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

"The LORD is my shepherd, I shall not want." Psalm 23:1, NRSV

Wow...it's hard to believe we are pushing into the heart of the summer. This is, without a doubt, one of the most unusual years of ministry I can ever remember. As we watch the things around us and listen to God, we are trying to set the course for the rest of the summer. We are looking forward to our first all church summer gathering Wednesday evening,

July 8 at 7:00 pm in the church volleyball area. This will be an informal, outside, socially distanced evening of sharing and giving thanks to God for the opportunity to be together. Our next all church gathering will be on Sunday, July 26 7:00 pm. How we truly miss you all! We are watching trends and safety factors across our country, state and locally to anticipate next steps.

There are smaller summer gatherings you can sign up for that will be meeting weekly or bi-weekly at homes throughout the summer. Also the Monday through Thursday Prayers on the Porch have been a powerful time to meet with Lord and each other. Several have zoomed in as well.

All that we are doing is for one purpose: that we recognize our need more than ever for the love and relationship of Jesus Christ in our lives and those around us. His presence is so vital in our lives. Beginning, Sunday, July 5th, we continue that focus with a short series during the month of July on the 23rd Psalm. The 23rd Psalm is a heartfelt psalm for every season of our lives. As we focus our time on this powerful familiar passage of scripture right from the heart of David, we know David did some great things and had his share of issues too!

Some 1,000 years after his death, Apostle Paul reveals an interesting statement about David. The passage is Acts 13:22. The statement is: "God testified concerning David: 'I have found David son of Jesse, a man after my own heart; he will do everything I want him to do.' What a testimony of a life well lived and found pleasing to the Lord!" God used a simple shepherd boy because of one amazing passion: longing to please God. What a great attribute to be known as a person "after God's own heart." These qualities are seen throughout David's life, but they are brought into sharp focus in this passage. By the way, these are the same qualities that can guide us to be known as one "after God's own heart."

I encourage you to look at the 23rd Psalm this month and throughout the rest of the summer to find descriptive words and phrases like "*The Lord is my Shepherd, He restores my soul, He leads me by the still*

waters." Continue to look at words and phrases throughout this Psalm and allow the Holy Spirt to bring fresh strength and encouragement to your life in these challenging days.

We don't know what lies ahead, but the good news is that our Shepherd will go with us anywhere, and his mercy is there when we need it right to the end! Now, as we meditate on this Psalm we recognize it had to be written by someone who also desired to make God's presence matter most in his life's journey. I pray you will join us in this journey this summer.

Bob and Barbara Alber, TX

Despite our isolation, we share a collective sense of loss. We have each lost SOMETHING these past few weeks of sheltering in place.

- Have you lost someone you love to COVID-19?
- Have you lost your livelihood or your sense of financial security?
- Do you miss having personal privacy in your own home?
- Have your relationships with family and friends been suffering?
- Have you lost trust in those who are making decisions for you?
- Have you missed out on celebrations and vacations?
- For many of you, it has been very difficult coping with an ever-growing list of disappointments and losses. Insecurity has given way to anxiety and fear. We feel guilty admitting our fears because—after all—aren't we all just supposed to cast our cares on the Lord?

Truth be told, though, that's a lot easier said than done, isn't it?

Welcome to the world of Missionary Kids (MKs), many of whom grow up with a heightened sense of insecurity and loss due to the frequent transitions in their lives. For the past 16 years Bob has had the privilege of helping these young people cope with the same feelings many of us single-culture, first-world citizens are experiencing for the first time.

This pandemic has shed light on the fact that only here in the Dallas area where Bob has established a local community of college-age students is this demographic of 18–25 year olds receiving the support they need. Across the country and world, hundreds of college-age MKs are struggling. Bob's supervisors at Wycliffe are now addressing this long-standing need by creating a new role for him to establish a care-giving

ministry to serve ALL of the US-based young adult children of Wycliffe and its partner missionary organizations. There are currently over 400 young adults just within Wycliffe, so the potential for this outreach is HUGE. Even though Bob's role is not yet official, he has already begun to help those with urgent needs.

In order to build this program and team, Bob and I (Barbara) have agreed to move to Orlando for a few months this fall. There, Bob will have resources from Wycliffe's headquarters to establish the foundation for this new and vital support ministry. We are so excited to see how God has uniquely prepared Bob for "such a time as this" (Est. 4:14). Please pray for Bob as he seeks to build a team of helpers to grow this vital ministry. Please also pray for us as we seek the Lord's wisdom to know whether we should relocate to Orlando on a permanent basis. Thank you!

