Dear friends, we have encountered a very challenging period together over the past several months. When I first arrived as vour Interim Pastor we were sweltering in the sunny summer days with our parking lots and radio services. We then moved back inside the sanctuary in early October with social distancing precautions. Now, we are back to the parking lot, radio and virtual gatherings again. Life is certainly not routine around Memorial Baptist! I do want to express two significant thoughts to you in the next weeks. One is more personal and the other relates to a sort of "State of the Church" theme. Today, I simply want to convey my concern for each of you. In doing so, I want to use the words the Apostle John writes to his beloved coworker Gaius, expressing his appreciation for his Kingdom labors. John writes,

To my dear friend Gaius, whom I love in the truth. Dear friend, I pray that you may enjoy good health and that all may go well with you, even as your soul is getting along well. (3 John 1-2)

TEXT: Luke 19:1-10

Matthew 9:35 Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, preaching the good news of the kingdom, and healing every disease and sickness. When He saw the crowds, He was moved with compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd.

Luke 19:1-10 Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. A man was there by the name of Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector and was wealthy. He wanted to see who Jesus was, but being a short man he could not, because of the crowd. So he ran ahead and climbed a sycamore-fig tree to see him, since Jesus was coming that way. When Jesus reached the spot, he looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, come down immediately. I must stay at your house today." So he came down at once and welcomed him gladly. All the people saw this and began to mutter, "He has gone to be the guest of a 'sinner." But Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, "Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor, and if I have cheated anybody out of anything, I will pay back four times the amount." Jesus to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, because this man, too, is a son of Abraham. For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost."

(1)The Weeping Widow: Luke 7:11-17

Luke 7:11 This news about Jesus spread throughout Judea and the surrounding country.

(2) The Demon-possessed Man: Luke 8:26-39

Luke 8:39 "Return home and tell how much God has done for you." So the man went away and told all over town how much Jesus had done for him.

(3) The Blind Beggar: Luke 18:35-43
