### **A Lenten Reflection** from Fr. Sam+... a fellow traveler

I've struggled with my article about Lent this year, even as I've struggled with what I might give up as a Lenten sacrifice. I quess if the truth be told I'm not feeling very Lent like ... I am too excited about all of the wonderful things going on about us in our parish and diocese. We have a parish that continues to find new purpose and is growing. We are coalescing as a community of faith and we are finding new ways to be together. New ministries are developing and there is joy in this place. Even our diocese is preparing itself for a new bishop. Hope abounds!

Still it is Lent... a reflective time when, with purpose, we take stock of our lives and work with intention on areas where we fall short of the mark. Lent also is a time of selfsacrifice when we are called upon by the church to forgo some part of our life as symbolic gesture of sacrifice that reminds us of all that Christ forfeited for our sake.

Lent Madness started on February 27! Want to be inspired by some saintly souls this Lent and have fun along the wav? Join with thousands of Christians across denominations who have discovered the joyful online learning community that is Lent Madness.

Each pairing remains open for 24 hours as participants read about and then vote to determine which saint moves on to the next round. Sixteen saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo.

Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to get closer to Jesus Christ?

### On Sunday, March 29, at 5:30 p.m., the Saint John's Choir will present Lenten Choral Evensong.

Members of the Oklahoma Bach Choir and the American Baroque Opera Co. will offer Bach's St. John Passion in four performances. The first three are in the Dallas area. the fourth and final performance taking place here at Saint John's Church. Bach led the first performance of his St. John Passion on Good Friday in 1724. It is a dramatic setting of Christ's passion as told in the Gospel of John. This performance, made possible by Arlo and Barbara DeKraai, will be the first in Oklahoma using period instruments.

First performed on Good Friday 1724, Bach's St. John Passion incorporates John 18 and 19 from the Luther Bible as well as devotional Lutheran hymns. A highly dramatic work, this is the closest Bach came to composing opera. This performance is the last on a tour that will begin at Perkins Chapel at Southern Methodist University.

Musicians will include Joseph Arndt (organ), Meray Boustani (soprano), and others from the Dallas area.
