Yet, light as the central symbol of the season can certainly be enhanced with the water of baptism. Epiphany is about seeing Christ, about the manifestation of Messiah in the person of Jesus. Certainly, the proclamation made at his baptism, the tearing open of the heavens, and the descending of the Spirit like a dove can be that revelatory experience reminding us of the visible evidence of the presence of Christ in the world. When we claim the new life that we embrace at our baptism, we live the light that we proclaim. We are the witness to the activity of our Lord in the midst of the present-day reality.

We survived 2020 and have begun a new year filled with endless possibilities, and while there might still be lingering effects of the pandemic and unrest, it is time to embrace a new possibility, a new hope. The heavens have been torn open. But this isn't a threat; it's a promise of something new, something better. Let us commit ourselves to a closer walk with Christ. Let the waters of baptism renew us and cleanse us for our mission and ministry as followers of Jesus.

Come to splash and wade into this water to hear again that you are beloved. You have brought pleasure and glory to God's name. Come and touch the water to remember God's love for you.

Old Testament Lesson Genesis 1:1-5 (NRSV)

¹ In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, ² the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. ³ Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. ⁴ And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

PRAYER STATIONS

Prayer Station One: Water

What does water do? How often do you touch water in one day? When do you touch water and why? Why is water important?

Review the news stories you found for worship today – What in these stories reminds you how important water is?

Place a pebble or rock in the bowl of water for each gift water brings. With each pebble or rock, say aloud, "God, I (we) praise you for the gift of water."

Awesome God, we thank you for the water in our bathtubs and sinks. We thank you for the water that rains from the sky and the water inside our bodies. We thank you for rivers and lakes; for the Potomac and the Chesapeake. We thank you for oceans and ponds full of fish, turtles and frogs. We give thanks for the gift of water. May water always remind us of your love. Amen.

Gospel Lesson Mark 1:4-11 (NRSV)

⁴ John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵ And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. 6 Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷ He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. 8 I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." 9 In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰ And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. 11 And a voice came from heaven, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

Prayer Station 2: Remembering

Were you baptized? Do you remember it? Touch the water in the bowl. What does the water feel like? Touch your head with the water to see what it is like.

You have washed your hands a lot in this pandemic. How is this different? Have you learned anything new about water this past year?

"O Worship the King"

During this time of music reflection, please give each participant in your household a fresh piece of paper and place the markers or crayons within reach of everyone as we continue to our next prayer station.

Prayer Station Three: Beloved

Who are you? What gifts do you bring to this congregation, to the wider community, to the world? At Jesus' baptism, God called him "Beloved." What names does God call you?

Ready yourself to hear who God says you are by writing God's name on your piece of paper. Draw a shape or a line or a doodle around God's name. This is your prayer space. Now listen. Who does God say you are?

As you hear each name God calls you, surround God's name with those names God calls you. Draw a shape or a line around each name. Doodle or color lines and shapes that connect these names to God. Think of each stroke of your crayon or marker as a prayer of hope and possibility.

Take a breath or say "Amen" for each name God has called you.

Video Reflection "All Belong Here"

During this time of music reflection, notice all of the objects that they have collected. Marvel for just a moment at the ways that we are learning to be church together. We are becoming something new and wonderful. There is lots to praise here. Afterwards, move your candle(s) and matches to the center of your focus and within reach before our next prayer station.

Prayer Station Four: Becoming

There is a hymn* that claims that in water we grow. We have changed in this season of washing our hands so much and with such intention. *["In Water We Grow," lyrics by Brian Wren, ©1993 by Hope Publishing Company set to the tune of Laudate Dominum by C. Hubert Parry, ©Public Domain]

Who are you becoming? How are you growing, or where do you anticipate growth? Where are you led? Where is God calling you to serve?

Spark a match and light a candle in the hope of all that you are becoming.

