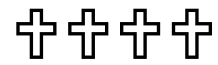

Funeral Planning

We are assured of eternal life through faith in Jesus Christ. Therefore, we are able to face the time when we die. Aware of the fact that day will one day come, this booklet is intended to serve as a guide for the family and the pastor as they plan the funeral service. – Pastor Tom

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What will take place when I meet with the Funeral Director?

Prior to meeting with the funeral home, please contact the church first for verification of funeral date, time and Pastor's availability.

The director will meet with the family and establish the wishes of the family and the loved one. You will be asked to bring information such as a social security number, insurance information, and information on the loved one's date of birth, place of birth, names of parents, siblings, and a list of survivors.

You will be asked to consider the number of death certificates. These must be certified copies from the clerk's office of the municipality where the deceased passed. (Photocopies are not accepted). At the time of this document's creation, the current charge for death certificates is \$10.00 at all clerk's offices in the State of New York. These certificates must be presented to the bank, mortgage company, insurance company, social security, and any other institution. We usually recommend a dozen.

You will be asked about what you would like printed for the obituary and death notice. Each newspaper will have different guidelines and charge differently. For example, the Niagara Gazette and the Lockport Union Sun & Journal charge per word. The Buffalo News charges per line. In all three newspapers, a photo is an additional charge.

When arranging for a cremation, the authorization to cremate must be signed by the next closest relative to the deceased. Example: spouse, parent, child, sibling, and so forth.

Every funeral home is required by law to present to each family when making funeral arrangements their General Price List. This shows how much they charge for every item offered to a family and is required by law.

Additional information

If the person dies in a hospital, NYS law requires that the body will not be released to a funeral home until Connect Life, formerly known as UNYTS (*Upstate New York Transplant Services*) has a chance to contact the next of kin and ask them for permission for the loved one to be an organ/tissue donor. If the family consents, the deceased is transported to a facility in Buffalo for the procurement. If the family declines for their loved one to be a donor, Connect Life will notify the hospital to release the deceased to the funeral home.

There is no law that requires the deceased to be embalmed. HOWEVER, if there is going to be an open casket viewing or visitation, the funeral home most likely will require it.

Non-Member Funeral Policy

St. Peter's has the heart to serve the community, including at the time of death, and opens its doors to be used in those times. To help us facilitate this for those who are not a member of St. Peter's, we suggest a donation of \$350. This donation helps us cover costs related to the use of the Organist, Administrative and Pastoral services.

The final decision to host the funeral is decided by the Pastor and the Elders of the church.

Music for the Service

St. Peter's Worship and Music Director has right of first refusal, which means that if an organist is requested besides him, you must speak to him directly and ask permission. The church has approved a bench fee currently of \$100.00 to be paid directly to him. This rule applies to members and non-members.

Prelude Music

The prelude music helps to prepare mourners for the service to follow. Music with special meaning to the deceased or family members may be selected; consider favorite hymn tunes for preludes. Our Music Director is available to provide guidance in musical selection.

Hymns

Procession into the church

A hymn of comfort, baptismal remembrance, or resurrection hope is appropriate.

Hymn following the sermon

A hymn that carries forth the images of the readings and sermon or is reflective of the life of faith of the deceased is appropriate.

Recession out of the church

A final hymn may be sung as the coffin is carried from the church, usually one of resurrection hope. It is appropriate for the recession to simply be accompanied by an instrumental musical selection.

Soloists

It is appropriate for special music to be provided by soloists or other instrumentalists. Fees will be determined by the musician and paid directly to the musician.

Organist Fee

For members, there is no fee. A gift is welcome to be given directly to the Music Director. For non-members, please see non-member policy.

Funeral Luncheon or Reception

For members, a luncheon or a reception following the service is welcome and encouraged. Traditionally, at St. Peter's, the luncheon is hosted by volunteers of the church and families of the church who donate food items. It is encouraged in larger funerals (over 100) and families who are largely from out of town, for them to help cater some food items to have enough for all attending.

