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#### A Message from the Rector

Dear friends in Christ, many of you know by now that I notified our Senior Warden two weeks ago of my decision to withdraw my name from consideration to become the next Rector of Saint John's Church. I have accepted a call to serve as the Dean at Saint James Cathedral in the Episcopal Diocese of San Joaquín in central California. My last day here will be at the end of November.

#### I want you to know that my time with you has been incredible and I cherish it. Saint John's Church is a wonderful community of faithful people who are ready to move into future ministry with energy, focus and joy.

As we have journeyed together over these past nineteen months, I must say I did question whether God was calling me to lead you into that future ministry. In all honesty, I also questioned whether my gifts and talents might be better utilized by continuing in interim ministry, in communities that are in transition, much like you are now.

When I have questions about where God might be leading me, my custom is to enter into an unrushed period of discernment. My process of discernment involves much silence and deep listening to what God might be saying. Discernment involves talking, first of all with Linda and then with my mentors, colleagues and friends. Seeking out their wisdom and counsel always gives me clarity.

## Finally, for me, discernment involves listening to that voice inside that gives me internal peace..."the peace that passes understanding." I trust that "still small voice." It has never failed me.

My experience has taught me that authentic discernment of God's call risks that the answer to one's question might be unexpected. Still, I have learned to listen to God. This time what I heard was that I am not called to be the Rector of Saint John's Church.

As you move forward, your focus must be to continue engaging in the search process openly and to listen to what the Holy Spirit is saying to you about who your next Rector will be. Be confident that in their wisdom Bishop Poulson and Canon Eric have provided a pool of very well-qualified candidates. I know that they will continue to walk with you through the remainder of the search process. Always trust God and I have no doubt that God will send you the priest who is intended to be your Rector.

I am working at this moment to conclude a few of my responsibilities as your "transition" leader. This includes many meetings, being a cheerleader for the final two weeks of the church's All In pledge campaign, and passing the pastoral baton to Susanne+. I will work diligently to ensure the Wardens, directors and staff have as smooth a path forward as I can leave you with. Thank you to everyone who worked together in volunteer service, servant leadership, lay ministries or on the staff to move Saint John's forward during my time with you.

Now, as Linda and I prepare to transition out of Saint John's know that we are grateful for each of you and that we are thankful for our time here.

May God bless you with all peace and joy. You will ever be in our hearts and prayers.

## Gratitude for Father Sam by Jim Hicks

On Saturday, October 17, Father Sam informed me that he was withdrawing his name from consideration to become the next rector of Saint John's Church. Father Sam has accepted a call to serve as Dean of Saint James Cathedral in the Episcopal Diocese of San Joaquín, in Fresno, California. Father Sam's last day here will be November 30. Following a meeting with Canon Eric Cooter of the Diocese of Oklahoma, we coordinated the announcement of Father Sam's departure to the general parish on October 23. On Monday, October 26, the Vestry met to discuss Father Sam's impending departure and the continued operations of the parish.



According to the Canons of the Diocese of Oklahoma, the Senior Warden becomes the ecclesiastical authority of the parish upon the departure of the priest-in-charge or rector. The Vestry, with the approval of Bishop Paulson, has voted to have Reverend Susanne Methven continue providing worship and pastoral care to the congregation until a new rector is elected.

Father Sam has been a tremendous asset to Saint John's during our transition process. As our interim rector and later as priest-in-charge, he has brought stability and renewed organization to the administrative staff. He has ushered in an extremely complex narrative budgeting process to more accurately reflect the finances of the parish. He has guided the congregation through the pandemic-related closure of indoor worship and the creation of the outstanding video

streaming of online worship services. As I told him during a recent meeting, he can be very proud of all these accomplishments. He is definitely leaving Saint John's in a much better position than when he arrived.

A reception honoring Father Sam's tenure at Saint John's will held at 1 p.m. on Sunday, November 29 on the labyrinth in the courtyard outside the Common Room. Heaters and social distancing will be provided and it will be a wonderful time to say farewell to Father Sam and Linda. This would be the perfect time for cards, gifts or remembrances. ### **Rector Search Update**

The Search Committee continues its work this month via weekly Zoom meetings. Of the original eleven candidates, the committee is conducting personal interviews of six individuals. Chairperson Jeff Baum and Senior Warden Jim Hicks also meet weekly with Canon Eric Cooter to discuss progress. The Committee hopes to present the Vestry with final recommendations in early- to mid-November. The Vestry will then schedule candidates to visit Tulsa and complete personal evaluations. Our Senior Warden notes there is optimism that the new rector will be called by the end of the year and extends his thanks for the discernment and input of all parishioners in the search for the perfect next rector for Saint John's Church.