We are all very different: our jobs, education, religious affiliation, the types of books or movies we like, where we vacation, the food we eat. The list could go on and on! But by a strange set of circumstances, here we all are, experiencing the ramifications of a unique situation completely out of our control. No matter where you look to get your news and information, the media seems to be focused on the negative. Daily we are told how many are infected, how many are hospitalized, how many have become victims. We can't keep hearing that all day, every day, for weeks on end and not have it affect our stateof-mind. Many people are searching for answers about things that they have never had the time to before. Many are looking for some sign of hope.

This week as we listened to Christian radio the common thread that we have enjoyed is hearing program producers and pastors marvel at how many people are tuning into their programs or watching their streamed services. TWR is no different. Globally we are offering hope to people all over the world in over 275 languages on over 2000 outlets. We also have seen a huge increase in new visitors to our online ministry website "twr360.org" which houses spiritual resources in close to 100 languages. That means that anyone looking—and some "by accident" can find answers to the questions that trouble their hearts and minds during this crisis. Our 'business' is about offering HOPE. We are blessed to have a very small part with you in helping others find the answers they are looking for—in such a time as this!

Recent news from the STEP campus at Bolosse where we lived for all but 3 of our years in Haiti is discouraging. We know GOD IS IN CONTROL and we know our ways are not His ways. We need to remember that every time we receive news from our beloved Haiti. The notorious gang to the west of the campus has come onto the campus and are using the lower part of the campus to attack other gangs. They have tried to break into one of the empty homes. The headquarters of the UEBH and the administrative/ educational building of STEP are both located on this campus. We are praying that God would intervene in this situation and protect the physical buildings and all they hold. We are praying the people in the area remain safe. We've heard that many have left the area if they have somewhere to go.

Our co-worker and friend, Lois Beadle, has been away from her home at Bolosse for over two months now because of the problems on campus. It has been recommended that she now move across town. Moving is a huge stress maker in the best of times but now with the treat of gangs on campus, the need to locate affordable/safe location and her need to relocate by early June she is under a lot of stress. Please pray for Lois. She is an excellent teacher and is setting up the program for teaching English as a second language for the seminary. She is committed to continue for 5 more semesters. STEP has had a very difficult year with the gang tensions on campus and now the Covid-19 shutdown. Pray for safe, affordable housing and a safe move to a new location.

News from the Northwest-Our co-worker and engineer who works in the northwest (where David teaches his continuing education seminars) has said the drought in northwest Haiti "the worst I've seen since 1992." He says that wells are running dry and animals are dying. The crops that usually sustain people are not growing and there is a growing concern that hunger will lead to famine.

Pray with us that northwest Haiti will be spared the combined impact of the virus and drought. Pray especially for rain and for our engineer, Bruce, and his team who are busily digging and deepening wells as

fast as they can. Pray also for resources for the food crisis and protective equipment for our medical staff as they treat patients with COVID-19.

Mark and Carol Hepner, Ohio

Except for two weeks in March being side-lined by a pinched nerve in my neck, I (Mark) have continued my regular work-at-home routine. So of all of us, I'm probably the least affected by the current upset. Back in February I started dialoging with a friend and fellow-translator in Papua New Guinea about returning to PNG at the end of July to do the consultant check of the remaining books of the Kaluli NT along with the Kaluli book of Genesis.

For now all trip arrangements have been put on hold until the COVID 19 crisis abates enough to allow firm plans to be made, tickets purchased and accommodations booked. Besides Genesis, I will be checking Kaluli Matthew, 1 and 2 Peter, Jude, and maybe Ephesians. So, I have plenty of daily work to get through, including the exegetical check of those books, corresponding with the translator regarding possible adjustments, and composing the content questions I will ask during the "face-to-face" checking sessions. I also keep chipping away at the Tok Pisin translation helps project as time permits.

We are very grateful for all of you. Your faithful prayers and giving make it possible for as to stay involved in the Bible translation effort in Papua New Guinea.


THE DESERT WILL BLOSSOM

Where there is need, God is always bringing new life, often working through the church but sometimes using Christians and others in the secular realm.

At England's University of Sheffield, scientists have learned to grow gardens from discarded mattresses in refugee camps. In Jordan and other dry regions, the foam "soil" soaked with a nutrient solution lets vegetables, fruits and herbs grow with far less water than usual. Syrian refugees who were already farmers "have made the project their own, growing things we never thought ... possible in the desert," says professor Tony Ryan.

But more than plants are flourishing! The greenery amid a barren landscape boosts mental health. The work experience will help people land jobs. Families learn new skills and eat more healthfully. And the gains go both ways, as scientists learn to apply research in the real world.

As God promises, "The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad; the desert ... shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and singing" (Isaiah 35:1-2, ESV).




