

Beginning the Journey With Love

Micah 6:8~ *"He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"*

The prophet Micah was a very young man of modest means from a rural town in the Southern Kingdom of Judah. God gave him prophetic words to speak to the elite city dwellers in Judea and the Northern Kingdom of Israel. What an audacious position for this young prophet. Though he was an insider as a descendant within the 12 tribes of Israel, he was an unexpected voice from the margins speaking against corruption, idolatry, and other practices that hindered the common good. Micah rebukes unjust leaders and defends the rights of the poor against the powerful and wealthy as he speaks forth hope about a world at peace under the just leadership.

Throughout the Old Testament of our Bible, scripture exposes historic misbehaviors among people in the mistreatment and/or neglect of vulnerable populations; addresses abuses of power and privilege and warns of the consequences of departing from God's guidance. Television dramas pale in comparison to the lived experiences the Old Testament offers. With destruction looming because of rampant disobedience among the people, Micah spoke God's warnings and redirected the people to a simple message that applies today.

I encourage you to take the time to carefully read the whole Book of Micah. Particularly, Micah 6:8 states, "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"

Let's not sugar-coat the conditions of this day. Our world is a hairball of tangled conditions accumulated over generations that are killing generations. Because of the layers and tangles, underlying conditions at the core of this massive mess are covered with active threads carefully interwoven to maintain the shape of things present. But we have the blessed opportunity to help shape things to come. This is Micah's point! Regardless of what has been or what is, the LORD simply requires that <u>we</u> do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with our God.

What God requires is not complicated. However, it will take courage and intentional effort to cut through and see to the core of our global, local, and even personal co-

nundrums. In 2020, our world has been slowed so we may more clearly see our reality. If we are not willing to *see--*to identify and acknowledge--problems (and there are many with human-created complexities), we cannot/will not pursue effective remedies.

While economic, educational, housing and healthcare disparities, profiling, inequitable sentencing, and other injustices may not seem to be *your* issue, you *are* impacted by the diminished progresses we could already have made and the hindrance of present structures to possibilities ahead. God has far greater plans for this world than what we have experienced or imagined so far. There is a marvelous journey ahead if we will simply do what our God requires of us. In September, the Mountain Sky Conference of the United Methodist Church will begin a *Pilgrimage to the Land of Love*. **Please visit mtnskyumc.org/pilgrimage for full details and to join the journey**. This is not limited to United Methodists; all are welcome. I pray that you will join me and invite others to the journey as we pray, watch/read/listen and reflect daily, dialogue weekly (Sun 6pm) and do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with God in all aspects of our being. I look forward to our pilgrimage together. For the changes to come within us and among us, to God be the glory!

Who is My Neighbor?

Children's Books for Discussion of Race and Inequality at Home

It is back-to-school time once again! Whether your family is starting the year in person at school, in a virtual classroom, or in home school, we are all likely in for an eventful year full of growth opportunities. We will continue to experience some different ways of doing things as we all work to keep ourselves and our neighbors safe during a global pandemic.

Ruby Bridges also had an unusual backto-school experience when she started the first grade. Ruby was the first Black child to attend the William Frantz Public School in New Orleans, LA in 1961.

This Month's Book: *Ruby Bridges Goes to School by Ruby Bridges* is available in the Salt Lake County Library system

Summary: Ruby writes in simple language (this is a Scholastic Level 2 reader) about her memories of her experience as a pioneer of elementary school desegregation in 1961. Instead of illustrations, the book includes photographs from the 1960s that bring Ruby's world to life on the page. She describes the realities of segregation plainly. Eventually, people came to see segregation as wrong and looked for ways to bring Black and white students together in school. Ruby recalls her first day at the Frantz School, and how US Marshals escorted her and her mother to the school building for safety. Many men and women in Ruby's town were unhappy that she was allowed to attend the school and protested, yelled at Ruby, and kept their children at home. Over time, they came to accept Ruby as part of the school community and the other children returned to class. Ruby discusses some ways her story has been shared with many over the years, and ends with a positive message. She says that when she tells her story to children, she likes to remind them to be kind to each other.

What Do The Kids Think?

Heidi- "I like that Ruby is telling her own story."

Clark- "I like that Ruby tells kids to be kind to each other."

Questions for Reflection and Discussion

1. Have you ever started classes at a new school? What did it feel like when you were the "new kid?" What do you think it felt like for Ruby to be the only Black girl in a school where not everyone wanted her to attend?

2. Do you have friends at school from different countries or with a different skin color than yours? What have you learned from your friends that you might not have known otherwise?

