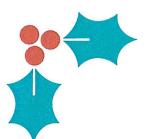
Family Advent Activity Program

Advent begins on November 29!



A new take on the traditional Advent calendar...

Advent is a time of anticipation for the birth of Jesus. And we know that between work, school, Christmas plays and programs, shopping, and more, it's hard to keep focused on the real reason for celebrating Christmas. But here's help!

This fun and simple activity will get your family talking, encouraging each other, having fun, and sharing about Jesus every day during the Advent season!

It includes conversation starters, prayer prompts, and this-or-that fun. Great to do at meals or on the go!

It's easy! All you'll need is a printer, paper, scissors, and three jars or cups. Here's how it works:

- 1. Print out the next six pages. You can either print in color or print each page on a separate color of paper.
- 2. Cut the strips of paper along the dotted line, and keep those in the same category together.
- 3. Once a day, pick one slip from each category/color and take turns answering the question on the paper.

Grandma's Braille Cookies

Okay, we don't know if your grandma really made these, but she's going to wish she had once she hears about them.

They're cookies with a special twist: You can read them...if you know Braille.

Braille is a written language used by people who are blind. Letters are represented by raised dots that can be read with fingertips.

You'll use Braille on the tops of your cookies to spell words that are all about Christmas: Love, Joy, and Jesus. And you'll spell out the words with cinnamon candies or chocolate chips!

Here's what you'll need:

- large sugar cookies (We bought ours, just like Granny used to.)
- frosting (We'll give you a recipe.)
- butter knife to spread frosting on cookies
- chocolate chips or cinnamon candies to serve as dots





And here's how you make your braille cookies:

- Lay the cookies along the bottom of this page—that's where you'll see how to place the dots on your cookies.
- 2. Mix up the frosting.
- 3. Frost the cookies.
- 4. Push the dots in place-before the frosting sets up.

And you're done! Well, done except for sharing your cookies with family, friends, and neighbors. Be sure you explain the dots—and why "Love," "Joy," and "Jesus" are what make your Christmas special!

How much frosting you'll need depends on how many cookies you make. This recipe will frost a cake, so plan for a dozen large sugar cookies.

3 cups powdered sugar

1/3 cup softened butter or margarine

11/2 teaspoons vanilla

1 to 2 tablespoons milk

In a medium bowl, mix together the powdered sugar and butter. Use a spoon or, with a parent's help, an electric mixer set on "low." Stir in the vanilla and 1 tablespoon of milk.

Slowly beat in just enough of the remaining milk to get a smooth frosting that's easy to spread. Use the knife to spread enough frosting on the cookies for the dots to stay in place.

As you make cookies, here's something to talk about:

- What might it be like to be sightless at Christmastime? What wouldn't you be able to see?
- What would you still enjoy at Christmas, even without sight?
- · How might being blind help you see Jesus even better?