#### Get a Clue, Fight the Flu!

The staff of the church office and our own parishioner, Dr. Jim Dean, want to remind you that getting a flu shot now is highly advisable! Being vaccinated for the flu is a good strategy to protect yourself and the people you love from the complications that can arise from catching the flu. And it is all the more important during this pandemic. For a few places you can receive a flu shot, call or check out: a) your primary care physician's office, b) pharmacies, like Walgreens, usually have the shot available and insurance often makes this free or at a low co-pay, or c) visit the Tulsa County Health Department website for a shot appointment at tulsa-health.org/flu.



## Senior Warden Report by Jim Hicks

Wednesday, November 11, is Veterans Day. Each year I watch from my office windows as the annual Tulsa Veterans Day parade winds south on Boulder Avenue and turns east onto Seventh Street. I take in the seemingly endless line of jeeps, military vehicles, fire trucks, cars, marching bands, floats and of course, the Tulsa Highlanders marching in formation and playing bagpipes!

Since the 1950 founding of Saint John's Church, on a former cotton field, many parishioners and family members have served in the military. Many of those who played a key role in the establishment and construction of our magnificent church were veterans recently returned from World War II.


One of the most significant events of WWII was D-Day, the 1944 invasion of German-occupied France by Allied forces. Code-named "Operation Overlord," the troop landings on the coast of Normandy marked the start of a campaign which led to the eventual Allied victory. Five beaches were utilized in Operation Overlord. From east to west they were: Sword (landing site of the United Kingdom forces), Juno (Canada), Gold (also United Kingdom), Omaha (United States) and Utah (also U.S.). Omaha Beach included the primary villages of Collevillesur-Mer, St. Laurent-sur-Mer and Vierville-sur-Mer. The term "sur-mer" in English means "on the beach."

In a serene and peaceful setting on a hill overlooking Omaha Beach, there are 9,386 white crosses or Stars of David in the Normandy American Cemetery. A memorial including a twenty-two-foot bronze statue pays tribute to the soldiers at the site where American forces finally broke through the German defenses. I am told that the memorial is inspirational in its simplicity and the chimes of a carillon are hauntingly beautiful when its somber tones peal in the distance. Pointe Du Hoc Ranger Memorial is located roughly halfway between Omaha Beach and Utah Beach, the most westerly of the landing beaches, where two hundred and twenty-two Army Rangers scaled the vertical wall of a one hundred-foot cliff rising above the English Channel, under withering hails of German machine gun fire. There are no beaches to speak of, but looking down from the heights of the cliffs to the small strip of sand below makes one marvel at how the rangers scaled the shear rock cliff.

Every year we have set aside time to publicly say "thank you" to our brothers and sisters who have served in the Air Force, Army, Coast Guard, Navy and Marines. Here at Saint John's, we collectively say "Thank You!" to all who served, whatever their role, wherever their service took them.

We give our thanks to those who remember their service with fondness, and to those whose time in service still haunts them. We say thank you to those who returned to us largely intact, who found jobs, started families, and who continue to find ways to serve their communities. And we say thank you to veterans who returned with brokenness so deep that they continue to struggle to find a role or even a home in our communities.

If the only prayer you ever say in your entire life for a veteran is "Thank You," it will be enough.



### Junior Warden Report by Doug Crews

As you read this, you should be enjoying the enhanced audio and video streaming that the church has been putting in place during the late summer and fall. With the new cameras, lighting and sound system we now have the capability to record and stream our services to you on different digital platforms. It has been a long road to get where we are and we are still learning, but I hope everyone will enjoy.

Along with the audio/visual, the church bells are finally ringing once again. We are still working on all of the programming, but they are tolling on the hour on Sundays and we have been manually playing some songs through the carillon system.