I am inviting all the laity and clergy of the Mountain Sky Conference to join me and others across our area on a pilgrimage. You don't need to leave home for it. All you need to do is set aside some time each day so that together, we can take a Pilgrimage to the Land of Love.

We stand at an important moment as we are brought to a deeper awareness of the high price of racism. We are seeing the toll it takes on persons of color and how racism defiles the beautiful image of God each person possesses. As disciples of Jesus, it is time for us to address this, first by beginning with ourselves.

It is written in Psalm 139:

Investigate my life, O God, find out everything about me; Cross-examine and test me, get a clear picture of what I'm about; See for yourself whether I've done anything wrong — then guide me on the road to eternal life.

For me, the imperative to doing an inward inventory of not only the ways I sustain racist systems and structures, but the ways I benefit from them and especially how I, too, am a racist, even unwittingly, is a demand of discipleship: I follow a Jesus who was a boundary crosser, exposing racist, sexist, classist ideologies and commanding us to overturn them by calling us to increase our love of God and neighbor. Not some of our neighbors. But everyone in every place on this earth.

Undergirded by the power of scripture, we will hear songs of struggle, read prophetic words, and view powerful videos. These will help us broader our worldview as we hear the voices and experiences of others. Together, we will share insights and new learnings and integrate these into our daily walk with Jesus. And then, we will allow ourselves to be led by the Holy Spirit to a Land of Love.

I hope you will join me on this pilgrimage.

We Were Made For These Times

The following has been a very important reading in my life in times when I am discouraged, when I wonder what positive effect I could possibly be having. I'm not exactly sure when it was written, maybe a decade ago, but it couldn't be stated better than what Clarissa Pinkola Estes has said (shortened a bit here). Read about her life, too. She has something to say. -RNS

My friends, do not lose heart. We were made for these times. I have heard from so many recently who are deeply and properly bewildered. They are concerned about the state of affairs in our world now. Ours is a time of almost daily astonishment and often righteous rage over the latest degradations of what matters most to civilized, visionary people.

You are right in your assessments. The lustre and hubris some have aspired to while endorsing acts so heinous against children, elders, everyday people, the poor, the unguarded, the helpless, is breathtaking. Yet, I urge you, ask you, gentle you, to please not spend your spirit dry by bewailing these difficult times. Especially do not lose hope. Most particularly because, the fact is that we were made for these times. Yes. For years, we have been learning, practicing, been in training for and just waiting to meet on this exact plain of engagement. ...

... In any dark time, there is a tendency to veer toward fainting over how much is

wrong or unmended in the world. Do not focus on that. There is a tendency, too, to fall into being weakened by dwelling on what is outside your reach, by what cannot yet be. Do not focus there. That is spending the wind without raising the sails.

We are needed, that is all we can know. And though we meet resistance, we more so will meet great souls who will hail us, love us and guide us, and we will know them when they appear. Didn't you say you were a believer? Didn't you say you pledged to listen to a voice greater? Didn't you ask for grace? Don't you remember that to be in grace means to submit to the voice greater?

Ours is not the task of fixing the entire world all at once, but of stretching out to mend the part of the world that is within our reach. Any small, calm thing that one soul can do to help another soul, to assist some portion of this poor suffering world, will help immensely. It is not given to us to know which acts or by whom, will cause the critical mass to tip toward an enduring good.

What is needed for dramatic change is an accumulation of acts, adding, adding to, adding more, continuing. We know that it does not take everyone on Earth to bring justice and peace, but only a small, determined group who will not give up during the first, second, or hundredth gale.

One of the most calming and powerful actions you can do to intervene in a stormy world is to stand up and show your soul. Soul on deck shines like gold in dark times. The light of the soul throws sparks, can send up flares, builds signal fires, causes proper matters to catch fire. To display the lantern of soul in shadowy times like these - to be fierce and to show mercy toward others; both are acts of immense bravery and greatest necessity.

Struggling souls catch light from other souls who are fully lit and willing to show it. If you would help to calm the tumult, this is one of the strongest things you can do.

There will always be times when you feel discouraged. I too have felt despair many times in my life, but I do not keep a chair for it. I will not entertain it. It is not allowed to eat from my plate.

The reason is this: In my uttermost bones I know something, as do you. It is that there can be no despair when you remember why you came to Earth, who you serve, and who sent you here. The good words we say and the good deeds we do are not ours. They are the words and deeds of the One who brought us here. In that spirit, I hope you will write this on your wall: When a great ship is in harbor and moored, it is safe, there can be no doubt. But that is not what great ships are built for.
