

Jonathan Edwards, the great preacher and theologian whom God used to bring revival to colonial America, wrote:

“I claim no right to myself, no right to this understanding, this will, these affections that are in me. Neither do I have any right to this body or its members, no right to this tongue, to these hands, feet, ears or eyes. I have given myself clear away and not retained anything of my own. I have been to God this morning and told Him I have given myself wholly to Him, I have given every power so that for the future I claim no right to myself in any respect. I have expressly promised Him, for by His grace I will not fail.

I take Him as my whole portion and felicity, looking upon nothing else as any part of my happiness. His law is the constant rule of my obedience. I will fight with all my might against the world, the flesh and the devil to the end of my life. I will adhere to the faith of the gospel however hazardous and difficult the profession and practice of it may be.

I pray God for the sake of others to look on this as self-dedication. Henceforth, I am not to act in any respect as my own. I shall act as my own if I ever make use of any of my powers to do anything that is not to the glory of God or to fail to make the glorifying of Him my whole and entire business.

If I murmur in the least at affliction, if I am in any way uncharitable, if I revenge my own case, if I do anything purely to please myself or omit anything because it is a great denial, if I trust myself, if I take any praise for any good which Christ does by me, or if I am in any way proud, I shall act as my own and not God’s. But I purpose to be absolutely His.”

The church is a sign and instrument of the kingdom of God, a people united by faith in the gospel announcement of the crucified and risen King Jesus. The mission of the church is to go into the world in the power of the Spirit and make disciples by proclaiming this gospel, calling people to respond in ongoing repentance and faith, and demonstrating the truth and power of the gospel by living under the lordship of Christ for the glory of God and the good of the world. —Trevin Wax

The gospel moves us outward.

In our society of quick and easy joining and leaving, the idea that the local church is a place where one would invest one's entire life is a largely foreign concept. Nevertheless, the development of strong congregations, based without equivocation upon the word of God and the power of the gospel, is the necessary corrective to the unfortunate impression given by many churches—that they are franchises of the Christian corporate chain. We should pray for a recovery of true ecclesiology in our time — and know that it will come only through the corrective power of the word of God.

Conclusion

Strictly speaking, the church is not sent out, but sends out workers from her midst. Our fundamental identity as church (*ekklesia*) is not as those who are sent into the world with a mission, but as those who are called out from darkness into his marvelous light.

The mission given to the bumbling band of disciples was not one of cultural transformation—though that would often come as a result of their message—but a mission of gospel proclamation.

To be sure, God's cosmic mission is bigger than the Great Commission, but it is telling that while the church is not commanded to *participate* with God in the renewal of all things—which would, presumably, include not only re-creation but also fiery judgment—we are often told to *bear witness* to the one who will do all these things. In short, while the disciples were never told to be avatars of Christ, it is everywhere stated, either explicitly or implicitly, that they were to be ambassadors for Christ (2Cor. 5:20).—Kevin DeYoung

Questions

- *The gospel moves us outward.* The gospel is a restless power. It challenges our comfort and prods us beyond the settled Christianity of an affluent society. What are the implications of the Gospel driving you to do about your part in a conversion community?
- *Are we known primarily as the people of the gospel?* Are you known as a person of the gospel? If not what needs to change about who we are as a church and who you are as you?
- Is our love, stirred up and manifesting itself in good deeds, evident and convincing to all? If not, why not? If it is, how is it evident and convincing to all? What is your part in this?

The Corporate Witness of the Church

We are a people assembled by God, united to his Son, adopted into his family, and governed in our worship by his Word. The Lord God is seeking a people, not merely individuals, to worship him in spirit and in truth.

Far too many Christians hold that their lives are their own, to live as they wish, protected by an inalienable right to privacy. The New Testament's call to follow Christ is diametrically opposed to this way of viewing church membership. The Lord and his apostles teach that our lives should be open letters read and circulated among all, edited in brotherly love by others.
