People forget the things you say

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It's that time again. Time to nominate and elect leaders.

"If nobody is following, you're not leading." Most people don't want to lead, but they don't want to follow either. They may want to influence decisions, they may want everyone to do things their way, and they may even want to make up the rules by which everyone else has to play; but if asked point blank about leading, they would be quick to point out that they don't want to be the leader.

John Maxwell wrote a book titled, "The 21 Irrefutable Laws of Leadership." The subtitle was "Follow them, and People will follow you." I am not alone in my opinion that Jesus is the master leader (There are currently 8 new books on leadership that identify Jesus as the one to emulate). His call to follow has been accepted by millions, which affirms his place as master leader. Yet, when Jesus ascended into heaven, he did not leave a leadership vacuum in the Church.

He had developed leaders and had given them the vision of making disciples. Effective church leadership can only be carried out by people who follow Jesus. Who else will be interested in making disciples? Effective church leaders are not people who simply duplicate Jesus' methods, but people who are sold out on following Jesus. When people respect someone as a person, they admire him. When they respect someone as a friend, they love him. When they respect someone as a leader, they follow him. The 11 disciples of Jesus who were given the commission to make disciples, made disciples who followed Jesus just as they did themselves. Jesus is still the head of his church, he is still leading; and everyone else is following.

So why don't people in the church aspire to church leadership? Perhaps, deep down, they know that leadership in the Church involves a towel to clean dirty feet. It's a job no one really wants to do; but it is one Jesus was willing to do himself. Church leadership should never be viewed as a position of power, but one of time consuming, resource depleting service. It takes godly character, spiritual strength, and a willingness to be set apart as an example for others. It is not about representation, but about evangelization.

I want you to be praying for those who are willing to accept nomination for leadership in our congregation; and I want you to become more familiar with biblical leadership. One way to do this is by reading your Bible, the other is by joining us on Sunday mornings during September.



A Deacon is elected for a term of 1 year but may continue by nomination for an additional onevear term for a maximum of three consecutive years. A MAC is for a term on 1 year but renewable by nomination each year.
