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Claiming the Promises of God

Promises. Promises. Promises.

Shortly after I met my husband, MJ, he did something that was less than endearing. I do not recall the action but the conversation remains clear. When I addressed his faux pas, he responded, "I promise not to do it again until the next time." What? Whoa! I stopped in my tracks and questioned, "What do you mean... 'until the next time'?" Making light of an awkward situation, he answered that he had used that line many times without any response. It was clear that we were embarking on a different experience together and there was intriguing and perhaps challenging work ahead. Our exchange was establishing rules of engagement in this territory called relationship. Words matter. Promises matter.

We are in the Season of Lent, a time to reflect, realign and re-energize our relationship with God. Through the prophet Joel, God addressed people struggling in different ways – distracted by life, doubtful of what would come, depressed or distressed by current conditions, disobedient or distrustful of authority, disrespectful to God, themselves and others, etc. Perhaps there were some folks who would promise God "not to do it again until the next time." Our loving God, who was planning a 'parental correction', urged faltering folks to rend their hearts and realign their lives with the ways of God. In the midst of God's threats of discipline in Joel 2:1-17, we find promise in God's nature.

"Even now," declares the LORD, "return to me with all your heart, with fasting and weeping and mourning." Rend your heart and not your garments. Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and abounding in love, and he relents from sending calamity." (Joel 2:12-13)

What does this have to do with us? We are among the faltering folks. All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God but are now justified by God's grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus (Romans 3:23-24). This is the ultimate promise. God's word and God's promises apply to us today. God's words matter. God's promises matter.

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PASTOR'S MUSINGS

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This Lenten Season is a great time to revisit the promises God has made to us. Our Lenten sermon series focuses on some of those promises. As we study God's word and its application in our lives, it is up to us to open our hearts to claim God's promises. God desires a unique relationship with each of us that is unlike any other relationships we share. When we truly rend our hearts and return to God, we embark on an experience that is both intriguing and challenging, comforting, confronting, and convicting, that requires work that will nurture and stretch the breadth and depth of our being. When we truly rend our hearts, we say "Yes" to our commitment to God. Our words matter to God. Our promises matter to God. Our hearts matter to God.

- As we lean into Lent, how are we actively opening ourselves to claim the promises of God?
- How are we reading the word of God more intentionally and more closely?
- As we rend our hearts, what is God revealing as our spirits engage with the Holy Spirit?

When we do the work, we can better embrace the richness of the life and ministry of Christ who did the work before us, the fullness of the promise of Resurrection, and live as disciples of Jesus Christ—disciples who make disciples.

As we open our hearts doing the work, we open ourselves to what God has in store for us. Let's rend our hearts and claim the promises of God. For all that is to come, to God be the glory

We are then voted on at the yearly church meeting, in early December of prior year.

The Book of Discipline says this committee must meet at least quarterly. It has been Hilltop's practice to meet the 1st Wednesday of each month and we have been doing that via Zoom for almost a year. It is important for our community to understand the functions and responsibilities of the committee. Below is a quarterly breakdown of what we typically are working on. Hilltop, just like all churches in our denomination pay attention to those things that bring new vitality and growing of the faithful to the community.

January-March

1. Hold orientation for the committee work.
2. Hold a staff recognition event to celebrate our leadership.
3. Establish relationships with congregation, leaders, staff, and clergy.
4. Set pattern to identify ministry candidates.
5. Establish and review plans for dealing with rumors and conflict.

April - June

1. Monitor strategies to meet expectations, adjust as appropriate.
2. Conduct legal review.
3. Conduct policy review.
4. Review any plans and policies for staff changes, as needed.
5. Set expectations as the basis for evaluation in the 4th quarter.

July - September

1. Review written job descriptions and staffing needs.
2. Review salary and benefit packages
3. Establish and review continuing education plans.
4. Monitor strategies to meet expectations and adjust as necessary.
5. Engage in leadership development.

October -December

1. Conduct annual evaluation of our senior pastor.
2. Make reports to charge conference (annual church meeting with D.S).
3. Complete unfinished business.

Promises of Change

I am always in search of repertoire, for the Chancel Choir, the Sanctuary Singers, the Youth, duets, soloists, instrumentalists, etc. I also spend a good deal of time searching out repertoire for the Gospel Choir. This gives me a great opportunity to listen to many composers and discover new ones.

Through my years of studying and listening to gospel music, I have grown to love the music of one of my favorite composers, Richard Smallwood. Richard Smallwood is an American multi-Grammy-nominated writer, singer, and pianist gospel artist (b.1948). Smallwood graduated from Howard University with a major in piano, and later went on to earn his Master of Divinity. His style is unique in that he is one of the few gospel artists who have successfully blended classical with gospel.

Of all his many and varied accomplishments, perhaps most people may know him for having composed the song "I Love the Lord," sung by Whitney Houston in the movie *The Preacher's Wife*. Another very popular song of his that the Gospel Choir has sung is "Total Praise."

Smallwood's life has been widely successful by anyone's standards and has truly been a life of worship and praise; few would know that his life has been one of great pain, and personal suffering and struggles.

