Moving Forward with God *Everyday*

Déjà vu can be troubling or triumphant. Four years ago, as we were adjusting to a new Bishop in our annual conference and preparing for a national election, I wrote an article about living into beloved community. Here is an excerpt:

“Within and beyond the Church, the present times are mired with conflict and divisiveness while God continuously calls the faithful into beloved community...”

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. popularized the concept of a “beloved community.” Dr. King envisioned a beloved community as a society based on justice, equal opportunity, and love of one’s fellow human beings. He stated: “Our goal is to create a beloved community and this will require a qualitative change in our souls as well as a quantitative change in our lives.”

Beloved community is not a false or idyllic utopia. It requires living in authentic relationship with one another graciously acknowledging faults and frailties within ourselves and others. It requires active and deliberate love and forgiveness—making the healing grace of God real. Beloved community fully embraces the diversity of all of God’s creation. Rather than homogeneous uniformity, it seeks unity with diversity.

Jesus spent time among all types of people regardless of demeanor, gender, social or economic status, or other descriptors. Jesus defied societal rules of engagement and Pharasaic interpretations of scripture that marginalized many populations. Jesus revealed that the kingdom of God is a “kin-dom” of people unified by love and forgiveness. As Christ is the cornerstone of our ever-expanding faith community and the One who came so all might have abundant life, there is no room for exclusion in the ‘kin-dom’. The beloved community is all-inclusive as God is the Creator and Christ the Redeemer of all.”

I must admit my disappointment that neither our country nor our denomination has made significant progress toward God’s beloved community. While the conditions of the world may continue to churn, the people of God need not and should not get mired in conflict and divisiveness or blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people’s trickery, or deceitful scheming (Eph 4:14). People of God are anchored and guided by Christ, our cornerstone and compass. To keep moving forward with God, we have daily building to do that requires the sustained energy of a faithful, long view--being of the same mind as Christ (Phil 2:5). Thankfully, *every day* in our God-

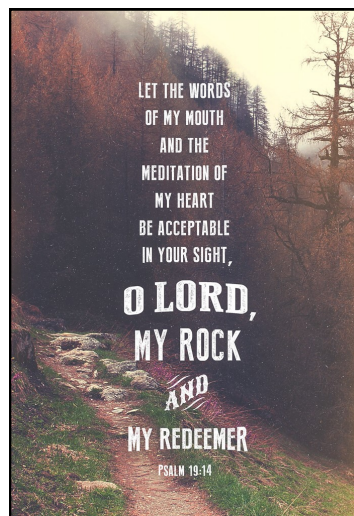

given lives, we have opportunities to make meaningful progress toward God's beloved community through the words of our mouths and meditations of our hearts lived out in our actions. Through intentional prayers, presence, gifts, witness, and service, each of us can help make manifest beloved community. What will you do to help insure that, four years from now, we will be triumphantly living in beloved community rather than repeating the troubling cycle of conflict and division?

Practice makes permanent. Every day, I encourage you to let the words of your mouth and the meditations of your heart be acceptable (pleasing) to the Lord (Psalm 19:14). Every day, seek quality fellowship that uplifts and transforms the soul. Every day, challenge yourself to make quantitative/measurable changes in your life for the common good. Every day with thanksgiving, let us live into the 'kin-dom' of God—the beloved community--and to God be the glory!

The Coalition of Religious Communities (CORC) found that in Utah in 2019:

- 1985 children spent at least 1 night in a homeless shelter
- 136 people in families with kids were homeless for 6 months or longer
- 239 people in families with kids were homeless 4 or more times during the past 3 years

Family Promise Update

My original intent for writing this article was to ask for volunteers to help with our next week of hosting families in need of permanent housing. However, we were notified last week that Family Promise Salt Lake is now in crisis. Over the past few weeks, the Executive Director has been fired, and 12 of 15 members of the Board of Directors have resigned. The financial condition of the organization is very precarious, with monthly expenses outpacing income by a wide margin. As a result, all staff members were laid off last Friday.

Rev. Russell Butler at Christ United Methodist Church is leading an effort to save the organization. He has reached out to the national Family Promise organization for assistance and has contacted Tony Milner, one of the previous directors of Family Promise-SLC for guidance. They are also in the process of selling one or two of the properties owned by Family Promise (not the Day center) and are reaching out to organizations who have given grants and gifts in the past.

Rev. Butler is assuring us that although things are difficult right now, it is not the end of Family Promise. Because Hilltop has long supported this organization (both with donations and by hosting dozens of families at Hilltop House), he is asking for the following:



- Prayers - please pray that the organization will be able to get back on its feet and will once again be able to help families find permanent housing.
- Financial Gifts - these may be made directly to Family Promise or to Hilltop (indicating Family Promise on the memo line).
- Nominations for the Board – if you know of someone with relevant experience and a passion for issues in homelessness, please contact Pastor Lynn and she will forward your nomination to Rev. Butler. The most urgent need is for people with accounting, legal, real estate and fundraising skills.

Hilltop has supported this organization for almost twenty years (first through Interfaith Hospitality Network and then Family Promise). I am very proud of the work we have done while opening our doors to families in need. With your continued support, I am hopeful that we can help restore Family Promise Salt Lake to its prior stability and productivity. In the meantime, the Missions Committee will continue to provide you with updates and we'll let you know when we will need volunteers for hosting duties once again.
