

Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the piano fund! Your contributions will help to enhance our music program and recital program





Zion Consistory Highlights

We didn't see it coming. When we discovered the cracks in the Sanctuary plaster in January, we didn't grasp the gravity of the situation. When the coronavirus pandemic emerged in March, we didn't immediately comprehend the import of the emerging situation. Needless to say, it's been quite a year...

The end of 2020 provides a natural opportunity to take stock of the year's accomplishments and look forward to the promise of the new year. Though we performed the needed emergency truss repairs to prevent the rapid deterioration of our historic sanctuary, the extent of work needed to stave off water from entering our building has now been brought to light. The needed repairs and deferred maintenance includes: re-pointing of the bell tower masonry, repositioning of a bell tower hatch, replacement of hidden gutter membranes and downspouts, repairing and repainting of soffits, fascia, and gussets, and finally, plaster repair and repainting of the sanctuary. The air conditioning system in the church office, Pastor's office, and Pastor's Parlor (installed in 1984) is in need of replacement. Quotes for these projects have been approved by the Consistory and the projected costs have been incorporated into the 2021 Annual Budget. Amid the COVID-19 situation, we will not have the opportunity to review the Annual Budget at a Congregational Dinner as is customary for us. If you would like to receive a copy of the 2021 Annual Budget and a list of the quoted capital projects, please contact the church office.

As was the case with every other church in America this year, we needed to remain connected during this historic pandemic. In response, we improved our website and expanded our presence on Facebook to assist with the flow of information. We learned how to conduct Consistory meetings via a group telephone conference and on Zoom. Most importantly, we began broadcasting our worship services which have been viewed virtually 1,340 times between the onset of the pandemic and the time of writing of this article. Right now, we are uniquely positioned to share God's message outside of our church walls in ways not previously possible and to carry the torch forward long after social distancing is behind us.

Our sanctuary audiovisual installation project is primarily completed. The Central Atlantic UCC Conference is supporting our efforts by awarding Zion a Trinity Trust Grant for \$5,000 which will be issued to us in quarterly installments throughout 2021.

Restoration work has been completed on 17 gravestones and monuments in the cemetery. The cost of this has been covered by a Bowman Community Foundation Grant.

Zion has submitted an application for a \$1,000 Recovery Grant from the Central Atlantic Conference which if awarded, will be applied toward our 2021 Soup Kitchen expenses.

The inability to maintain a stable internet signal inside of our building has been a long-standing problem. Last month Tele-Plus and our Multimedia Technician, Michael Jones, successfully diagnosed and resolved our router conflict issues. We now appear to have a sustainable, stable, internet signal (hallelujah to that!). Tele-Plus be working with us again in 2021 to rewire the ethernet cable ends to the TV monitors in the sanctuary and complete upgrades on our network infrastructure, expanding our internet service coverage to the Burhan's Room, the Youth Classrooms and the Fellowship Hall (aka, the Soup Kitchen).

Tele-Plus will be installing 13 exterior security cameras in 2021. This will enable visualization of the (Church Street) side of the cemetery, the Fellowship Hall parking area, the parking lot, and the church office entrance.

Zion Consistory Highlights (continued)

In acknowledgment that church is about our people and not our building, we've begun mailing a Weekly Worship Bulletin (with the message text inserted) to members who don't have digital capability. We've also begun sending Adult Sunday School lessons weekly to those who are interested, and Youth Sunday School participation is now carried out via Zoom. All of this new technology has involved a steep learning curve as we play "catch -up" toward entering the 21st Century. I want to take this opportunity to encourage our faithful members who make regular donations to to consider "taking the plunge" by setting up recurrent electronic giving on our website in lieu of mailing in checks. (Come on, it won't be as painful as you're imagining.)

I feel led to share the following thoughts from an article written by Michael Piazza from the Broadway UCC in New York:

"Mainline churches have been merging or closing for several decades. In the wake of this pandemic, that will greatly accelerate because the 'return to normal' will be short-lived, and our churches are biding their time, waiting to get back to the way things were. It isn't happening. Young people of faith have discovered new sources of spiritual nourishment and will be even more disillusioned with moribund institutions. Many congregations have seen the future and are retooling for it. They are paying attention to the implications of what will be the 'new normal' for society. Churches that thrive will adapt to, and even exploit, new cultural realities. Those faith communities are rare, though, because the church and its leadership are among the most change-resistant creatures God ever made. In this case, however, that resistance may prove fatal. A Chinese proverb wishes for us that we 'live in interesting times.' Americans may interpret this as a good thing, and, for a few congregations, it may be. For most, however, it probably will not be. The heat of the sun melts wax and hardens clay. COVID-19 is not a good thing, but, if churches are agile and adaptive, God may well be able to work it for our good (Romans 8:28). If our only plan is to get back to 'normal,' then I doubt even God can save us."

Let us move into 2021 with eager anticipation of embracing a bright and vibrant future for Zion!

That Four Letter Word..... A Parish Nurse Note January 2021

Last year was a trying one. It was a roller coaster that seemed to have more downs than ups. As the New Year starts, we have no idea if it will be better or worse than 2020. What do we do? We get out that four letter word and cling to it like never before!

HOPE. Some define hope as a wish or being optimistic; the Biblical meaning of HOPE is much greater. HOPE is the "confident expectation of what God has promised and its strength is in God's faithfulness." HOPE is a promise we can rely on and trust. Being a person of HOPE is good for your health and well being. Feeling HOPE can cause changes in your brain that lead to the release of chemicals capable of blocking pain and increasing healing. Charles Snyder, PhD is a pioneer in HOPE research. His studies show that people who HOPE have greater happiness, better academic achievements, less anxiety and depression and decreased risk of death.

Social support is thought to be a vital component of HOPE. Jon Allen, psychologist at the Houston Psychiatric Hospital relates that the opposite of HOPE is feeling alone and being "invisible." This feeling of hopelessness is closely associated with suicide. On a brighter note, a 2013 study cited in the Journal of Positive Psychology noted that on average, "a hopeful person does one day a week more work than a less hopeful person." (No wonder we are tired!!). HOPE is important in so many ways.

How do we continue to be people of HOPE? There are 23 Bible verses listed in the back of my Bible that refer to HOPE. Reading and remembering them can remind you of God's promises that will never be broken. Here are a few of my favorites.

Proverbs 13:12 "HOPE deferred makes the heart sick."

Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a HOPE."

1Peter 1:3 "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. By His great mercy we have been born anew to a living HOPE through the . rising of Jesus Christ from the dead."

The Hebrew word HOPE means a cord, as an attachment (Psalm 62:5). Beth Moore says, "Every one of us is hanging on to something or someone for security....if it's someone or something other than God alone, you're hanging on by a thread-the wrong thread." Our HOPE is in the Lord; our HOPE is in believing that God's promises will happen! If you seem to need a little boost in the HOPE department, recite this prayer:

Dear God,
I tried my best, but if today I lose my HOPE
Please tell me that your plans are better than my
dreams. Amen. - anonymous

New Member Welcome


Welcome to the Zion family, our newest member, Michael Jones. He was received as a Zion member during our December 20th worship service.
