

Look Up and Live!

WELCOME to *your* faith community! We are happy to worship with you today and pray that your spirit will be blessed by our time together in the presence of God. If this is your first time at Zion, welcome! If you have been with us for some time, welcome!

Today, our Lenten worship series brings us to the scriptural theme of salvation. Salvation belongs to our God! but what is salvation, and what does it entail? In our scripture lessons today, we read about Moses and the bronze snake. Within these scriptures we find God teaching us about faith, and Jesus predicting his death while speaking of the doorway that it opened for all of us. It is totally illogical to think that looking at a bronze image could heal anyone from snakebite, but that is exactly what God told them to do. It took an act of faith in God's plan for anyone to be healed, and the serpent on the stick was a reminder of their sin which brought about their suffering. Jesus tells us that this bronze serpent was a foreshadowing of him: a symbol of sin and judgment, lifted up from the earth and placed on a tree (Galatians 3:13). Just as the Israelites had to look to the upraised symbol in the wilderness for God's healing, we look to the upraised Jesus, cursed and lifted upon the cross, for our salvation. In both scenarios those involved must look up and believe. Underneath it all, the lesson we find, is a call to commitment. That is what "Look Up and Live" means. "Look up" calls us to move out of ourselves and to allow someone else to take the lead, to take the center of our beings. "Look up" means see the hope for our own life and the lives of those we love and indeed the whole world not in ourselves, but in the person of Jesus Christ and his redeeming grace. The guestion we are left with is how will we live out this commitment of salvation? Will we be witnesses to the power of a reclaimed life, of renewed starts, of healed relationships and healed bodies? Will we embrace and share this gift of salvation, committing to act, spreading hope and love to all people without judgment as we are commissioned to do?

Let us Repair: For Such a Time as This! Come, let us worship the God of Salvation, forgiveness, and grace.

Hebrew Lesson

Numbers 21:4-9 (NRSV)

⁴ From Mount Hor they set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. ⁵ The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." ⁶ Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷ The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. ⁸ And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." ⁹ So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

¹⁴ And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵ that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. ¹⁶ "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. ¹⁷ "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸ Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹ And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰ For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. ²¹ But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

Saint Patrick's Day Blessings

According to television and the internet, St. Patrick's Day was made for the 21-and-over crowd and is best celebrated by dropping green food coloring into everything you eat and drink. St. Patrick's Day started as a religious celebration in the 17th century to commemorate the life of the 5th century man known as Patrick. Patrick dedicated his life to helping bring Christianity to Ireland, earning him the position of Ireland's patron saint even though he has never been canonized by the Roman Catholic church. Also known as "Feast Day," it always took place on the anniversary of Patrick's death. In the early 18th century, Irish immigrants brought the tradition over to the American colonies, and it was here that Saint Patrick started to become the symbol of Irish heritage and culture that he is today. St. Patrick was a brave man who returned to Ireland, where he had been kept as a slave, to help convert the people of Ireland to Christianity from paganism. He lived with constant danger to his life. Legend has it he drove away the snakes of Ireland and used the shamrock to explain the Holy Trinity. Saint Patrick's Day is a celebration of overcoming all the ways that evil has tried to take us down and praying for even the people who seek to hurt us.

This year consider making St. Patrick's Day about the dedication of the icon behind the day and the faith he worked so hard to share, not just about leprechauns and rainbows. Enjoy one of these activities together as a family (or just yourself) and discuss/contemplate the Holy Trinity:
