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A Note From The Pastor

Some of you have been under self-imposed "house arrest" for most of the year. We haven't been able to gather with our families and have not been able to gather as a church.

Sometimes I stand on the platform, look around the Sanctuary and envision you sitting in that spot you filled for years. Never did I imagine that I would be part of broadcasting live worship services. Then, by summer I became a radio minister 😊 Facebook has become an integral part of our church experience. Sunday morning worship, Sunday evening Bible study, Mid-week chats and other events on Facebook have helped to keep us together. It has not always been easy and we have experienced some stumbles and falls along the way. We discovered very quickly that we do not have any "techie" in the church. None of us are experts in computers, iPads, broadcasting and the such. Please understand that when we have those stumbles in our attempts to bring you all of the programs electronically, that it is not because we are not trying. Many of us have spent countless hours trying to learn how to bring you the best broadcasts possible. Sometimes equipment doesn't work like it should, the internet fails, computers quit computing, and other issues beyond our control pop up that cause issues. We are doing our best to bring you the best broadcasts we can provide.

We all know there were things in 2020 that were disheartening for the church. Attendance was going up and then we had to close the doors. The youth group was vibrant and active. We had several youth events scheduled for 2020 that had to be cancelled. VBS in 2019 was a great success and we had plans for an even better VBS in 2020 that had to be postponed until 2021. The bus ministry ended up with the bus parked behind the church. We had many other programs in the works for 2020 that we hope to bring to fruition in 2021.

There were good things that came from 2020. The clothes closet has grown. We had to swap the clothes closet and the nursery in order to better serve the needy through the clothes closet. We have helped to clothe hundreds of adults and children. As a result of the 2020 clothes closet ministry, we are bringing in needy students to the church the first week of school in January to fit them with coats, hat, gloves, and warm clothes.

Due to the pandemic an audio-visual grant became available through Creative Congregations Foundation. BillieSue made us aware of the grant. Rob, myself and Mark Spelbring researched the equipment and then Mark filled out and submitted the grant. We received the grant and we have installed the recording part of the equipment. The big screen tv's for the Sanctuary will be installed before we have in-person church. This is all equipment that we needed prior to the pandemic and will be used long after the pandemic is over. Our broadcasts of the Worship service, Bible Study, and Mid-week chat are reaching greater numbers than we ever had in church. Our December 20th Facebook Worship service broadcast was viewed by 177 people, last night's Mid-week chat has 80 views, and Bible study had 124 views. I loved the singing Christmas card which had almost 200 views.

I want to take this opportunity to mention a couple of people who have been great assets to the Administrative Council. They were on the Ad Council when I came, served while I have been here, and have rotated off as of December 31st. Aaron Mathis served as Trustee. Aaron has helped with keeping the church building functioning. He also dealt with a lot when the pipes burst at the parsonage. Aaron is someone that always gave a direct answer and there was never a question about where he stood. He offers good advice and I still value his opinion greatly. Aaron still serves as our "sound man" each week in the Sanctuary. Randy Randall was the Men's Representative. Randy is always the voice of compassion and ministry. Randy thinks beyond himself and always puts others before himself.

During the Mid-week chat last night, I told everyone that Christians should not say "Happy New Year." Happiness is dependent upon the events around you. Happiness is fleeting and may be gone at any time. We should say have a "Blessed New Year." Being blessed invokes the presence of God in all things. Blessedness is not dependent on how happy we may be. As a matter of fact, sometimes the greatest blessings come when things are at their worst. We don't know what 2021 has in store for us. What we do know is that God's love will always be with us, Christ's presence will always be upon us, and the Spirit's presence will always be within us. Even in 2020 we have been blessed beyond measure. We do not know what 2021 holds for us. Capital Improvement Plan for the Rockville Methodist Church


A committee of several members of the church have met for the purpose of identifying building repair projects and to place them in categories of importance in order to prioritize projects in an order of greatest need and provide cost estimates of repairs and present their findings to the Committee of Finance to acquire funding for the repairs.

