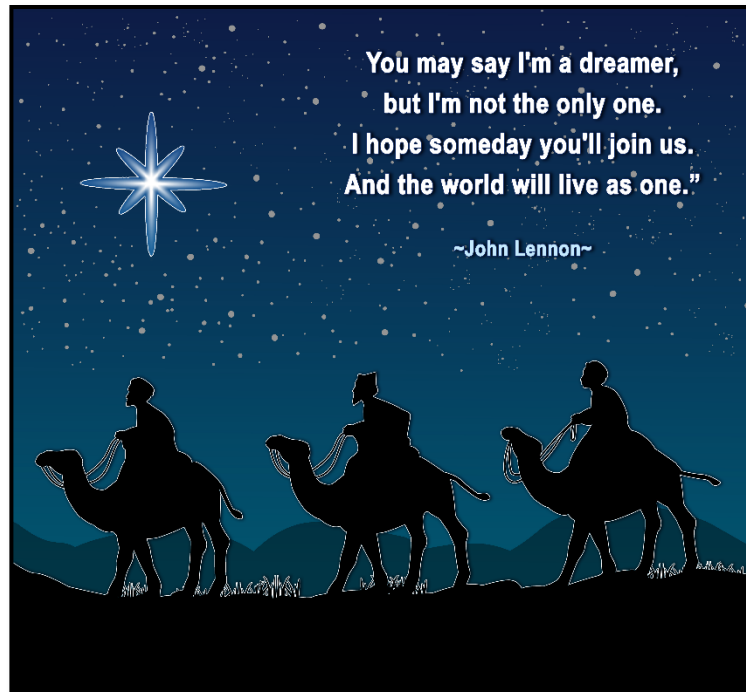

WE MEDITATE

Old Testament Lesson

Isaiah 60:1-6 (NRSV)

Lector: Amber Nilson

¹ Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you. ² For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the LORD will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you. ³ Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn. ⁴ Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms. ⁵ Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you. ⁶ A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come. They shall bring gold and frankincense, and shall proclaim the praise of the LORD.

Gospel Lesson

Matthew 2:1-12 (NRSV)

¹ In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ² asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." ³ When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴ and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵ They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: ⁶ 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'" ⁷ Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸ Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹ When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰ When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹ On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹² And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Prayer of Dedication

Like the Magi who came to offer their gifts to the baby Jesus, we offer our gifts to you, O Compassionate One. May our financial and spiritual gifts become expressions of our love. With these gifts we give you the best we have to offer. Use them to make your light of compassion and justice shine more brightly in the world. Amen.

Sacrament of Communion

We have come asking for the child — wondering where that love might be born, seeking that joy that might satisfy our thirst, wandering through the darkness of so many mistakes. We have come to this place where wise ones and shepherds and young women met. We have come to this place called Bethlehem. To this place where our hearts rise like yeast. To this place where we meet our newborn hope. To this place where we taste our deepest joy. In Bethlehem, where we assumed the worst, imagining that no good can come, we somehow missed its name.

Bethlehem. Lehem meaning bread. Bethel meaning house.

There is something here that will satisfy our hunger. No matter how long we have wandered, Here our hearts arise. Our light has come. In this bread and in this cup, we celebrate something we can't quite understand. Because God has made a house at this table. Because God satisfies our hunger in the most unlikely places. Because God comes to be with us. Now and always. It is with this expectation that we come to the table to taste and see that God is here. Let us pray:

Holy Spirit, come into this bread and this cup. Transform these ordinary objects as you change our hearts to shape and form your world with the joy you promise. Pour your grace upon us, so we overflow with your love. Help us to remember how a newborn baby might grow into a little child that would one day turn to his hope-filled friends in an upper room... And so, we remember:

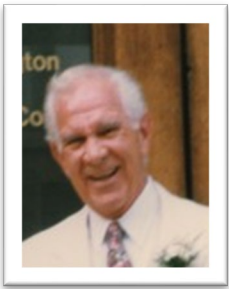

Epiphany House Blessing



If you have never done this short ceremony with your family, I would highly encourage you to do so today or tomorrow, most especially if you have children in your home. You can do it as a family or if you live alone, you can do it by yourself.

The tradition of blessing the home on Epiphany is an ancient custom in the Church. The custom focuses on the day when the Magi, or the Three Wise Men, entered the home of the Holy Family where they brought their gifts of Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh, to a young Jesus Christ about the age of two. In order to do the Epiphany House Blessing, you will need three things:

1. **Epiphany Water** or Holy Water
2. **Chalk:** Blessed chalk by clergy is great, however, you can bless it as a family in the absence of clergy.
3. **The ceremony itself:** You can use one of the blessing ceremony links below or do a simple online search to find another. Some of the ceremonies are very simple and some are incredibly detailed. Find the one that best fits your family)

When the ceremony is complete, on the door frames the current year should flank the letters "C", "M", and "B" with crosses in between. The final inscription will read like this: 21+C+M+B+21.



An example from a blessing in 2020

The letters not only represent the names of the Magi – Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar but the Latin phrase, *Christus Mansionem Benedicat*, which means Christ bless this house.
