

How many of you make sure your radio is one of the first things you turn on in your car? How many use the radio for weather updates or news reports, or listening to a live football game? How about listening to a podcast or a sermon on your way to work?



The radio seems to be a go-to necessity in the American lifestyle, but it is also a necessity around the world. Who remembers when the whole family would gather around the radio to listen to the presidential speech or breaking news? Now a days we expect the radio to be working on demand, whenever we need it and wherever we want it. But what about those people who only get to listen to it about six hours out of the whole day. What do you think they do when it's on during those specific times? Radios are probably turned on all over the countryside, maybe even as loud as it can go because they get to be encouraged by listening to God's Word, Christian songs, maybe even some current events and Bible studies. It's the



Chimane, Yura, Trinitario, Quechua, and the Spanish people who only get that six hours of Christian only radio time. It's like saying to a kid, you only have one hour of screen time until the battery dies. It's the same for those remote tribal people and local Bolivians who only get that much time to listen to the teachings of God's Word before the power gets shut off.

The things we take for granted are often the things that are most needed in remote, third world countries such as Bolivia. The radio may seem insignificant to some but to others who have no other means of hearing the Word of God it means everything. All this to say that the radio is slowly decreasing its hours because the funds to run it all day every day are simply not there anymore.

We are praying for the maintenance man in Bolivia, who has been battling with kidney stones, to be able to finish up a few projects out at Horeb by making improvements to the radio station equipment. We are also praying for not only more broadcasting hours for the radio station but also for the funds to keep it out of the financial red zone. We continue to pray for the Genesis Project, as we are editing and tuning up the finished pieces and then putting them together in the Simba, Chimane, Yura, Trinitario, and Spanish languages.

We are also praying for our daughter, Talitha, who is heading out on another mission's trip in February. She is joining the same organization (Azmera) as well as a few of the same ladies from her trip to Cambodia. Her goal is to help bring restoration, encouragement, and a sense of healing through massage to the ladies from and working in Uganda who will be attending the Haven Retreat which is hosted by Azmera.
