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We are beginning to organize a "Need Knows no Season" project to adopt some families in need like we do at Christmas time. Last year we helped 25 families through the Pojoaque Elementary school system, and it was well received. They were so appreciative. I just got the contact for them today and will be asking

how this might work given the COVID restrictions in place.

I would like for you to pray about it, maybe even fast about it, and then help with this act of kindness as





Are you feeling exhausted?

When a cat senses a dog, the alarm bells ring, and its hair stands on end. It can't stay in this state for very long, so it must decide rather quickly whether it needs to fly, fight, or figure out that the



dog didn't even notice it, which might mean that after the dog passes, the cat can go back to its previous business. But if the dog hangs around, the cat will have to adapt to its continued presence. They might become friends, but it is more likely that the cat will be in a constant state of potential danger. A cat can only adapt to a prolonged sense of potential danger for so long, and then it will collapse out of exhaustion.

We are going into our sixth month of being exposed to a prolonged sense of potential danger. Thankfully, none of us have been infected with COVID-19. But others have. And all of our lives have been disrupted by the precautions we have to take because of the constant threat of exposure. We are adapting. We are implementing best practices. But we are also growing weary, some are even becoming exhausted. And the threat of being exposed is not going away any time soon.

What can we do? We could find some relief from the truths recorded in Bible. Here are a few verses to get your started: (1) "Come to Me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light." Mt. 11:28-30 (2) Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Do not let your heart be troubled, nor let it be fearful. JN 14:27 (3) Behold, God is my salvation, I will trust and not be afraid; For the Lord God is my strength and song, And He has become my salvation." Isaiah 12:2 (4) I have strength for every situation through Him who empowers me. Phil. 4:13

We could find ways to share God's love with those who do not yet know His promises. Ways that bring relief to our friends and neighbors who are exhausted from being stressed out for so long. We can pray that God uses us to help them discover His rest.

WHAT SHOULD BE THE CHRISTIAN'S RESPONSE TO RACIAL TENSIONS?

We are heartbroken that innocent lives are being lost on the streets of America. We wonder, "What can I do? Should the church be more actively involved? Is this a civil, political issue or a religious, spiritual issue?"

I pray that we will devote ourselves to God and cast our anxieties on Him. Trust that the Spirit will protect us from bitterness. We must have confidence that the gospel is powerful and the church will not be overwhelmed.

We believe that Jesus and the gospel destroys "the dividing wall of hostility," Eph. 2:14 NIV.

Kevin DeYoung at The Gospel Coalition is writing a series of articles addressing these questions.

This is one of several thoughtful resources I ask you to consider. One answer is found in the biblical teaching that we are made in the image of God. These several implications follow regarding race and racism.

<u>First</u>, and most obviously, the image of God speaks to the inherent worth and dignity of every human being.

<u>Second</u>, if the image of God reminds us of who we are, it also directs us to what we ought to be.

<u>Third</u>, we would do well to start with what we have in common rather than with what separates us.

Fourth, as image bearers, we are free moral agents, responsible before God for our choices.


<u>Fifth</u>, we should seek to understand our fellow image bearers as whole people, not as truncated versions of the worst parts of their life and character.

<u>Sixth</u>, we should be slow to attribute to individual image bearers the unfavorable characteristics associated with a broader group identity—especially when that broader group identity was not freely chosen or the broader group denounces those unfavorable characteristics.

For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified. (1 Cor. 2:2 NIV).

Back to school on the 13th
