Perhaps it's because this is the year I buried my dad. Perhaps it is everything at the same time.

Stillness. Quiet. Bareness. Icy chill. All of these seeping into my bones to slow me down and bring calm; to bring me to a standstill and force me to ask the question, "What really matters here?"

Then, in the silence, God speaks, and the chaos is overcome. God speaks, and light shines in the darkness. God speaks, the earth melts and the stones sing for joy. God speaks, and the kingdoms of this world tremble. God speaks, and life springs forth from the death(s) that surround us.

The voice of the Lord sounds, "Be still, and know that I am God. Wake up, O sleepers! Wake up! Really, what is important right now?" Images of the faces of real human beings flash before my eyes; people who are made in the image of God; people who are sinners forgiven and redeemed by Christ; people with whom I need to be reconciled; people with the same fears, struggles, burdens that I have.

What really is important here? Breathe deeply and listen for the voice of the Lord to speak.

The church council met for its monthly meeting on October 13th.

The opening discussion focused on the purchasing policy in place and the need for the policy. After a discussion of the current policy it was decided to table the matter and review the policy for possible changes.

The Finance committee reported that a grant from the Synod for Outreach had been applied for and we were awarded the grant and received a check for \$500.00. This grant will be used by the Technology committee to help fund much needed replacement equipment for our Sunday morning broadcasts. The council also approved increasing the current internet capacity to better stream the Sunday morning broadcasts as we now need to provide WIKB with a Facebook connection.

It was also discussed that help is needed to run the sound board on Sunday mornings. If you are willing to volunteer for this, please call the office. You do not need to be computer savvy. Training will be provided and you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you are helping bring the “Word” to those who cannot attend the service.

The property committee reported that the damaged garage door has been replaced and will be looking at replacing the second door. They also presented a “wish” list from the Men’s group and items will be reviewed as needed. It was also agreed to provide Plexiglass shields for the pulpit, lectern and soloist locations, to help protect from the spread of the Corona virus. Another bid for the roof replacement was received and we will be soliciting more.

The executive committee will be meeting to discuss the filling of the Administrative Assistant position. The discussion will center around the possibility of using volunteers or having a paid staff employee.

Jill Poulos has been volunteering her time to do this and has stated that she will “retire” from this position effective December 31st. Jill has spent countless hours over the past several months making sure that all of the things that needed to be done through the office have been done. We cannot thank Jill enough for her help and dedication. If you see Jill, give her a “virtual hug” and a thumbs up, just a way of saying THANKS.

Women's Bible Study

For anyone interested, I am starting a women's bible study as a weekly online Zoom. It would run on a weekday morning, likely Thursdays at 9 am. Start date not yet determined but thinking November 5th. In June, I joined a study with women from other denominations and the weekly meetings have enriched my life and deepened my relationships in our community with women I would not have ever spoken with to the depth that we do online. Online bible study anchors people together in a new and different, but needed way, and has helped me cope with the isolation of Covid. I feel many people are navigating waters without familiar navigation points these days, and this will only get harder in winter. This event is not an officially sanctioned event through First Lutheran, though Pastor DJ is aware of it and supports the idea.

We would start with the Book of Acts as I already have a series of scripted questions for each chapter. This would be a participatory study wherein participants would take turns reading aloud and then we would attempt together to answer the questions. Meetings would run approximately an hour, not longer than an hour and fifteen minutes. So, start at 9 and be done by 10:15 am.

Vision Quest: A Native American Perspective

“This moment humanity is going through can now be seen as a portal and as a hole.

The decision to fall into the hole or go through the portal is up to you. If you repent of the problem and consume the news 24 hours a day, with little energy, nervous all the time, with pessimism, you will fall into the hole. But, if you take this opportunity to look at yourself, rethink life and death, take care of yourself and others, you will cross the portal.

Take care of your homes, take care of your body. Connect with your spiritual House.

When you are taking care of yourselves, you are taking care of everything else. Do not lose the spiritual dimension of this crisis, have the eagle aspect, that form above, and see the whole; see more broadly. There is a social demand in this crisis, but there is also a spiritual demand, The two go hand in hand, Without the social dimension, we fall into fanaticism. But without the spiritual dimension, we fall into pessimism and lack of meaning.

You were prepared to go through this crisis.

Take your toolbox and use all the tools available to you.

Learn about resistance of the Indigenous and African peoples: we have always been and continue to be exterminated. But we still haven't stopped singing, dancing, lighting a fire and having fun. Don't feel guilty about being happy during this difficult time. You do not help at all being sad and without energy. You help if good things emanate from the Universe now. It is through joy that one resists. Also, when the storm passes, each of you will be very important in the reconstruction of this new world. You need to be well and strong. And, for that, there is no other way than to maintain a beautiful, happy bright vibration. This has nothing to do with alienation. This is a resistance strategy. In shamanism, there is a rite of passage called *The Quest for Vision*. You spend a few days alone in the forest, without water, without food, without protection. When you cross this portal, you get a new vision of the world, because you have faced your fears, your difficulties...




This is what is asked of you: Allow your self to take advantage of this time to perform your vision seeking rituals, what would you want to build for you?

For now, this is what you can do: serenity in the storm. Calm down, pray every day. Establish a routine to meet the sacred every day... Good things emanate; what you emanate now is the most important thing. And sing, dance, resist through art, joy, faith and love.”