An Architect has completed a thorough inspection/evaluation of the building and has identified structural and cosmetic projects for attention as funds are available. With that report as well as visual observation the committee has assigned the following categories:

1. Imperative/Priority-improvements or repairs needed to neutralize a current threat to the structural or aesthetic integrity of the building and/or the safety of the people.
2. Deferred Need-an improvement or repair needing attention in the near to intermediate future if possible. Not currently critical but could become so over time. Important to the long-term viability of the building and our ministry.
3. Want/Desire-a non-crucial improvement or repair which would add to the overall beauty, function of the building and purpose of our ministry.
4. Minor Repair/Maintenance/Cleaning-an improvement or repair which may be accomplished with minimal effort and little to no cost, either by a paid contractor or by a qualified individual donating time and/or supplies.

The intent of this committee is to recommend repairs be made in the most cost effective manner but to recognize that the long term goal is to not merely repair the project for the interim but to repair the project for the long term so that future monies will not be needed to repair a project which has already been completed.

Projects within the scope of expertise and ability of individuals attending the Church or volunteer participation will be undertaken when time, material and weather permit the work to be completed.

An Opportunity To Make A Difference

As you all know, we are in the midst of fundraising to make much needed repairs to our church. The first item needing repaired is the brick exterior. The latest estimate we obtained for the brick work came in at \$106,000. The damage to the interior of the church is getting greater and greater. We need to repair the bricks this spring to stop the water from infiltrating the interior and destroying the plaster walls in the sanctuary and towers. We all realize it would be exceedingly difficult for our congregation to raise that vast amount of money by spring. We cannot put the work off any longer and we need money to make the repairs. We have been diligent in looking to other sources of money for repairs. We have applied for a \$50,000 grant from the Indiana Landmarks Foundation. If we get this grant, we will have to match the grant money. In other words, we must raise the same amount of money that we receive from the grant. If we are awarded the full \$50,000 the church must have \$50,000 of our own money to match what the Foundation awards.

In order to raise the amount we need to match the grant, or move us closer to the amount of funds needed to make the repairs without the grant, we have the opportunity for another smaller matching grant. We have been offered a \$25,000 matching grant. The great benefit of this grant is that it can be used to meet the matching funds required for the \$50,000 grant. This is a one-time, unique opportunity to possibly acquire \$100,000 by raising \$25,000. This is how it will work; For every \$1 you give, \$1 will be matched up to the \$25,000. If we raise \$25,000 to meet the offer of \$25,000 matching money, we will have \$50,000 additional funds in our capital improvement account. Then if we get the Indiana Landmarks \$50,000 (and we believe we have a very good chance of being awarded this grant) we will have raised the matching money needed for that grant. So, if you give \$1 toward this first grant, it will definitely be matched with \$1 for a total of \$2. Those \$2 will then be used to match \$2 in the \$50,000 grant. Your \$1 ends up bringing the church an additional \$3. If we can raise \$25,000, we have the opportunity to at least have \$50,000 to meet our needs. With both grants, we have the possibility to turn \$25,000 into the \$100,000 we need to repair the bricks.

We spoke to those who are making the \$25,000 grant available. We all understand that December and January are tight financial months for many of us due to Christmas expenses. What has been offered to us is an opportunity to pledge the amounts we commit to give by January 31. Then everyone will have until July 1 to donate their pledge. Your pledged amount can be paid in a lump sum or by making your contributions in any manner that works for you as long as the church receives it by July 1.

At this point we need two things from you. First, I need you to join with me in prayer. Pray about what God wants you to give. Listen to what God leads you to do. If you give in accordance with God's will, He will make it possible for you to give what you pledge. I will be making a pledge for this church and congregation that I have grown to love and whom I have found makes a witness of Jesus Christ in our community. Then, make your pledge by January 31. Secondly, pray for the matching grants. Pray a prayer of blessing for those who make these two grants possible. Also, pray that we receive The Indiana Landmarks grant. Finally, pray that our needs are met in every way and we restore this beautiful house of worship.

I will be making my pledge soon. I pray you will too.

God bless you, God bless this house and the congregation that gathers in ministry within its "brick" walls.



How to use Amazon to fund the church projects.