The coordinator for the funeral luncheons will contact the family directly and ask for an estimated number of people. A suggested figure would be to the number of family plus 30 people for the luncheon. This number will also be used for bulletin printing.

For non-members, the luncheon or reception shall be arranged off site on their own. If the desire of the family is for the pastor to attend, an invitation should be extended to him.

Romans 14:8 “For if we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord. So then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord’s.”

1 Corinthians 15:20-23 “But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. But each in his own order: Christ the first fruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ.”

1 Corinthians 15:54-57 “When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written: ‘Death is swallowed up in victory.’ ‘O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?’ The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.”

2 Corinthians 5:6-8 “So we are always of good courage. We know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. Yes, we are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord.”

2 Corinthians 7:10 “Godly sorrow brings repentance that leads to salvation and leaves no regret, but worldly sorrow brings death.”

For in the day of trouble he will keep me safe in his dwelling; he will hide me in the shelter of his sacred tent and set me high upon a rock.”

Psalm 30:5 “For His anger is but for a moment, His favor is for life; weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning.”

Common Questions During Funeral Planning

What do we do when a doctor or nurse tells us our family member is near death?

When death draws near, contact the pastor that they may extend the ministry of the church.

What do we do when our family member dies?

When death comes, contact the church immediately. So that we may best assist you during this difficult time, we ask that you contact the church before arrangements are made with a funeral home.

Who do we have to talk to in order to set a funeral date?

The pastor will schedule the funeral in consultation with funeral director, availability of the building and pastor's calendar. Speak with the pastor before confirming a time or date with a funeral director.

Calling Hour/visitation details

Traditionally in this area, the visitation is called 'calling hour' which is held at the funeral home and may be held at the church prior to the service. If the calling hour is held at the funeral home, the tradition is that the pastor will come at the end of the calling hour and offer a time of prayer for the family and friends who are there. If held at the church prior to service, the pastor will hold a time of prayer while the funeral director and staff prepare the casket to go into the funeral service.

Memorial service details

If a memorial service is planned (no body present), it is the responsibility of the family to handle the flower arrangements, set up the guest book, and memorial envelopes, and serve as ushers. If held at the church bulletins, will be arranged by the church.

In the absence of a body, furniture is arranged near the chancel to hold an urn and/or a picture of the deceased, along with an arrangement of flowers. A symbol of the faith of the deceased may also be provided – a well-worn Bible, for example.

Should the body or ashes be present at the funeral?

The presence of the body or cremated remains is always encouraged. The church honors the body that was the temple of the Holy Spirit and insists that the body be treated with reverence. The service may be used as a memorial service following interment or when the body has been destroyed in an accident or natural catastrophe. A visitation may be held in the church sanctuary or meeting room immediately before the funeral. During the visitation, the coffin may be left open. It may remain open in the side entrance or church meeting room as guests arrive for the service. Shortly before the service begins the family makes their last visit to the coffin. While they are preparing for the service with the pastor, funeral home staff members close the coffin and prepare it for the service. The coffin remains closed for the service and is not opened again. A white pall may be placed over the coffin to recall the white robe given in Baptism, the robe of Christ's righteousness.

What about Holy Communion?

At this time, the church does not serve Holy Communion during the funeral service.

How can family members participate in the service?

Family members or friends are always encouraged to participate in the service as scripture readers, to special music, pallbearers, etc. Family and friends may also wish to offer a remembrance or tribute also called a Eulogy. We recommend no more than one person do the Eulogy and ask that thoughts be written down in advance. Someone may accompany them if desired. We ask that it be kept to three minutes. Spontaneous comments are not recommended. Additional tributes may be done during the luncheon after the service if you have chosen to have one.

What about a video tribute?

Families may wish to create a video tribute to be shown before or after the service. The video may be made available in the side entrance before the service and/or can be shown during the luncheon after the service.

What about lunch or a reception?

