

Going Back to T-Town by Jim Hicks

As the one-hundredth anniversary of the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre approaches, the PBS series "American Experience" will broadcast a 1993 documentary "Goin' Back to T-Town" at 8 p.m. on February 8. Written by Tulsa native Carmen Fields, the film provides an overview of the rise, destruction and resurrection of the north Tulsa neighborhood that earned the title "America's Black Wall Street." The story-tellers point out that a true legacy of Greenwood was not the destruction visited upon the community, but how the community managed to thrive before and after the massacre.

Born of a dream to establish parochial missions, Saint John's Episcopal Church has thrived since its founding seventy years ago. In 1949, Trinity Episcopal Church purchased a five-acre cotton field in far south Tulsa. The completion in 1950 of a vicarage, now known as Saint John's House, heralded the construction of a Parish Hall which was completed later that year. This structure is the north wing of our present facility. The first services at Saint John's were held on November 18, 1951. (The Vestry is in the initial stages of planning a seventieth anniversary celebration of the first service.)

The Reverend Calvin Clyde Hoggard (married to Mary Helen), who had been our vicar from the beginning, became our first rector. A graduate of Southern Methodist University (SMU), Father Hoggard served as an Army chaplain in



Europe during World War II and was a Methodist minister for fifteen years prior to being ordained an Episcopal priest in 1949. Ground was broken for the larger church in 1956 with the dedication held on June 19, 1957. The magnificent stained glass windows over the altar were installed in November, 1958. Father Hoggard left in 1959 to become a canon at Grace Cathedral in Kansas and was succeeded in February of 1960 by a young former Princeton football player, Father John Vruwink. During this time Charles Connick Associates designed, created and installed the rest of the windows in the nave using a unique blue color and shards of stained glass from European churches destroyed in World War II (some dating to the twelfth

century!). The center portion of our facility was completed in 1962.

As we were able, in 1964 our church helped raise funds to buy the land to establish Saint Dunstan's Church, the first area parochial mission. These were tumultuous times, with the assassination of John Kennedy in 1963 and other political and social upheaval surrounding civil rights and the Vietnam War. In February of 1968, the Tet Offensive in Vietnam brought a shift in American public opinion toward the war and nationwide demonstrations for peace. On April 4 that year, Martin Luther King's assassination led to another level of grief. Then waves of rioting swept American cities. Two months later, an assassin ended Robert Kennedy's life. The nation was numb and coming apart at the seams. All eyes were focused on the Democratic Convention in Chicago that August. Antiwar protesters flocked to Chicago and clashed with police in bloody conflict.

Father Vruwink, with wife Emma, led our parish through these times with strong sermons and thoughtful pastoral care. In December of 1968 Father Vruwink was replaced by Father William Weldon, who had been the church music director. On his way back to Tulsa from Oklahoma City the evening of Tuesday, March 30, 1971, Father Weldon was tragically killed on the Turner Turnpike while going to the aid of victims of an automobile accident. With no family, his ashes sat in the church office until the dedication of the columbarium in 1988.

Father William Maxwell, a graduate of SMU and Seabury-Western Theological Seminary, had been dean of the Cathedral of Saint James in Chicago before being called as rector to our parish. He served from February 1972 until his abrupt termination by the Vestry in January of 1978 over issues of divorce and remarriage in the church. Saint John's fifth rector called was David Fox who served twenty-five years, from March of 1979 until retiring at the end of 2004. A voice of calm and reason, Father Fox, along with his wife Lynn, helped establish Saint John's Church as a viable presence with the Tulsa Metropolitan Ministries. During his tenure, Saint John's established a companion relationship with the Anglican Diocese of West Ankole, Uganda, and many medical and educational mission trips were completed. Father Irving Cutter, married to Andrea. served as rector from October of 2006 until the end of 2018 and helped focus Saint John's on reestablishing children and youth ministries, issues of inner spirituality and installation of the magnificent Schoenstein organ.

Our seventh rector, the Reverend David Bumsted, has accepted the call to lead our parish. He and his wife Beka have just moved from Orlando, Florida and will be residing in Saint John's House. Today, there is a general feeling of optimism and hope for the future. We look forward to many years of his spiritual guidance and formation during life's inevitable ups and downs. Welcome Father David and Beka, to T-Town. &

Treasurer's Report by Bill Chevaillier


We will be holding an annual meeting later in February to review the church's entire Year 2020 financial report. Until then, I share with you these preliminary numbers for the past year:

Looking at operating revenue and expenses from January through December 2020, our total income of \$1,297,397.86 was <\$114,167.14> under budget for the year to date. Our total pledges are under budget for the year by <\$78,859.61>. Contributions (gifts other than pledges) and plate (primarily between January and March when we met in person) income of \$133,977.22 are \$977.22 over budget for the year to date. Miscellaneous income and bequests of \$354,380.25 are <\$36,284.75> under budget.

The 2020 expenses of \$1,307,660.93 are <\$103,904.07> under budget for the year to date. We incurred additional expenses of \$142,925.71 that were paid by PPP (Cares Act) funds which are not included in the total expenses above.

The result is a net loss of <\$10,263.07> vs. budgeted net income of \$0. №





Music News by Joseph Arndt

On Tuesday, February 2, the Saint John's Chamber Choir will offer a livestreamed Evensong at a special time of 6:30 p.m. in celebration of the feast day of The Presentation of Our Lord. In the Episcopal Church the liturgy on this day is also often called Candlemas, referring to the use of candles symbolizing the light of Christ entering the world.

While often overlooked, The Presentation commemorates a significant event in the early life of Jesus (Luke 2:22-40). His mother Mary brought him to the temple as an infant forty days after his birth for her ritual purification (the traditional offering being two doves).

At the temple, the prophet Simeon acknowledged Jesus as the Messiah and foretold Jesus' future suffering as well as Mary's. Some of Simeon's words at the temple are known as the "Nunc dimittis," one of the canticles traditionally sung at Evensong (the other being the "Magnificat," Mary's song of praise in response to the angel Gabriel).

From my observations, this seems the first time Jesus is acknowledged as the Messiah in a public space. The Gospel of Luke goes into the most detail about Jesus' birth and infancy, and many of our most cherished liturgical texts come from these passages.

It is traditional for music on February 2 to highlight Mary and the special role she plays in the story of salvation. The Chamber Choir will sing "Ave Maris Stella" by British composer Judith Weir. Composed in 2019, the piece is inspired by the ancient Marian hymn of the same name.

In addition, I am so pleased to announce that the Reverend David Bumsted, our new rector, will be with us to officiate at this February 2 Evensong. Please mark your calendars!


If there are any girls who would like to join our venture crew, step up! The crew is newly revised and ready to grow. Please seek out an adult leader if interested.
