So, what can you do if you felt hesitant to share your views. You can call or email our multicultural team with your concerns. I can't share the whole team yet, because it is not finalized, but it will be facilitated by Ron Carmichael, so he is your best contact. They are looking for input, so yours will be welcome no matter where you are coming from.

We have intentionally set up the team so that I am not on it. As the pastor, I'm supposed to do the spiritual leadership. It isn't a good use of my time to liaison on issues of facility use, scheduling and the van. As the pastor I am also supposed to have the fault of erring on the side of grace. The multi-cultural team will let me be a lover of souls and a preacher. They will invite me to participate with them when there is an issue that needs the input of the pastor.

The Town Hall meeting was a good step, and I think we did it well. Let's not stop there, however. Let's keep the communication going!

# **Update on Honduras**

We are happy to report that both Gustavo and Eluterio have recovered from COVID and are doing well. You may recall that Gustavo is the manager of the Hotel Buena Vista who assists us with our scholarship program. Since most of Copan has been closed due to the pandemic, including the hotel, Gustavo has worked tirelessly to purchase and distribute food for countless people in the area. Eluterio has assisted in the food distribution to outlying communities and continues to work with the communities who have worked on building houses or are making plans to do so when they are able. The country is still under lockdown, which makes work difficult. In addition, two hurricanes have moved through Honduras in the last few weeks with torrential rain. Ways to make contributions for Honduras are given elsewhere in this newsletter, but most importantly, please continue to pray for our sisters and brothers as they face these many difficulties.

# **Navajo Project**

# **Deacons Changing to Congregational Care Team**

Your deacons have some exciting news! We will be transitioning in 2021 to a Congregational Care Team model. This structure will eventually eliminate the cluster model we are currently using and move us to a model that emphasizes connection. The main reason for this change is better care for our congregation. Anyone can serve on a care team; you don't have to sign up for a three-year commitment, you don't have to be a deacon to share your talents, and you don't have to attend meetings. But those in need in our congregation will still be cared for. The idea is that we will have teams to share the ministry of specific areas, such as calling our shut-ins, sending cards, and when we can start doing pandemic-restricted activities, delivering flowers, hospital visits, delivering prayer shawls, preparing meals for those just out of the hospital, and so on. Many of these things will have to wait until the pandemic restrictions are lifted, but some we can do now and we are working on setting up those teams. More information will be forthcoming as we develop our teams, but if you feel called to lend a hand, please contact either Dennis Daniel or Becky Cederquist, who are the current shepherds for this project.

# **Update from Jerusalem**

The Peace and Justice Network is in continuing communication with the International Peacemakers who have come to the Presbytery of Grand Canyon for the last 9 years. This update is from Nora Kort, who visited with us from Jerusalem in 2013.

#### COVID-19

As of September 25th, Jerusalem is under strict lockdown by the Israeli Authorities. We are only allowed to move within 500-1000 feet because the number of COVID-19 victims is on the rise. Yesterday only there were 2 deaths and 713 new virus cases just in Jerusalem city, bringing the total number of the virus patients to 1744. In Israel there were 58 deaths and 6499 cases yesterday too thus bringing the total number of the virus patients to 209,635 which is relatively high compared to the population's number. There is great fear among the people and we are going into the second time of more than two weeks' lockdown. Stricter measures will be imposed if the people do not seriously observe the instructions of masking, social distancing, suspension of marriage parties, condolence visits, etc. Education mostly goes virtual these days and Zooming for official meetings. I do a lot of work from home. Our life has changed - no more of that busy social life. This has its impact on the economy and employment. Travel is also restricted, including closure of cities. Personally, I have not been in Ramallah, which is only a few kilometers away from my house, for two months.

#### **Current situation with Israel and Palestine**

House demolition, arrests and settler attacks in Jerusalem and the West Bank continue on a daily basis. Annexation of lands and territory, especially in "the" Jerusalem and the Jordan Valley/Jericho, the food basket of the Palestinians continue to creep without too much publicity following the signing of the normalization pact between Israel, the Arab Emirates and Bahrain, which the Palestinians denounce. There is much resentment and bad feeling among the Palestinians as they feel they are left alone to struggle for their freedom.

#### **SAGES**

As all of our SAGES know, the health concerns of our community have prevented us from having our monthly meetings for some time. We are hopeful that we can once again resume our fellowship lunches, and will review the status of the health guidelines after the first of the new year. In the meantime, your Leadership Committee wishes each of you to remember past holiday seasons, and the spirit of family gatherings that have lifted our hearts. Please continue to observe the health guidelines, be cautious, and pray that we will be able to meet again soon.
