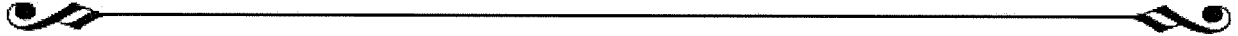


Scripture Reading: 1 Samuel 3:1-10, (11-20)

Let's talk about thermometers and thermostats.

I bring this up because this morning I tried to adjust the temperature on the thermostat. We have a thermostat that looks like a panel from the Space Center Houston. The buttons and digital figures are confusing — not at all like the simple thermostats we had when I was a kid.

Anyway, think first about the *thermometer*. This is a very handy device that lets us know if we have a temperature. The device is controlled by its environment. It responds to the heat or the cold of its surroundings. It goes up and down in accordance with the temperature around it.

Some Christians are like that. They get hot and bothered when certain things happen, and cold and uncaring at other times. You might say they're "thermometer" Christians. Their actions and attitudes are totally dictated by their surroundings.

A *thermostat*, however, is different. The thermostat *dictates the temperature*. It sets the tone. The context, surroundings and atmosphere all respond and obey the directives, orders and plans that the thermostat demands. If the thermostat says, "We're going up to 72° today," then the atmosphere adjusts accordingly. No if, butts and ands about it!

Perhaps we should be more like "thermostat" Christians than "thermometer" Christians. Let's control the temperature of our emotions, the atmosphere of our home or wherever we are living. Let's make it warm and comfortable for those around us!

There's one more interesting difference in this little analogy between the two devices: The thermometer *works on its own*; the thermostat works *only with electrical current*.

I like to think that this is an image of our need for the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. Without this connection, we cannot be effective "thermostat" Christians. The Holy Spirit empowers us with all that we need to produce the warmth of love, gentleness and patience.

So which will we be today: a thermometer or a thermostat?

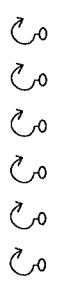
