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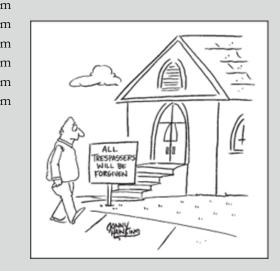

Zion Consistory Highlights

The October 2020 Consistory meeting was conducted in-person in the Zion Chapel and via Zoom.We've resumed in-person Sunday Worship Services in the Chapel. Social distancing and wearing of masks is enforced. Our Parish Nurse, Barb Hendershot, is present at the door asking people critical health questions and checking temperatures as they enter. Virtual viewing of our Sunday Services continues to be available.

At the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, we were mostly in reactionary mode — simply reacting to the new set of circumstances which seemed to be changing daily. More recently, it feels as though we are proactively preparing for what comes next. We've resumed in-person Worship Services in the Chapel on Sundays at 11 am, preceded by adult Sunday School at 9:45 am. Children's Sunday School will be held virtually at 9:45 on Sundays. Our plan is "written in pencil" and will be adjusted to reflect everchanging realities. As believers, we know that all our future plans are "Lord- willing". Safety measures implemented for in-person Sunday School and Sunday Worship Service will include temperature checks, answering of health screening questions upon arrival, wearing of masks, no touch greeting and ushering to seating that is 6 ft apart, limiting the number of people in the worship space at one time, elimination of handling of paper bulletins and hymn books, not passing offering plates, and providing hand sanitizing stations at the church entry point. Extra cleaning procedures will be performed before and after worship.

During the initial COVID-19 quarantine period, Zion experienced a steep learning curve as we initiated the broadcasting of Katie's (pre-recorded) Sunday Worship Services. Incorporating what we learned, we progressed to virtual streaming and incorporation of audiovisual components into our in-person Worship Services in the Chapel. The Consistory has voted approval for purchase and installation of projection screens and a confidence monitor in the Sanctuary. The Zion Tech Team is hard at work on the project. We continue to make progress on the Parking Lot Expansion Project. As review, in July 2019, Rich and Becky Owens purchased the old Christian Science Reading Room property located at 235 N. Potomac Street, with an Easement in Perpetuity Agreement in place granting Zion use of the rear aspect of the property for use as a parking lot. The Easement agreement specifies that Zion pays the parking lot construction costs, including costs associated with lowering the level of the terrain to that of existing Zion parking lot behind the Parsonage; including lowering of the existing sewer line to the Reading Room property and installation of a retaining wall and a City-mandated ADA complaint handicapped ramp with railing. Construction has been progressing and we're ready to commence with the asphalt installation and marking the lot. Completion of the project is in sight!!!

Cracks in the plaster of the Sanctuary walls was discovered in January. Assessment of the underlying cause of the cracks performed by a structural engineer revealed multiple problems, including stress fractures in the overhead trusses, deterioration of the bell tower masonry, water accumulation on the bell tower roof due to a poorly-located draink, and hidden gutter deterioration. We've embarked on a mission to repair these problems, which were allowing water to enter between the interior and exterior Sanctuary walls. The truss repairs have been completed and the masonry repairs are under way. We're obtaining bids to assess moving of the hatch and for the needed gutter repairs prior to performing the Sanctuary plaster repairs.

The Properties Committee has recommended that Zion work toward selling the Parsonage building and the Consistory has voted approval for the plan. We're pursuing approval from the City to subdivide the Parsonage property, which would enable us to sell the building separate from the rear lot and the driveways on either side.

Upon returning to Zion you'll notice some new faces! When you meet them, feel free to introduce yourself to our new Media Specialist, Michael Jones; and our new Administrative Assistant, Darlene Covington. Michael will be providing his skills and talent through a 6-month Covental agreement between Connections Six Eight UCC (previously Veritas) and Zion UCC. He will be helping us to achieve the transition to use of modern audiovisual media in the Sanctuary, streaming of our Worship Services, and management of our website and Social Media. Darlene has been hired through Manpower on a temp to perm basis. She will be manning the front desk and fulfilling Zion's administrative duties. In these unsettled times, it may be helpful to recall that we are not the first God- followers to enter uncharted territory. The Bible is replete with stories of people being called into lands they know not of. In such situations, we must take the next faithful step, trusting God's guidance and intervention.

Thank you for your ever-faithful encouragement and generous giving. We serve a living God, who continues to change lives. Please pray for our church, always remembering that you ARE the church.