Did you know that if you shop through Amazon, we can actually get a donation from them? The Smile website allows for a small portion of qualifying purchases to be donated to a charity of your choice, and we would hope you choose the church.

It's easy to do:

1. Open a browser window to <https://smile.amazon.com> Notice this is NOT just amazon.com, but it has a SMILE in it. This page will look slightly different than your usual Amazon page.
2. If you already have an Amazon account, you can sign in using the link in the upper right hand corner of the page.
3. Then click the "Get Started" button.
4. In the search box, type in "Rockville First United Methodist Church" and click "Search" for our church's name.
5. You should see the church name pop up in a list. Hit the gray "Select" button next to the church's name.
6. Check the box next to the statement "Yes, I understand that I must always start at **smile.amazon.com** to support Rockville First United Methodist Church."

A New Bus

We want you all to know the church bought a new bus. Well, it's not new, but it is new to us. Some of you may be thinking, "With all the money we need for the building, Why would we buy a new bus?" Let us try to explain our actions. The bus we had ran fine, but it had one issue. There was no air conditioning. When we got the bus running about a year ago, we noticed the bus had no A/C. We had Rick's Auto look at it. Rick said someone had removed the A/C compressor and they just cut off the wiring and the hoses. He said the repairs were extensive and more than he could do.

Now that may not sound like much at first. But if you have a bus ministry that is transporting people, mostly elderly, in the summertime without A/C it can get pretty rough to ride in the bus. Even the kids would struggle in the dead of summer with no A/C. Back at the first of the summer the Ad Council discussed the A/C issue with the bus.

We discussed plans for bus use. We discussed whether the bus is an asset or liability? Is there a need for the bus or is it better to sell it? The youth group had a few outings planned that would be utilizing the bus. There were discussions of senior ministries that could use the bus. There was at least one event scheduled for July to transport a church group to Myer's Theater. Was the bus ministry something we wanted to continue? All these were discussed, and it was decided the bus is an asset to the church. It was then decided that if we keep the bus, then we need to repair the A/C.

Superior Bus at Perrysville was contacted. They stated the bus A/C could be functional for about \$1500. It was decided to take the bus to Superior Bus for the repairs. After about 2 months for a 2 week job we started contacting Superior Bus to check on the bus. It got to the point that Superior Bus would not answer or return our calls. Alex went to Superior Bus and got the bus. Alex took it to a bus repair place in Crawfordsville. They looked the bus over and said that it would cost about \$5000 to fix the A/C. \$5000 is a lot to spend to repair A/C on a bus that is not worth \$5000.

Alex was told about a bus that belongs to Maranatha Baptist Church in Covington. The bus is newer. It has been kept in good repair. It has a storage area in the back. It had fairly low miles for a bus that age. It has cruise control and it has A/C. It has cloth seats with high backs. The cost of the bus was \$4000 which is cheaper than repairing the A/C on our existing bus.

A delegation went to look at the bus. The bus was taken for an extensive test drive. The bus had just been serviced and will not need servicing for 12-24 months depending on use. The tires were like new. The batteries and battery cables had just been replaced. The body was in good shape, although there are two small spots that will need attention soon. The bus has a battery cutoff switch that will keep the batteries from running down if the bus sets for long periods. The man who had the bus attends the church and maintains the 2 full size busses and the 3 small busses of the church. He also repairs and services the Head Start buses for 5 counties and is employed by the north Montgomery school system and takes care of the busses there. As a representative of his church and his bus maintenance background we felt we were getting an honest evaluation of the bus.

It was decided to purchase the bus. The new bus is now at the church. We are going to sell the existing bus as soon as possible. The existing bus has good tires and 2-year-old batteries. We would like to advertise it for \$2000 and hope to get \$1500. (If one of you know how to sell on eBay, or the such, please contact Rob or myself.) If we can get \$1500 for the existing bus, then the church will have spent \$2500 overall and saved \$2500 from not repairing the A/C of an older bus. Now for less money we have a newer, better bus that should have us set for quite a while for all of the ministries that will utilize the bus. We hope this explains our decision to do what is best financially and ministry wise for our church.





