Bulletin Announcements and Updates—

"What We Have Learned from COVID"

Before I get into another installment of what we have learned from the COVID, let me wish everyone a Merry Christmas, and remind you that we will not publish a bulletin next week between Christmas and New Year's. We will, however, send out reminders of events and update the prayer list. This is a good time to say a "big thank you" to our church secretaries, Denise and Linda. Linda has been working from home during COVID and has done an excellent job. Denise, who at the time of this writing is home trying to recover from the Corona Virus and before that dealt with back surgery, and yet has somehow been able to continue to serve this church. They have both been such a blessing during a very difficult time.

3. COVID not only brings a very serious virus, but also a great deal of anxiety and stress, and therefore, we are called to practice greater patience with one another.

COVID has brought more than just a deadly pandemic disease to the world, it causes a great deal of complicating circumstances economically, psychologically and relationally. One of the stressors is the variety of feelings about the virus and the health protocols used to manage its spread. There are some who think that the virus is a hoax or a politically motivated emergency. And there are those who believe it is either a plague sent from God to bring repentance, or as a persecution from Satan. Probably in the middle are those who feel it is a real virus, but that it is either no big deal no more serious than any flu, or that it is a very serious, even deadly, highly contagious disease. These opinions of the virus cause people to react to the CDC recommended protocols accordingly. This includes: to either scoff and ridicule, or to think just continue as normal until nature produces herd immunity, or frantically take extreme caution as a hermit, or practice reasonable caution for themselves and others.

These attitudes also impact the local congregation's efforts to try to keep people safe and healthy while continuing to try to practice the traditions and teachings of the church. Most church leaderships believe it is imperative for the church to continue to do the things commanded by our Lord that are part of the mission and practice of the Church, but they are challenged to find ways to do this with a flexibility that will ensure the best health practices and safeguards for members who may be most vulnerable to a virus that could cause them great harm or death. The problem for many church leaderships is not only the variety of views concerning the seriousness of the virus, but also there is disagreement on what are the commands of the Lord vs what are just traditions and opinions of people as to how to practice their religion. And then there is a third factor that plays into it, our religious freedom in America, to which some Christians feel is being infringed upon to be asked to comply with rules of masking and social distancing. So, there are people upset that we are not strict enough with our safety protocols, and there are people upset that we are practicing any protocols at all.

So how do we deal with this great divide?

- Remember the Golden Rule! Mat. 7:12. If we treat people the way we would want to be treated, we would try to understand where they are in their emotions about this, whether we agree or not, and act toward them as we would wish to be treated if we had the same views.
- 2). Remember the greatest commandment is to love God and love our fellow man. Mat.22:34-40. This love obeys the Lord's commands and serves the needs of others. John13. Remember the Good Samaritan!
- 3). Put other's needs above your own. Phil. 2:1-5
- 4). Bear with one another in patience, keeping the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. Eph. 4:2-3. Practice the fruit of the Spirit Gal. 5:22-23.
- 5). Give the weaker brother room to grow, as you grow together in love. Rom. 12-15; 1 Cor. 8-10.
- 6.) Remember the grace we have been given and show grace. Eph. 4:32.
