THE FREEDOM OF GOD

It's no secret! I love to sit out in our sunroom early in the morning and watch the sunrise. It is a constantly changing phenomenon to watch as color begins to fill the sky. Psalm 135:5-7 declares, "For I know that the Lord is great and that our Lord is above all gods (great people). For instance, He is not free to change because, being perfect, any change could only bring about imperfection. God is also not free to sin because, as Scripture says, He hates sin. God is also not free to be unjust. That's something that should really hit home with us because it means He's not free to excuse sin, of which we are all participants.

Knowing, though, that God is free to do as He pleases is a wonderful truth. It's wonderful because we know that He was pleased to demonstrate His love toward us by giving His only Son to pay for our sins on the cross.