While the church has been unoccupied, we have taken the opportunity to replace the heating and air conditioning units for Powell Hall. Amazingly, these units have been supplying us comfort for over forty-seven years. The job was bid out to several suppliers and Shoemaker Mechanical was awarded the contract. Ironically, we are pretty sure Forrest Shoemaker Companies put in this system in the early 1970s.

This November 2020 marks the seventieth year since our founding. Although the novel coronavirus has prevented us from planning anything special for the occasion, it is a good time for us to take a moment and reflect on where we have been, how we are now, and what we want Saint John's Church to look like in the future. Our seventy-fifth anniversary is coming soon.



We are delighted that outside, in-person services for our church began in mid-October on the labyrinth, with limited capacity as well as safety and social distancing protocols. This spoken-word Holy Eucharist service begins at 8:30 a.m. If you would like to attend, you will need to make a reservation in advance. Although all are invited and welcome, reservations are limited to 30 people. We do ask that you arrive a little early, bring and wear a mask and follow the instructions of the ushers.

To make a reservation to attend, look for the invitation email from the church office. It contains a link for making an RSVP and will direct you to more information you may want to know about attending services during these unusual times. Those who cannot make reservations via email may call Diana in the church office (918) 742-7381 for assistance.

We continue to offer the online 10 a.m. Sunday Holy Eucharist service live on Facebook. We will also continue to offer 5:30 p.m. Evensong and our daily Morning and Evening Prayer services live via Facebook at their usual times.

#### **Sharing Our Blessings**

This year for the Thanksgiving outreach project, Saint John's Church will be purchasing shelf-stable grocery items and delivering them to Espiritu Santo Episcopal Mission in east Tulsa.

The vicar of Espiritu Santo, Father Alberto Moreno, shared the following about his parish and volunteers: "The focus of our mission's work is to evangelize and provide discipleship in the formation of a committed community serving the Latino people in need in Tulsa."

At our request, Father Moreno shared a list of the types of sundries and groceries most helpful to the families in his community. Many households in the vicinity of his mission are experiencing food insecurity, especially during the pandemic. Around the third week of November and December, our office will arrange to order and deliver the groceries (with COVID-19 safety protocols) to Espiritu Santo's food pantry.

"Thank you for your love and solidarity to our people and our mission," said Father Moreno. He explained that thanks to our gift, the resourceful mothers in his community will be able to prepare more than 250 healthy meals for families of four.


Weather Notices – We are entering the season of less friendly weather, so please note that if driving conditions or other adverse forecasts are on the imminent horizon for a weekday, the rector may make the determination to close the church office. This closure may be simply a "late start/early dismissal" plan or a whole day. In those situations, please note that services, meetings or events scheduled in the building will be cancelled. Keep an eye on your e-news and Facebook for last-minute inclement weather changes to operating hours. The answering service answers and routes calls if the staff is out.

In related news, Father Sam has determined that due to certain weather conditions (very cold or windy or both), the 8:30 a.m. Sunday worship service may be moved into the building. This will be decided on a Sunday-by-Sunday basis.

**Social Media** – Our church's social media following on all platforms continues to grow as old and new friends participate in concerts, worship, prayer times and more. During one of the October Music at Midday performances (a guest duet planned by Joseph), we had music lovers in the virtual pews from the states of Colorado, Hawaii, New York and more! (See screenshot to the right.) Please continue to "share" online invitations to the wide variety of musical, spiritual and educational offerings of Saint John's Church with your social media friends. Everyone can be a digital evangelist! Attuned to Attendance – Even though we are not in church every Sunday, the church office is still tracking attendance. These figures become a part of the diocese Parochial Reports. This is not only in the form of the number of people who come in person for the 8:30 a.m. spoken-word Sunday worship (new in October), but also by tracking our online service participation. So, a Sunday's total attendance would be the combination of 8:30 a.m. attendance, 10 a.m. viewership and Evensong 5:30 p.m. viewership.

A reminder: the Facebook "attendees" are those who watch worship via streaming on our official church FB page, and the number represents all those who viewed the services (regardless if they were able to stay with us until the end of the streamed service). The number for FB views may also "grow" over time, as some people share a service or watch the mass at a later date. Recent church Sunday-only participation statistics are:

- ✤ October 11 = 413 (29/131/253)
- ✤ October 18 = 806 (28/401/377)
- ✤ October 25 = 530 (0/194/336)

Dwayne and **Beverly Edwards** first attended St. Dunstan's **Episcopal Church** in Tulsa. Beverly started coming to Saint John's Church Wednesday nights in 1997 for services and our shared meals. By the look on the faces of the choir and the empty plates, the meal was a huge success.