There was a period in Richard Smallwood's life during which he experienced great losses in the death of his mother, and several dear friends and colleagues. It was around 2006 when he became overcome by

all the negativity in the world: disease, poverty, hate, injustice, etc., and he sank into a deep depression, unable to write even a single note or word for years.

Then came the idea of *promises*: "We who are children of God, there are promises that he has made to us in his Word; he would never leave us, he would never forsake us, he would provide for us..." During this time in the world, we need to be reminded of these promises made to us by God.

Smallwood's idea was that he would compose an album in which all the songs would deal with different promises made by God. To do this, Smallwood has said he did a lot of reading of the bible and read a book that listed all the promises of God in the bible.

It is easy to tell people to trust in the Lord but when we are hit with negativity, it is not always easy to have that trust. People need to be encouraged and reminded that God "has our backs." One of the songs the Gospel Choir will be singing in our next season is Smallwood's "Sow in Tears."

*Darkness will fall; the tears will come,
for all of these things come to everyone.
But in God's Word, it's promised to us:
If you sow in tears, you'll reap in joy.*

*Tears are for cleansing stress and relief,
created by God just to give us release.
They're not in vain, for soon will come peace.*

4. Hold annual consultation with D.S. (District Superintendent).
5. Prepare for recognition and staff year end Christmas gifting.

We have a job to do for our church and staff; but more important, we have a ministry and responsibility to strengthen the body of Christ. In good times and challenging times good communication is important. For that communication process, we base our work on Mathew 18:15-20. We encourage anyone with a concern to read this scripture. This is Jesus' instruction to those struggling with relationships in the church. A committee member will always encourage a person with a concern to go directly to that person and have a respectful heart to heart dialogue. If an issue or conflict is not resolved after a face-to-face (or ZOOM) meeting this can be brought to the SPR committee on a one page summary completed by the person with the concern. This will be discussed in complete confidentiality in the committee

led by the chairperson(Bob Scarborough in 2021).

Follow-up may include assignments to team members and discussion at subsequent meetings. Anonymous concerns will never be entertained. The committee will be sensitive to all matters that need to be kept confidential.

We prayerfully encourage all to self-examine and discern the real issues and come to healthy solutions. This is an opportunity to exercise the best spiritual practice in the church and learn behaviors that can enrich and enhance all of our lives.

In this season of Lent leading to Easter we are moving forward in our responsibility to our staff and community. We are on our way, following in the path that God has shown us through his holy Son and all believers in the rainbow. We "can do" this ministry that Hilltop is blessed with doing in our community and world.

Summary

Grace loves to act out the stories she reads and she always plays the main character, of course! When her teacher announces that her class is going to perform the play *Peter Pan*, Grace knows just who she would like to be and volunteers right away. Her classmates are skeptical and ask some questions that turn out to be hurtful. Can a girl be Peter Pan? Is Peter Pan Black? With encouragement from her loving Nana and Ma, Grace believes in herself and auditions for the role anyway. In the end, Grace is a fantastic Peter Pan and proves to herself that she can do anything she sets her mind to. The edition we borrowed from the library included a short essay from LeVar Burton, who proclaimed *Amazing Grace* one of his favorite children's books of all time. With that kind of praise from the Reading Rainbow host, you just have to check it out!

Bonus: *Amazing Grace* is one of the books on Mensa's Excellence in Reading list for early elementary age children. We are working on this challenge and have found some new favorites from the list in addition to revisiting classics. Family Promise Matters


In this season of Lent, God's promises to Family Promise are bearing fruit! Like many other programs during the pandemic, Family Promise suffered greatly. The last time we housed families at Hilltop House was in May 2020. We "pivoted" and met the challenges to still provide meals and overnight hosts for several families. By August when our next hosting duties arrived, the families were being permanently hosted at Christ UMC, but we still provided meals and some hosts. Family Promise and all other host churches are extremely grateful to the staff and congregation of Christ UMC for providing a consistent haven for many families during a very difficult time. In November, for a variety of reasons, Family Promise was forced to close the entire program. It was a sad time for all of us who have been a part of Family Promise for some 25 years. Through the end of 2020 and beginning of 2021, a search began for a new Executive Director with a plan to resume services as soon as possible. Several pieces of property were sold to generate revenue, and new board members were recruited, including our own Mike

Montoya. Besides being a past Family Promise coordinator, Mike and his family have always had a passion for supporting families in need.

The waiting is over and a new Executive Director starts on March 1st! He is someone who is known to many of us and we are very excited about the



coming months. Rev. Brian Diggs was the director of the UMCOR warehouse for over 10 years until its recent closure. Prior to that, he was the senior pastor at 1st UMC downtown. He has the compassion, love of people, and skills to rebuild Family Promise so that it can again serve transitionally homeless families in Salt Lake City. There are many staff positions to be filled and the support of all host churches will be vital. More volunteers for the board are needed as well. We don't know how long it will take, or how the new program will look, but we will be ready to serve. That is God's Promise to all of us. It is also our promise to those who need our help to regain their independence and care for their families. We welcome your prayers for our involvement, for Rev.
