Church is hard for the girl who looks like she has it all together, but doesn't.

Church is hard for the couple who fought the entire way to the worship service.

Church is hard for the single mom next to couples holding hands and seemingly perfect families.

Church is hard for the widow and widower with no invitation to lunch after church.

Church is hard for the church leader with an estranged child.

Church is hard for the person singing worship songs, overwhelmed by the weight of the lyrics.

Church is hard for the man insecure in his role as a leader.

Church is hard for the wife who longs to be led by a righteous husband.

Church is hard for the nursery volunteer who desperately longs for a baby to love.

Church is hard for the single woman and single man, praying God will bring them a mate.

Church is hard for the teenage girl, wearing a scarlet letter, ashamed of her mistakes.

Church is hard for the sinners.

Church is hard for me.

Yet underneath those layers, you find a body of imperfect people, carnal souls, selfish motives.

But, here is the beauty of church—

There are very few of us who have not been touched by the loss of a loved one to this terrible disease. I remember well how I had commented to Pastor Rob and others that I thought we were making a big deal out of something that was not much different than the annual flu. It didn't take me long to change my mind. What has happened this past year has changed everyone's lifestyle and it appears that we will never go back to our old ways of doing things. Fortunately, with the advent of the vaccines, we may soon be able to live without mortal fear of this disease.

But COVID 19 is not the only problem that is facing our country. This past year our country has become so divided politically that many feel we are on the brink of a civil war. Riots and destruction in almost every corner of our country, a hotly contested election, daily provocations coming from both sides of the political aisle and lack of respect for any type of authority makes one wonder where we are headed. In my visits with our elderly shut-ins, I learn that the future of our land is the number one concern on their minds. However, it isn't the elderly who are the only ones with this concern. It appears that most people I come in contact with have the same feelings. We soon come to realize that it is sin that is the root cause of all of these problems. Satan is having a proverbial "hay day".

Then we come to 2 Chronicles 7:14 (ESV) if my people who are called by my name humble themselves, and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and heal their land. These words were spoken to King Solomon by the Lord at the time of the dedication of the temple in Jerusalem. Those words have just as much significance for our times as they did back then. The sinfulness and corruption that I described above is nothing other than a drifting away from our God in our own arrogance and rebellion. It is time to return to the Lord our God. It has to begin with each of us.

On Ash Wednesday, we began a Lenten Series theme titled "Return to the Lord." The first Sermon was based of the words of Joel 2:13 (ESV) Return to the LORD your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and he relents over disaster. Those words are so familiar to us as we often sing them as the verse before the reading of the Gospel lesson during the season of Lent. I don't remember a time in my lifetime that they had more meaning to me and I am sure you have the same feeling. I urge all of you to join us during this penitential season of Lent each week as we explore numerous methods of "Return to the Lord." Let us together humble ourselves and return.
