Pastor's Pen

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news." (Mark 1:14-15)

It's February and by the end of this month, we will be well into our Lenten journey. In a few weeks we will have already had our Ash Wednesday service and for some of you, the ashes will have faded from your foreheads, and we have already started those forty days (plus Sundays) that make up this liturgical time.

Lent has always puzzled me a little bit. I never participated when I was growing up and I never felt the call to "give something up" as many of my friends at school did. In fact, I never understood how giving up chocolate or meat helped further your relationship with God. Now I see the possibility of taking something on as a spiritual discipline. Lent is a time of repentance and reflection... of looking deep into our souls and trying to learn something new about our relationship with God. It's not about giving things up, it's about renewal.



Zion Consistory Highlights

The Consistory welcomes the installation of Deacon, Michael Jones, and the re-installation of Deacon, Tina Shafer, to the Consistory. The Consistory Officers are: President: Becky Owens; Vice-President: Kim Ridenour; Treasurer: Lisa Saum; Secretary: Carroll Sager; Special Funds Treasurer: Carol Mooers; and Financial Recording Secretary: Rae Smith. Church collections were down 22.2% in 2020 as compared to 2019 (\$94,664 vs. \$121,636, respectively). The 2021 pledge envelopes have been mailed. It's not too late to make a pledge, if you wish to do so. If you haven't received your pledge envelopes, or would like to be mailed a pledge card, please call the office. The option of giving your tithes and offerings safely and securely online from our website is available. Online giving provides the option to give one time, or to choose to to set up a recurring giving option if you would like to "set it and forget it".

Long overdue structural repairs and a cosmetic "face-lift" for our cherished historic building has been incorporated into the 2021 Annual Budget. These projects, to be performed by Building Systems, Inc, can be classified into three categories: 1) "Moving the hatch", to mitigate water entry into the building, 2) Re-plastering and repainting of the interior Sanctuary walls, and, 3) Scraping and painting of the exterior eaves, soffits, etc. Replacement of the heat pump supplying the church office, pastor's office, and the pastor's parlor was performed in January, replacing the old system installed in 1984.

Michael Jones has been spearheading our internet-modernization project with the assistance of Tele-Plus Corporation. Completion of this project will improve our internet reliability and extend our Wi-Fi coverage to the Youth Classrooms and to the Fellowship Hall (aka the Soup Kitchen).

Please extend a warm welcome to our church Administrative Assistant, Darlene Covington, who was converted from being a temp employee to a regular Zion employee in January. Due to the severity of the COVID-19 pandemic, Darlene will be working remotely for the immediate future. The office phone and email have been forwarded to her and she lives very

close-by, so feel free to contact her regarding your church administrative needs.

Due to the recent decline in Soup Kitchen volunteers, Darlene will be acting as the Soup Kitchen coordinator during the pandemic. 127 Soup Kitchen meals were served during the month of December.

The tech team continues to make progress toward improvement of our live streaming and sound system capabilities in the Sanctuary in joyful anticipation of the day when it will safe to return to in-person worship. We had 219 views of our on-demand Services during the month of December. We're optimistic that good will come from the way we are reaching out and building relationships with people that we may not have been in a relationship with before. 



Lenten Trivia Answers

1. What does the term 'Lent,' which comes from the root word 'lencten,' literally mean?

The correct answer is **C - Spring**. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word "lencten", which means "spring." The root words mean "long days," and this combination probably refers to the increasing daylight at this time of year. Lent's 40 days represent Jesus' time in the wilderness, enduring temptation and preparing to begin his ministry.

2. Ashes were imposed in the early church by pouring or sprinkling them over one's head.

The correct answer is **A - True**. In the early days of the church, pastors did not dip their thumbs into the ashes to draw the shape of a cross on one's forehead. Instead, they poured or sprinkled ashes over one's head.