One of the things Dwayne and Beverly enjoy is greeting newcomers they see before and after worship. The couple wants to ensure everyone feels welcome at Saint John's Church. They fondly remember how they felt when Lori Van Allen and Roseanne Pasco took them under their wings at a time they were new to this community. Another way they care for their church family is by taking an active role in checking in on older members of the church, and sometimes dropping off meals to those needing a little extra help.

When Beverly was asked what most surprised her about working in a ministry here at Saint John's Church, she shared that she is always happily surprised to see how a chance encounter can result in someone coming to the church. Beverly met Susan Sy at Hancock's Fabric at the Farm Shopping Center one day and the two bonded over an interest in quilting. One thing led to another and the Sys joined the Church! The Edwards are grateful to all those who came before them and helped build and improve our beautiful church. They specifically expressed gratitude for all the individuals who helped fund the new organ, who designed and sewed the needlepoint kneelers, and who helped cover the cost of the replacement slate tiles. #### Growing Up with the Church

Mary Deisenroth's roots run deep in Saint John's Church. She was baptized at Grace Church in Ponca City, and in 1956 became part of the church family at a recently established Episcopal parish in "south" Tulsa, when her parents moved here.

Since she was about three years old Mary has been a part of the Saint John's family, and she says she has so many wonderful memories of the church. One of her few points of consternation, however, was always feeling upset that girls couldn't be acolytes when she was growing up. Mary recalls that the church had something called the Delta Guild and she still has the little charm she was given for participating. She guesses that the guild may have been created to help the girls not feel so left out in not being able to serve as an acolyte. During those early years she was a part of the children's choir.

One of Mary's favorite services today at Saint John's Church is Easter Sunday. It is particularly important to her as it marks the conclusion of Lent, and that translates into a rebirth for her spiritually and physically.

Some of her favorite places around the church are the sanctuary and the Resurrection Garden. And as for scripture she finds truly conforming, Mary says that the

passages from the *Book of Common Prayer* shared during funerals are particularly meaningful.

Mary gives of her time at this parish because of the remembrances she holds of her parents



doing the same thing. She has served on our vestry twice and currently loves sharing time serving with her friends on the Altar Guild. When asked what three words she would use to express her feelings about Saint John's, Mary said they are: home, peace and renewal. This church has always been her second home.



### Lay Readers and Eucharistic Ministers by Lynn Kimmel

During our worship offerings, parishioners may serve as a lay reader or a lay eucharistic minister (LEM). The lay reader is the individual who reads the lessons of the day, also known as the Morning and Evening Prayer lessons, as assigned in the Daily Office Lectionary. When Holy Communion is a part of a service, lay eucharistic ministers are the non-clergy who participate by sharing the cup. This is a role sometimes referred to as a "chalice bearer."

If you are interested, you can be a part of either or both service roles in our church. Training is provided so you know when and what to do and become confident in the role. Saint John's Church is currently in need of more volunteers to help in both of these capacities. We hope you are enjoying getting to know members of the church staff in new ways through our interviews in The Evangelist. We have some of the most interesting people serving God and our parish! This month we caught up with Mother Susanne, who was gracious enough to let us interrupt her many other responsibilities and pursuits.


Q: Where were you born and where have you lived? A: I was born in Halton, England. I was registered as an Australian citizen at birth and didn't become a United States citizen until 1980. I have lived in England, Canada, and on both coasts and the middle of the United States. I find beauty everywhere I go. I have lived in Australia twice. The first time was in Elizabeth, South Australia for three years as a child and later during the summer of 1979 in Melbourne, Victoria while I did a management internship at Rowntree Hoadley, a chocolate manufacturer. When my father died in 2016, my sisters and I revisited to the Outback in memory of camping and other trips there.

Q: What do you do for relaxation? A: I have a garden and volunteer in the gardens at Philbrook. I love to weed (really!) because the plants then have more space to flourish.
