other. And unity doesn't equal uniformity: we *will* disagree on many things, but we *can* keep holding on to our common (and most important) vision and mission together.

Grace. Let us throw away our attitudes of condemnation toward others who hold a different position, make choices we don't understand, or don't act/speak with their best behavior (you and I don't always either.) Everyone is under a great degree of stress. Give each other the benefit of the doubt and "make allowance for each other's faults." (Col 3:13)

Love. "Above all else, clothe yourselves with love." (Col 3:14) "Let no debt remain outstanding except the continuing debt to love one another." (Rom 13:8) "[If I] do not have love, I am nothing." (1 Cor 13:2)

In other words, may we seek to *live* right, not merely *be* right!

Finally, we want to acknowledge the reality that this season has been (and will continue to be) very painful. This pandemic has created quite a strain on us in multiple ways - physically, relationally, emotionally, spiritually, mentally, and/or financially. We see you, and we care! We as a staff are committed to your safety and your well-being, and will continue to do all we can to lead you and meet your needs. More importantly, God cares - He sees you, He is with you, He has not forgotten you! May we all find comfort in God's invitation and promise to us: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight." (Prov 3:5-6)



Dear Friends of STEP,

Last week in my leadership class, I talked about how adaptation - the ability to adapt to changing circumstances - is one of the marks of a good leader. I chuckle now as I think about it because this year has been a master class in adaptation for all of us at STEP.

Truth be told, the average Haitian has a Ph.D. in adaptation by the time they graduate High School. But adaptation for survival and adaptation in leadership are two different things. I didn't realize how much of a learning opportunity this year has been until a student raised his hand in class last week - after we had just temporarily relocated the campus - and asked "How did you guys do this so quickly?" It turns out that adaptation gets easier with practice...

Adaption at STEP 101: Peyi Lòk

This isn't new territory for us. Haiti shut down almost entirely this past fall for several months. Every day flaming barricades blocked roads all over the country and it was impossible for our students to get to the campus.

So we adapted with WhatsApp. These days in Haiti, the internet is a little better than it used to be and most students have some sort of smartphone. Almost all of them communicate using WhatsApp. Within a week or so we created groups on WhatsApp for each of our courses. Our professors started teaching by sharing images and voice messages to the groups. It wasn't perfect, but it provided a way for us to stay connected with the students and keep advancing (although a little more slowly) through the courses.

Adaption at STEP 201: Escalating Tensions in Bolosse

Eventually, Peyi Lòk calmed down and we were able to resume classes on campus again. That changed on Thursday, March 5th. As our students were leaving for the day, a group of armed individuals told us we could no longer access the campus via the Ft. Mercredi road - effectively cutting off our access to the

campus. Recognizing this as a significant escalation in the ongoing tensions in our neighborhood, we knew we were going to need to temporarily hold classes off-campus.

Within 24 hours, we located an alternate site, and within 36 hours, we relocated our 26 dorm students to alternate housing on the other side of the city. By Sunday morning, we were well-positioned to open for classes at the temporary site the next day. Classes went off without a hitch there for two weeks, and things were moving in the direction of us heading back to the campus soon.

Then COVID-19 entered Haiti.

Adaptation at STEP 301: Coronavirus

Late last week, the President of Haiti announced the first two official cases had arrived in the country. In the same address, he closed all schools until further notice, instituted a national curfew and restricted all gatherings to less than 10 people. We don't know what Covid-19 will do here yet, so we're assuming we'll be closed for at least a month. Time to adapt again!

Last Friday, our students scattered back across the country to return to their homes. This week, our professors have been returning to their WhatsApp groups while we work on getting course content uploaded to an online learning management system called Edmodo.

The current challenge we face is not getting our courses online, but getting those online courses delivered to our students. Many of them are now in the countryside with little if any access to the internet. We haven't solved this challenge yet (please pray for us!), but we're going to keep working at it until we figure it out.

The Mission Matters

Last week as I stood in front of my students for what would be the last time for a while. We said one of the best motivators for adaptation in leadership is a compelling mission. When you really believe that your mission matters, you don't let obstacles stop you. Instead, leaders are those who find ways to push through, allowing the mission to advance no matter what.


STEP's mission is to prepare maturing Haitian leaders to make disciples of Christ that transform their communities to the glory of God. We believe in this mission with all of our hearts. We believe that if this mission succeeds, one day we'll see a new Haiti emerge.

These students of ours are going to face more than their fair share of obstacles after they leave STEP. Hopefully, the experience gained in this academic year will help make those obstacles just a little bit easier to hurdle.

In the midst of it all, my mind goes back to one moment about 2 weeks ago during LRI's Global Summit in Brazil. LRI's president, Craig Parro, was sharing with the crowd of 128 church leaders from some 38 nations about the progress of the Movement of the Word around the world. He pointed out that God's footprints can be clearly seen at every step. Through gospel partnership, pastors on every continent are being trained in God's Word by their own countrymen, brothers from their own nations.

Leading up to the Global Summit, our security team had been monitoring the coronavirus outbreak, and the situation looked stable and safe enough for us to proceed with the event. However, after we had been there several days, the level of global concern accelerated, and then the World Health Organization redefined this health crisis as a "global pandemic." At that point the situation began changing rapidly – countries began restricting travel and closing borders. As a result, we compressed the schedule from seven days to four, and we immediately began the daunting task of re-ticketing 120 staff and partners for their return trips home. While this undertaking proved to be both difficult and expensive, we believe it was the right thing to do in order to faithfully care for our partners and staff.



All LRI staff are home and accounted for. However, three of our global partners remain in Brazil, unable to return home due to travel restrictions and border closings in their home countries. We are in regular communication with them, and they are being well cared for by our Brazilian partners, Preach the Word. As we all long to see family and friends, please pray for these men, that the Lord will shepherd them well in these days and return them to their families in Peru and Haiti soon.
