

From Senior Warden Jim Hicks - Update on the New Rector Search Process



The search process for a new rector in an Episcopal church can at times seem frustrating and confusing to the person in the pew. Why can't we just get a new priest in here in a month or two and get on with it? After all, when someone quits their job at work, we usually find a replacement in two or three weeks. Can it be that much more complicated at church?

Well yes, it can be. People invest a lot of spiritual energy into their lives at church. Having a priest who is able to relate to parishioners on their spiritual journey is important to the health and growth of a parish community. The search

process is designed to assist parishes to find a good match for the needs of their community. At Saint John's Church, the long process of self-reflection and study, culminating with the results of the Holy Cow! Survey, led to the preparation of a Parish Profile – a detailed narrative statement of what our parish represents and treasures. I encourage you to view the profile on our website: sjtulsa.org (under the Rector Search tab).

This process was delayed by the COVID-19 pandemic and the change in leadership at the Diocese of Oklahoma. The Reverend Canon Eric Cooter, Canon to the Ordinary, began his duties on July 1 but has already met with the Vestry and is now accepting applications for the position of rector in our parish. The Diocese of Oklahoma will make an initial review of candidates, screening for overall appropriateness to the parish and conducting initial diocesan reference checks. Once interested candidates have been vetted, their names are forwarded to the Vestry near the first of September. The search process will then take the following shape, infused with humility and prayer:

The Search Committee's work begins with assessing the candidates:

- a. Review all candidate materials.
- b. Send questions to the candidates to assess how they communicate in writing. Questions should be about four in number and related to the values found in the self-study.
- c. Personal reference checks.
- d. Review social media (Facebook, blogs, Twitter, online sermons, etc.).
- e. Conduct Skype or telephone interviews.
- f. Begin initial assessments and narrowing the candidate pool.

The work continues with the **selection of the candidates to receive visits** in their own parishes:

- g. When the Search Committee determines the candidates to receive visits in their own parishes, the Diocesan Transition Minister is notified right away.
- h. The Bishop makes a final "bishop-to-bishop" reference check.
- i. A formal background check is completed (and paid for) by Diocesan House (may take up to two weeks).
- j. Visits to the candidates' parishes for confidential review.

The Search Committee's role concludes with making a final candidate recommendation short list to the Vestry. At this point in the process, the Vestry's work includes the following actions:

The Vestry invites final candidates and spouse/family to visit the parish for an interview with the Vestry. It is suggested that in addition to a formal interview, the Vestry could host an informal meeting with the candidate(s) over dinner, possibly at a parishioner's home. It is suggested that the Vestry make arrangements for the candidate to tour the city and review housing options during this visit. If the candidate is not from this diocese, arrangements must be made for an interview with the Bishop during this visit. Candidates will not be asked to preach, celebrate, or meet with the general membership as a candidate for the open position during their visit to the parish.

The work of the Vestry concludes with **the decision**. After the final interviews, the Vestry will meet to prayerfully deliberate and discuss their impressions of the final candidate's visit. The Vestry should then elect the new rector. The wardens will then notify the Bishop of the Vestry's choice of their next Rector or Priest-in-Charge, and request in writing the Bishop's consent of the call.

There are many other factors for us to keep in mind through this entire process. Priests are people and professionals. They come in all shapes, sizes and vintages. Some, for their own reasons, will feel very ready for a change and are energized by what they see as a genuine opportunity to move on to a new pastoral challenge. Candidate spouses and family members also have a say in any decision to seek or accept a call at another church. For clergy, prayerful discernment in seeking God's call in the next season of ministry is essential and they, like the parish, evaluate the fit of the congregation for the spiritual gifts they have to offer, all in service to God and God's church.

And, the approach to some steps in a search process may be handled a bit differently or innovatively, depending upon the situation regarding the social distancing policy of the diocese at that moment in time and/or the status of the COVID-19 situation in our community.

May the Road Rise to Meet You

Last month, we caught up with Gil and Susan Sy for a socially distanced Zoom interview to learn a little bit more about them, their family and the couple's involvement in the life of Saint John's Church. Their journey begins with a plane, a Gideon and a quilter.

"He asked me some questions and gave me a trave-size reference copy of the Old Testament, the New Testament and the Psalms," said Gil. "If I had a question about something, I would be referred to specific scripture. It made an impact and encouraged Susan and me to find a church." They began attending Saint John's regularly and decided to stay.

Like many others, Gil and Susan choose to sit in the same pew most Sundays and attend the same service time. Before COVID-19, this was a seat near the northwest section of the nave and almost always for the later service. This allowed them to get to know their "pew neighbors," like Helen Jo and Jim Hardwick, and meet new friends across the aisle during the sharing of the Peace.



The Sys' daughter, Emily, is married to James and they live in Boston.