3. Why do people give things up for Lent?



The correct answer is **D - All of the Above**. Lent is known as a time to repent, pray, and give to the poor (almsgiving). Fasting is a spiritual discipline that helps us do all three. In fasting we follow the example of Christ's 40-days in the wilderness, focus on spiritual things like prayer and devotions, and create a heart of concern for others. In fact, during ancient times, one was expected to give the money that was saved from not having to buy extra food

due to fasting and give it to the poor. Many people give something up for Lent today like chocolate, social media, shopping, or a bad habit. These are modern-day adaptations of the spiritual discipline of fasting or abstinence. Some even choose to add a practice during Lent instead of giving something up such as adding a focused spiritual practice not typically done. Others consider to give up something during Lent that makes an impact for others instead of a personal sacrifice such as giving up single-use plastics while praying for the world. What will your practice be this Lent?

4. What snack food has significance during Lent?



The correct answer is **B - Pretzels**. The twisted pretzel is said to have its roots in Lent. According to legend, a 7th century monk made bread from flour, water, and salt—no eggs or milk because they were avoided during Lent. He then formed it into the shape of a common prayer pose of the day, hands on opposite shoulders. You have to turn the pretzel upside down to see it.

5. In some traditions, the day before Lent begins is known as Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday, a celebratory day; however, earlier tradition called this day Shrove Tuesday. Why?



The correct answer is **A - People were expected to prepare for Lent through Confession**. Shrove, derived from shrive, refers to the confession of sins as a preparation for Lent, a usual practice in Europe in the Middle Ages. Although the day is sometimes still used for self-examination and introspection, Shrove Tuesday eventually acquired the character of a carnival or festival in many places and is often celebrated with parades as is Mardi Gras, French for "Fat Tuesday," referring to the practice of the last night of eating

richer, fatty foods before the ritual fasting of the Lenten season. Shrove Tuesday is the last day of Shrovetide and Mardi Gras is the last day of the Carnival season, both of which in modern times have somewhat blended together in practices. Common practices of both include indulging in food that one might give up as their Lenten sacrifice for the upcoming forty days through the holding of pancake breakfasts, as well as the ringing of church bells to remind people to repent of their sins before the start of Lent. Many churches burn the palms distributed during the previous year's Palm Sunday liturgies to make the ashes used during Ash Wednesday services on this day also.

6. Why does Lent last 40 days?

The correct answer is A - To represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, tempted by Satan. (Matthew 4:2). Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter.

7. What do many Christians not sing (or say) during Lent?



The correct answer is **B** - Alleluia. Many Christians refrain from singing "Alleluia" and/or "Gloria" during Lent. This practice, sometimes called "Burying the Alleluia," is a way of recognizing the solemnity of the season and anticipating the glorious praise we will get to sing as we celebrate Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday!

8. What is the last week of Lent called?



The correct answer is A - Holy Week. Holy Week while viewed by many as a season of its own is technically the last week of the liturgical season of Lent. The liturgical week begins on Monday and ends on Sunday, so Palm Sunday isn't part of Holy Week though in modern times we include it due to the Gregorian Calendar running from Sunday through Saturday. It is a

very special, sacred, and solemn week which is why it is the only week with its own name within a liturgical season. Because of its importance and sacredness, it is "separated" from the season in which it is a part of to make it noticed, but it is still part of the season of Lent.

9. Sundays are not counted in the 40 days of Lent.

The correct answer is A - True. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection. The video "A Lenten Journey" (https://youtu.be/ 3X1cj3Ez30) offers a chance to reflect on the 40 days of Lent through photos God's creation and quotes from Scripture with the singing of "Come, O Thou Traveler Unknown" by Rev. Romeo del Rosario of the United Methodist Church.

Lent: The season of Lent is a time for personal reflection, repentance, and growth. It is a season where we focus upon prayer, fasting, and works of love as expressions of our faith. A season of renewal and grace, restoring right relationships, letting God lead, and the light shine out of the darkness as we journey to the cross. While a solemn season of penitence and reflection, Lent is a 40-day season (not counting Sundays) marked by repentance, fasting, and reflection that ultimately lead to celebration. This Lent we will focus on repair, "Repairing: For Such a time as this!"

Holy Week & Easter: Holy Week continues our journey toward the cross, taking us through the shame and suffering endured by Christ to those torturous final moments upon the cross.
