A Note From The Pastor August 2020

This is my favorite time of year. The tomatoes are ripe, the sweet corn is ready to be picked, peaches are sweet and juicy. A good ripe tomato right off the vine is my most favorite food. When I was a kid my dad had a truck patch. He raised rows of sweet corn, hundreds of tomatoe plants, acres of green beans, and about everything else people would buy. While working in that truck patch I began to pick ripe tomatoes for eating. I still love to get a ripe tomato and just bite Tomatoes tasted so good picking them and eating them right off the into it. plant, that once I thought I would do the same thing with sweet corn. One morning when I was about 10 or 11, I pulled an ear off the plant, shucked it right there in the row, and chomped on it till the kernels had all disappeared. The corn tasted fantastic and I thought I had really discovered something good until that evening. Then, I remembered my dad ate tomatoes in the field (he carried a salt shaker in his back pocket), along with onions, bell peppers, green beans, peas, and most of the plants, but I could not recall seeing him eat corn off the stalk. Guess I should have realized that one day earlier.

I like this time of year for other reasons also. I like being in the water. Does not matter if it is a pool, river, creek, or the lake. I like hot weather. Heat does not bother me until the heat index gets to about 105 or so. But even then, if I can get in the water, I'm good.

One thing I really enjoy about the time of year is the fullness of the vegetation all around us. Everything is at its peak of growing. The field corn and soybeans are still full and have not started to dry up for fall. The tree's canopies are filled out. Gale's flowers are at their peak. Despite the heat, or maybe because of it, the green of God's creation is at its peak now in this area. Sometimes we take the beauty of God's earth around us for granted. We see it every year and it becomes common to us. A young man in DJ and Kristen's wedding was raised in desserts all of his life. When he came here, he was excited like a kid on Christmas. He just kept saying, "green, green everything is green!" and jumping up and down as he said it. That went on for 3 days. It reminded us that we live in a beautiful part of God's creation.

As I sit here writing this letter, I quickly counted 11 different species of trees that I can see through our window. I also see all of Gale's flowers. Some are taller than she, some are tiny in pots, all different shapes and colors.

Each one of the plants tells a story from the large oaks and poplars to the petunias and the little red things (I don't have a clue what they are called.) Each of them tells a story about the magnificent mind of the Creator. Who among us could design a flower? Or figure out how to make an oak tree from an acorn. Or to make acorns to also feed deer, squirrels, chipmunks and other creatures? We, as humans, have figured out how to modify some plants and animals, but we have never been able to create one from nothing. Only our loving God of grace and glory has been able to create the beauty that surrounds us. During this time of the fullness of the vegetation around us, take time to marvel at the work of our Creator God. To think about the majesty of the mind that can design the mighty oak and the blade of grass. And even greater is how they all work together to meet our needs of food, shelter, clean air, drinking water, and all the rest. Remember, God didn't need this world. He made it for you! So, when you see the flower in the pot, thank God. When you see the crops in the fields, thank God. When you enjoy the vegetables and fruits of this season, thank God. In everything give thanks.

<u>Grant</u> – George Petit will meet with a group (to be formed) to lay out our vision and match what plan we need and equipment to order for our audio/video program. George will prepare a proposal. Brent Lacy will be contacted also to get a proposal to present to the board.

<u>Church Bus</u> – The Air Conditioner cannot be installed on the roof of the bus. The wiring is the problem. The wires were cut instead of unplugging. We have not heard back from the repair company. Alex Milligan will call to try to get an update.

Parsonage – We need to start thinking now if we want to rent the parsonage before winter starts. Topics that were discussed: Renting; Selling; moving the clothes closet, a place for youth to meet. It was decided to get 2 appraisals. Alex Milligan will contact Jerry McMullen for an appraisal. Also discussed was moving the clothes closet to the Nursery for more space.

<u>Church Activities and Ministries --</u> Celebrate Recovery, Rock Painting, Clothes Closet, Food Pantry, have opened. All with social distancing and sanitizing. The Clothes Closet will limit number of people at one time and must wear a mask.

Children's Church will begin July 12th; Bible Study will begin July 26th @ 7:00 p.m.

Merideth reported, around the first of August "The Crew" Sunday school class will resume. Annual Conference is August 15th. Pastor Deb Moore-Hardin will be ordained at this conference.

<u>**Treasure Report</u>** – Correction from last meeting: All accounts have not been transferred to First Financial Bank. 941 has been filed and transferred automatic payments to First Financial Bank. The Old National Bank account is still open to make sure everything has cleared.</u>