Flower Fellowship

In August we caught up by phone with Sadie Cole Gordon, A "little birdie" has told the church office about something kind she was doing in the Tulsa community. For those of you who do not know Sadie well, she started attending Saint John's Church three years ago and is involved with the flower committee. A lifelong Episcopalian, she is active in the Tulsa Garden Center and the Linneaus Teaching Garden, and had a clinical psychology practice in Joplin, prior to relocating to Grand Lake several years ago. She moved to Tulsa in 2017. As a Master Gardener, she is additionally an accomplished floral designer and, prior to COVID-19, she was about to launch her own small part-time business in that field.



We asked Sadie if we could share this story, and while she admitted that she had ordinarily shied away from sharing personal activities, this year is different. Sadie said what many are feeling right now: "Our connections with our fellow parishioners are very real and when we cannot come together, it is easy to forget how precious those relationships are."

So about a month and a half ago, Sadie joined a friend who attends Asbury United Methodist Church, and they began making flower arrangements to give away to people in need. Both ladies are taking advantage of their home gardens that are chock-full of wonderful blooming plants and meet, while social distancing, to create cheerful arrangements.

"We give the floral creations to neighbors, to shut-ins, and sometimes fellow parishioners," she

explained. "And, I would be delighted to add more Saint John's members who may have a special need."

If you know of a Saint John's Church member who is socially isolated or has a special need. please send Sadie an email at sadiegordon@att.net. She is happy to make a socially safe delivery to a front porch. She and her friend depend on free materials from their gardens and a few purchased florals to create the arrangements. She hopes to continue the project until the first northeastern Oklahoma freeze. She uses fresh herbs, cuttings from shrubs, small branches from ornamental trees, vines and grasses to create the arrangements. One of the many things Sadie has appreciated has been the growing friendships with other flower committee team members, including Daphne Wise, Anne Burlingame and Betsy Hocker. After teaching two workshops on floral design for the flower committee team, Sadie said she was very impressed by the outstanding talent and dedication in the group. "Each of the committee members brings their special skills and love of nature to help enhance the worship services with their beautiful arrangements," she said.

"I consider it an honor to work with them." Sadie believes people who have an affinity for flowers and garden materials have a common and special bond. "I call it Flower Fellowship".

Bill Chevaillier: Treasurer's Report

My treasurer's report through July of 2020 reflects financials that are similar to the previous month.

Our total income through July was approximately \$626,000. Our expenses were approximately \$670,000, which includes an investment of \$35,000 in our Media Ministry. The Finance Committee and Vestry have agreed that the funding for our Media Ministry will come from our Outreach Fund and not from the operating funds.

In addition, the Finance Committee met earlier this week and approved a budget for the remainder of this year. The revised budget will be presented to the Vestry later this month. Based on our remaining expenses, we will need to draw funds from our endowment to help supplement the operating revenue. When we presented the original budget to the parish earlier this year, we anticipated a shortfall. Fortunately, this shortfall is less than what was presented then. I will be glad to furnish the budget upon request. You are welcome to send an email to me at wcc@mychev.com and I will forward you the revised budget.

As I said last month, although we have had a strong commitment from everyone, it is important that we continue this financial commitment through the remainder of the year.



On the Question of Opening the Church

We are concerned and do not recommend opening the church at this time. Among the many reasons for concern for the health and well-being of our parishioners of all ages, are the following:

Even though the four- and seven-day rolling averages of COVID-19 cases in Tulsa are falling at this time, this can change rapidly. We are dealing with widespread community incidence in Tulsa. The risk of contracting the virus remains very high.

This virus is especially difficult to deal with because of its very high infectivity rate and high mortality in the high-risk groups, even with the improvements learned from recent experience. In addition, the large numbers up to 40 percent of asymptomatic carriers (which is highly unusual) further increases the infective rate. Another major problem is the turnaround time for testing, which frequently has been in the five- to seven-day range in Tulsa. This makes contact tracing more difficult, increasing the risk of asymptomatic carriers infecting many others. As some schools open, there is a concern by health professionals that there will be a significant increase in the number of cases.

Robert Redfield, M.D., Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), said in mid-August that he was concerned that we could have a healthcare catastrophe like we have never seen before in the fall when people are inside more and the previous flu season returns.

Another important benchmark to follow is the percent positivity rate of the test. Some parts of the country have percent positivity rates of 1 percent for COVID-19 testing (one in one-hundred tested are infected). However, the Tulsa Department of Health reports rates in the 15-20 percent range recently. This indicates a high level of infection in our community. Masks are very important. But no masks (still seen often in our city) still allow approximately 30 percent of previous levels of infectivity.

We know in the meantime our church is working hard to provide virtual services for us, including helping resolve challenges for those who have difficulties with technology or other issues. We know all of us are working to do what we can.

Our church's Advisory Committee is also working hard to develop a plan to meet the safety guidelines of the Diocese of Oklahoma, the CDC, and the Tulsa Health Department for the time when we can make a decision to open.