Changing Numbers

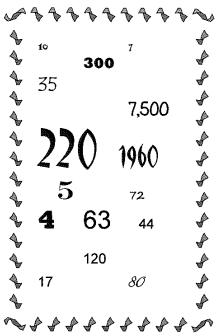
A Parish Nurse Note 2020

Change is a big part of our everyday life. There is now a "new math" for your health. A focus on numbers, especially steps per day, became popular in the 1960's when a Japanese pedometer called "Manpo-Kei" or 10,000 steps meter was made. That number was thought to be the most beneficial with regard to how many steps a healthy person needs to make in one day. However, a recent 2020 study by Brigham Young University found that people that walked 5,000 steps per day achieved as much benefit and weight loss as those that walked 10,000 steps. They also determined that the ideal number of daily steps for older women should be 7,500. But walking is not the sole method for staying healthy. Focus on getting 300 minutes of "sweat" activity per week; in other words- exercise, too. Stand, walk and sit less every hour and break your activities into smaller parts to help achieve your goals. It all adds up!

If you are middle aged or older, you lose about 3% of your muscle mass every year. Resistance training (using weights or stretchy bands to exercise) can help build and maintain muscle mass.

BMI, or body mass index, has been a staple for determining health for many years. A better measurement of your health is your waist size. The goal for men is less than a 40 inch waist and women should strive for a 35 inch waist. A waist to height ratio (WHtR) is the best measurement to use in determining your over all health. There are easy to use waist to height ratio calculators online.

And while we are focusing on new numbers, forget about target heart rates when exercising. Your maximum heart rate should be 220 minus your age. During moderate activity (70% of your maximum heart rate), you should be able to talk but not sing. At 85% of your maximum heart rate (a high intensity work out), you can only say a few words per breath. Also, focus less on your cholesterol numbers and more on your triglycerides; this fat in your blood should be 150 mg/dL or below. When your triglycerides are lower, your beneficial cholesterol (HDL) goes up.



Here are a few more target numbers- not necessarily new, but definitely helpful in staying healthy.

- ★ Shut off all electronic devices at least 30-45 minutes before going to bed.
- ★ Sit at least one minute less every hour than you do now.
- ★ 50% of your plate should be fruits and vegetables.
- ★ Wash you hands at least 20 seconds and do it often. (Believe it or not-this is not a new recommendation)
- ★ Keep you blood pressure at or below the new normal of 120/80.
- ★ Sleep 7 9 hours if you are 18-64 and 7-8 hours if you are over 65.

Keep these numbers in mind while living in our ever changing world. You will be healthier and feel better!

What you need:

- Seed pods, nuts pine cones
- Mixing bowl
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup salt
- 1 cup warm water
- Adult help

What you do:

- 1. Go on a nature walk and collect seeds with interesting textures.
- 2. In the bowl, mix flour and salt. Gradually add water. On a table, knead the dough. (If too dry, add more water; if too sticky, add more flour.)
- 3. Flatten a ball of dough and stamp impressions in it with the seeds.
- 4. If desired, bake for several hours at 150 degrees until dry and hard. Or, to reuse dough, store in an airtight container up to 6 months.

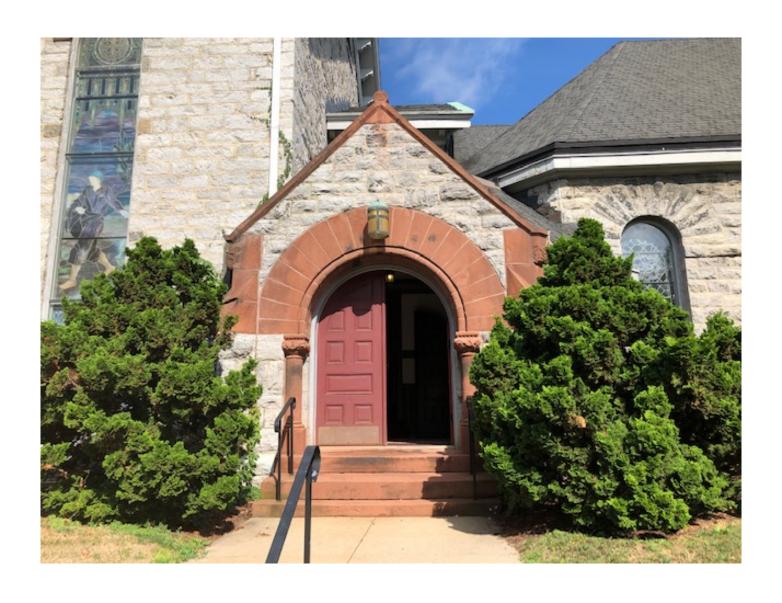
