LBIM: A Heritage and A Hope

The Church of the Lutheran Brethren has always been a Church compelled by the love of Christ to share the gospel; a Church called to make disciples of all nations. This is evidenced through our heritage of mission. When the CLB was founded in December of 1900, the then small fledgling synod of only five congregations committed immediately to send missionaries to China. A



short time later, Reinholt and Juline Kilen were boat to China. More on а missionaries followed, not only to China, but to Chad, Cameroon, Japan, and Taiwan. To say that these pioneer missionaries experienced hardship is an understatement. Some were martyred. Some died of tropical illness or accident. Some were held as hostages and

threatened with execution. They persevered through pandemics, the Great Depression, two World Wars, spiritual and physical attack, loneliness, burnout, depression, and other hardships. Was it worth it?

Yes! As a result, the Church of the Lutheran Brethren is now a diverse yet unified body of believers hailing from all these corners of the globe. This heritage is a testimony of a faithful missionary God working through faithful missionary people. Praise God!

Yet there is a task remaining. And yes, there are still risks and dangers to sending missionaries internationally. We take risk management seriously. But our mission remains driven by the conviction that peoples and places that do not have access to the gospel in their cultural and linguistic context are worth the risk and effort it takes to bring the Word to them. As Romans 10:14a points out: "*How, then can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard*"?

And so, the CLB continues to be a Church compelled by the Great Commissioner, Jesus Christ himself, who called us to "go and make disciples of all nations..." (Matt. 28:19). He told us: "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field" (Luke 10:2).

The harvest is still plentiful. There are billions of people in the world who remain without access to the gospel message. And the workers are still few. Only 1 out of 10 cross-cultural missionaries are engaging the unreached peoples of the world. But that is our mission. So we are asking the Lord of the Harvest for more workers...

What about you? We are praying for more missionaries for both our African and Asian fields. For "...how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent?" (Romans 10:14b, 15a) Will you go? Will you send?
