PASTORAL PONDERINGS: Dr. Bert Welch

DO YOU BELIEVE IN SANTA CLAUS? I love traditions! I thoroughly enjoy all the meaningful and fanciful sights, sounds, and smells of Christmas. My mind is filled with joyful Christmas experiences growing up. I am blessed to be surrounded by my dear family, especially my grandkids and my new friends at Memorial. One of the traditions and fond memories I have includes that chubby old gift-giver that somehow slid down my really narrow chimney on Christmas Eve. Here is a question I am often asked: "What to do about Santa Claus?" Fact or fiction? Well, here is something you may want to consider:

The name Santa Claus comes from the Dutch, "Sinterklass" which means Santa Claus. Who was Sinterklass? Actually he was a real life Bishop named Nicholas in the Greek church who ministered in the last 200's AD in the current region of southwest Turkey. He left no letters or personal writings, but we do have accurate historical documents proving who he was and what he did. Bishop Nicholas suffered greatly for his faith. He was imprisoned by wicked Roman Emperor Diocletian for about five years before being released by the God-fearing Emperor Constantine. Bishop Nicolas participated in the Church Council of Nicea in 325 AD. The ground-breaking Nicene Creed as written by that Council which included the following words...

We believe in one God, the Father Almighty, the maker of heaven and earth, of things visible and invisible. And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, the begotten of God the Father, the Only-begotten, that is of the essence of the Father...He suffered, was crucified, was buried, rose again on the third day, ascended into heaven with the same body, [and] sat at the right hand of the Father.

So we know that Bishop Nicholas believed in Jesus and lived his life for Him. So much so, that in the 6th century, the Church first named him a saint. Therefore, I truly believe Bishop Nicholas would be very uncomfortable with all the attention of himself. His life and testimony was all about Jesus! I believe St. Nicholas would want us to look at his life of service to God as his true legacy.

So here is the point. When the topic of Santa Claus comes up, why not quickly focus on St. Nicholas, the real Santa Claus, and his life of devotion to His Savior the Lord Jesus. Do I believe in Santa Claus? Yes I do. Not the fanciful fable version but the real life follower of Christ. When you give and receive gifts this Christmas, remember the greatest gift ever given did not come down the chimney via a jolly old elf and reindeer, but rather in a humble stable in Bethlehem. Enjoy Christmas my friends! Celebrate the true meaning of Christmas and look for that meaning in all the symbols and experiences we all enjoy so much. Dr. Bert Welch