A Message of Hope from Our General Minister and President of the UCC



Good evening on this, the feast of Epiphany. I wish to speak to you about what I believe is the greatest Epiphany the world knows, embodied and incarnated for we who call ourselves Christian in the one we know as Jesus. And that Epiphany is this: love has come and love alone will endure. Now I speak with both a heavy heart and a hopeful heart. The heavy heart arises from the presence again of

persistent evil. The hopeful heart though emerges in its wake because of the presence of the enduring love known most fully in Jesus. I don't know when it was in my life that I came to the stark realization that evil was a thing. I've never understood it. I can't find words to explain what it is exactly or why it exists. But I have encountered it often enough to know I would be wise to take it seriously and not pretend it isn't there. My life as a person of faith, and my calling as a minister of the gospel, is dedicated to two important things in relation to evil.

First, I feel called to do everything in my power to name evil and confront it. I take very seriously that part of our baptismal vows that reads: "Do you promise, by the grace of God, ... to resist the powers of evil." I made that promise. As a pastor who has baptized many, I have asked others to take that promise. As I say – I take it very seriously. When the evil of racism destroys the lives of people of color, my baptismal vows ask me to resist it. When the evil of homophobia leads to the humiliation of our kindred who identify as gay or lesbian or bi or trans or queer, my baptismal vows ask me to resist it. When the evil of climate change threatens to undo life on this planet as we know it, my baptismal vows ask me to resist it. I knew in my bones [that the unrest at our Capital this past week] was evil. It was present and it was real, embodied in the hearts and minds of white supremacists assembled to inflict terror. I saw that terror in the eyes of our elected leaders hiding under their desks. I saw it in the eyes of a black man wearing guard's uniform who was being slowly backed up the stairs by white vigilantes who had breached the security lines and clearly had no fear of being arrested or detained. I saw it in the eyes of law officers standing at guard with guns pointed at windows that had been busted out in front of them by an angry and unruly mob. I saw and heard that terror in the voices of the courageous news people who reported about the violence that was being threatened and who also noted there was not a police presence anywhere to be found. Evil has come to America. I realize as I say this that the particular evil on display today, that of white supremacy and white terrorism, has been with us throughout our long and sometimes rich and sometimes sordid history. But it was on full display today. On a day like this, where the presence of evil is so undeniably present and so maliciously threatened, there can be a tendency to despair. There can be a moment in which we wonder what good is derived from naming evil and resisting it. After all, generations now have resisted the evil we saw acted out today in our nation's capital and yet it still shows up.

So, let me then talk about my second commitment as a disciple of the risen Jesus. It is not just to name and resist evil – it is to proclaim that good news that he embodied. Evil will not win. Evil

cannot win. It is love alone that survives. Today, America woke up to this: A black man was elected to serve in the Senate representing the deep south State of Georgia. The violence we are witnessing erupted within an hour of Amy Klobuchar telling us that the state of Arizona will cast its electoral votes not just for the white man Joe Biden, but for the Black and Indian woman Kamala Harris. And as the violence broke out, in the midst of the terror that was erupting, we learned that the other Senator from the deep south state of Georgia would be the son of Jewish immigrants.

Evil exists. Evil persists. We name it. We resist it. And it always returns. --But it doesn't stop the power of love to overcome it.

Our call tonight is twofold: First, bear witness to the evil we see. Name it. Name all who align with it. Tell the world what you see and what you hear and resist it with all the power of love you can bring to bear against it. Just as darkness cannot endure when the light is turned on, so evil cannot survive in the presence of love. The second call is to practice steadfastly the art of a love that leads to justice for all. It is a love of neighbor and a love of creation and a love for children. It is a love for the black and brown bodies ravaged by racism; a love for the female bodies ravaged by misogyny and toxic masculinity; a love for the LGBTQ bodies terrorized by homophobia. --That is our mark as Christians.

Evil is real. Make no mistake about that. But love wins. And we who practice love need not shy away from the evil we confront. Like the saints before us, we face fully into the face of evil and show the strength of a love it cannot conquer.

I close with the words of Julian of Norwich, words I have been repeating since the beginning of the spread of the coronavirus: In the spirit of knowing what she did about the power of love to conquer, and from the midst of an evil she saw ravaging the world she knew, she authored these words: "All shall be well. And all shall be well. And all manner of things shall be well."
