Making a Difference in the Public Square

Our lives are driven and pulled by different agendas and movements in the public square. We can't help but be shaped by the great movements of our day. Everyone wants us to be for something or against something else. People want to make a difference.

Robert Raikes wanted to make a difference in the lives of people around him. Raikes was born in 1736 and wanted his devotion to Christ to be in the public square and to shape the public square with Christianity. How did he go about it? Raikes is credited with one of the first Sunday School movements.

Raikes saw the local children of Gloucester, England using bad language, gambling, and fighting. He asked a local woman about the sad situation and she responded, "This is nothing to what goes on on Sundays. You'd be shocked indeed if you were here then." The sinful behaviors were so wild that church services were disturbed. People couldn't even read their Bibles for the noise. Most of the people, even children, in middle and lower economic levels spent at least 12 hours a day working in factories during the week. On Sunday "they behaved in a most unrestrained way."

The first Sunday School was opened in July of 1780 at 10 a.m. with many of the poorer children being invited. They were also invited to return at 1 and 5:30 for more studies. After a few years of this dedicated study one manufacturer noted, "They have been transformed from the shape of wolves and tigers to that of men." Church historian John Mark Yeats said, "Some historians have posited that the Sunday school movement did more to empower the lower class than any other thing in the early 19th century." Raikes' school grew to more than 200,000 students across England in 20 years. By 1850 there were over 2 million.





The Importance of Integrity

The term integrity has been defined in various ways. Some would say it is the quality of being honest and having strong moral principals. Others would say it is doing the right thing all the time simply because it is the right thing—doing the right thing knowing no one will know whether you did it or not. I want to suggest, based upon Scripture, a life of integrity is what should characterize each Christian.

A life of integrity makes us like Jesus. "...Jesus Christ...went about doing good..." (Acts 10:38).

A life of integrity protects our reputation. "Show yourself in all respects to be a model of good works, and in your teaching show integrity, dignity, and sound speech that cannot be condemned, so that an opponent may be put to shame, having nothing evil to say about us" (Titus 2:7-8).

A life of integrity gives us confidence to face eternity. "Do all things without grumbling or disputing, that you may be blameless and innocent, children of God without blemish in the midst of a crooked and twisted generation, among whom you shine as lights in the world, holding fast to the word of life, so that in the day of Christ I may be proud that I did not run in vain or labor in vain" (Phil. 2:14-16).

A life of integrity strengthens the message we share with others. "Beloved, I urge you as sojourners and exiles to abstain from the passions of the flesh, which wage war against your soul. Keep your conduct among the Gentiles honorable, so that when they speak against you as evildoers, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day of visitation" (1 Peter 2:11-12).

Doing the right thing—doing what Jesus Christ would do—will have a huge impact on our own lives and on the lives of others. Are we known as people of integrity?
