Then Abraham said, "If you look around , isn't there plenty of land out there? We have to separate ways, but if you go left I'll go right. If you go right I'll go left."

Lot looked east and saw a plain of land called the Jordan, which looked to him like God's garden and would be perfect for all his needs. So they separated. Abraham moved to a place called the Oaks of Mamre in Hebron.

But before Abraham moved, God once again encouraged him saying, "... Open your

I'll make your descendants like dust — counting your descendants will be as impossible as counting the dust of the earth. Get up on your feet and get moving! Walk through the country, its length and breadth; I'm giving it all to you."

So Abraham moved to Hebron. When he got there, he built an altar to God and offered Him thanks and praise for once again fulfilling His promises and making a way through all the obstacles he faced.