Calling Ministry to Parishioners Continues

The project to call parishioners regularly and "check in" was initiated last spring by the staff and vestry of the church when we had to close the building due to the pandemic. A new ministry has grown out of that effort and continues this fall with old and new volunteers. The Let's Connect by Phone Ministry is committed to calling Saint John's Church parishioners during this continuing extraordinary time of COVID-19 social distancing. Fourteen dedicated callers are the link to help our parishioners understand that the church is open, even if the building is currently closed.

Callers are in touch with their list of parishioners once a month to see how they are doing, if they have questions, and if they have any requests (prayers, clergy contact, illnesses, family concerns, etc.) And, volunteer Mary Hammons is writing personal notes to a specific list of thirty parishioners selected by Mother Susanne (some are homebound and some we only have their addresses as a way to contact them). Our callers cannot ring congregants up from the church office, so some calls may come up on a home or mobile phone with an unknown caller ID. In the case that the parishioner does not answer the phone, the callers will also try to text the parishioner. They may also try to send an email if they are not able to connect via a phone number.

Living Discipleship by Exploring the Bible

A new course, *Living Discipleship: Exploring the Bible*, will be offered on Sundays during the academic year 2020-2021. This is a journey through the scriptures, from Genesis to Revelation. We will look at narratives in the Bible to see the great story of God's love from the beginning of creation, through the life of Jesus Christ, and in our own time guided by the Holy Spirit.

You may use either your own Bible and read the scripture for each Sunday or you can purchase the companion book, *The Path: A Journey Through the Bible*, available from Forward Movement or from Amazon, which includes commentary and questions. *The Path* presents excerpts from the Bible that cover most of the "greatest hits" from the Bible story. It is intended to give you an idea of the overarching narrative, the sweeping story of God's great love for us.



- 6. From the Rector Rally Day, usually held in September, will be postponed until the late winter or early spring of 2021. We look forward to when we can all gather again, but at this time many of our outreach ministries are on hiatus and volunteers cannot "jump in" and serve (this applies to groups such as luncheon teams, meals for the Day Center, Sunday school teaching, etc.). Getting to Know Us!



This month's staff Q&A is with a non-official personnel member, but someone who has been a key team member keeping all our worship services fully staffed: Father Justin Boyd. Serving in the capacity of supply priest and often present for Morning or Evening Prayer, Fr. Boyd has stepped up when our clergy needed to be out for personal time this year, and we are very appreciative. We hope you have fun getting to know him a bit better from this interview in late August.

Q: Hey Father Boyd, tell us a bit about your family. A: I am married to my amazing wife, Carmen. We will be celebrating our tenth anniversary on September 4. We have a nine-year-old son, Aidan. He is a fourth grader at Holland Hall. We have three labs and a cat. My father is a retired Episcopal priest, and my mother is a retired music teacher. Many of you likely know my mom, Jackie (Boyd) Saylor. She has filled in on the organ bench several times at Saint John's Church over the years.

Q: I believe you called Tulsa your hometown. Where did you go to school and what did you study? A: I went to Holland Hall School and graduated from Memorial High School. Next, I attended Oklahoma City University, where I studied opera performance and musical theatre. I graduated from the University of Tulsa with my bachelor's degree in musical theater in 2006.

Q: When did you feel a call on your heart to ministry? A: I first felt the Spirit leading me to my vocation at the age of thirteen. I did my absolute best to ignore it, and ran as fast and far away as I could. Well, we all know how that normally works out! I attended The Episcopal Seminary of the Southwest, in Austin, Texas. I graduated in 2016, receiving my Master of Divinity, with a concentration in Hispanic church studies.

Q: I recall that you are an accomplished quartet singer and helped found a Tulsa singing group. Is that group still performing? A: I am a classically trained singer and a member of the original cast of Forever Plaid, here in Tulsa. We began in July of 1995 and planned on doing eight shows. Due to popular demand, we extended the run. We are still singing together! We do occasional gigs for fundraisers and small parties. One of my favorite places we have done the show is the Coleman Theatre, in Miami, Oklahoma. If you have never been there, I highly recommend a day trip to check it out.

Q: What's something about you that might interest your fellow clergy or Saint John's congregants to learn about you? A: In 1991 the Archbishop of Canterbury came to Tulsa. He celebrated a service at Trinity Church. I was asked to be the crucifer for the service. I still count this experience as one of the greatest of my life.

Q: Is there a particular scripture passage that you have found helpful during our time of social distancing?

A: I have not had a particular passage jump out at me during the pandemic. What has been extremely profound is doing the Daily Office throughout the week. It is such an amazing way to start the day.

Q: We heard you "geek" theology. What great theology books or authors would you recommend? A: Anything from Brené Brown or C.S. Lewis. Lewis' *Mere Christianity* helped change my spiritual path. Another is my friend Bill Miller. He wrote, *The Gospel According to Sam*, and my all-time favorite, *The Beer Drinker's Guide to God*. It takes the reader on a spiritual journey of ordinary times and places. It is deeply profound.