A luncheon or a reception following the service is welcome and encouraged. Traditionally at St. Peter's, the luncheon is hosted by volunteers of the church and families of the church who donate items. It is

encouraged in larger funerals (over 100) and families who are largely from out of town, for them to help cater some food items to have enough for all attending.

Military honors

Military honors occur outside the church, after the recession; or at the graveside after the benediction.

Club Honors

Club Honors occur outside the church, after the recession; or at the graveside after the benediction.

Memorials

Many families choose to designate preferences for memorial gifts. You may wish to designate memorials to St. Peter's Lutheran Church. Information about this option is available.

Bulletins

Bulletins outlining the service and containing information about the deceased will be made available at no cost for members of St. Peter's. Non-Members have a suggested donation to cover those costs.

Flowers

After the funeral, all flowers, potted plants or floral sprays may be taken to the grave site or taken by family members by prior arrangement.

Non-Members

Funerals may be held for non-members, please see non-member section in the guide.

Cemetery

Members of St. Peter's (including children under 18) have a right to a free plot at the time of death. Spouses, who are non-members, have up to 90 days to reserve a plot after the time of death with the Cemetery Committee. There is a fee. Details and policy regarding the cemetery may be found by contacting the Cemetery committee.

For Other Cemeteries

The pastor is happy to do a committal service at the plot and arrangements should be arranged directly with him at that time. If distance is further than 30 miles one way, the family should make arrangements for the pastor for travel.

According to NYS cemetery law, a single burial plot may include: (1) a single "full" burial meaning a casket. (2) A casket burial along with one container of ashes. (3) Two containers of ashes. HOWEVER, private church cemeteries may dictate something different.

Funeral Service Outline

At the entrance to the church:

The minister meets the coffin, the pallbearers, and the bereaved at the entrance to the church.

P Please turn to page 206 of the hymnal as we begin the service.

P Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the source of all mercy and the God of all consolation. He comforts us in all our sorrows so that we can comfort others in their sorrows with the consolation we ourselves have received from God.

C Thanks be to God.

A pall may be placed upon the coffin by the pallbearers or other assisting ministers, and the following may be said:

P When we were baptized in Christ Jesus, we were baptized into his death. We were buried therefore with him by Baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live a new life. For if we have been united by him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his.

Procession

Stand

The procession forms and enters the church, the ministers preceding the coffin.

A psalm, hymn or appropriate verse may be sung as the procession goes to the front of the church.

P Please stand as we begin with hymn.

Liturgy of the Word:

P The Lord be with you.

C And also with you.

P Let us pray.

P O God of grace and glory, we remember before you today our brother/sister, (Name _____). We thank you for giving him/her to us to know and to love as a companion in our pilgrimage on earth. In your boundless compassion, console us who mourn. Give us your aid, so we may see in death the gate to eternal life, that we may continue our course on earth in confidence until, by your call, we are reunited with those who have gone before us; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

C Amen

If Child:

P Oh God our Father, your beloved Son took children into his arms and blessed them. Give us grace, we pray, that we may entrust (Name _____) to your never-failing care and love, and bring us all to your heavenly kingdom; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

C Amen.

P You may be seated for the reading of the Lessons:

Lessons are now read.

Eulogy (if desired)

P Please stand for the reading of the Gospel.

Sermon

P Please stand for Hymn.

P Help us, we pray, in the midst of things we cannot understand, to believe and trust in the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, and the resurrection of life everlasting.

P Grant us grace to entrust (NAME _____) to your never-failing love which sustained *him/her* in *his/her* life. Receive *him/her* into the arms of your mercy and remember *him/her* according to your favor you bear for your people.

C Hear us, Lord.

P God of all grace, you sent your Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, to bring life and immortality to light. We give you thanks because by his death Jesus destroyed the power of death and his resurrection has opened the kingdom of heaven to all believers. Make us certain that because he lives we shall live also, and that neither death nor life, nor things present nor things to come shall be able to separate us from your love which is in Christ Jesus our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.
