

stunned multitude heard the Savior of the world wail over Jerusalem! We must fix this picture in our eyes and hearts, for it will do us great good. This was a new kind of king.3

These events issue a call for decision anew in each generation.

The various reactions to Jesus in this passage reflect the range of responses to the question of who Jesus is. The two most prominent responses come from the disciples and the Jewish leadership—views that cannot be more opposed. ⁴

- 1. The disciples regard Jesus as the Promised King through whom God has been working with great power, as evidenced by the miracles. In him is peace and glory, the presence of the gracious authority from heaven.
- 2. The leadership, on the other hand, sees the claims as exaggerated, even as something Jesus should not accept (v. 39). The whole narrative structure of the passage challenges us to ask ourselves where we place Jesus: Is he the humble king of peace and glory or not?⁵

Is Your life Marked by the King?

Christ, the new kind of king, shows us how to live. The King came riding a lowly donkey. Therefore, "Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped" (Philippians 2:5, 6). He came loving our fragmented world, and he wept over it. Those who want to reign in this life will do the same. We celebrate a new kind of king. Because of him we can live a new kind of life!

Jesus was unequivocally identifying himself as the Messiah. The choice of the donkey revealed his life and ministry in two ways.

First, it identified him with kings in the royal line of David, and especially with David himself, because the donkey was regarded as a royal animal before and during David's reign. After David, the Hebrew kings and warriors switched to horses, and the donkey was considered unsuited to the dignity of kings.² But Jesus' identification with the emblem and with the specific prophecy was exact and perfectly revelatory of his position.

Secondly, the use of a donkey speaks of Jesus' inner spirit. As Zechariah (who lived long after David) said, Jesus was "gentle and riding on a donkey." This was Christ's intrinsic attitude in life. As Paul wrote to the Philippians, "Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped" (Philippians 2:5, 6).

The King's March

Jesus was the center of attention! All eyes were focused on him. All homage was given to him. Not only did the exuberant followers place their clothing on the donkey as a saddle—they flung their garments to the ground as a gesture of reverence and indicating their willingness for him to take everything they had.

Our Lord was in control, and he was making a statement. The donkey he rode prophesied of his position as King and his character as servant—a burden-bearer. The Hallel Psalm repeated on the people's lips, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord," recalled his messianic character. This was his moment—a moment set before the foundations of the world.

The Tears of a King

With the panorama of Jerusalem before his eyes, the Savior began to weep—not with quiet tears as when he wept at the grave of Lazarus, whom he was going to resurrect, but with loud and deep lamentation. There in the middle of the road, with the great city in full view, the

A King Like No Other

Luke 19:28-44 (ESV)

And when he had said these things, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. ²⁹When he drew near to Bethphage and Bethany, at the mount that is called Olivet, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰ saying, "Go into the village in front of you, where on entering you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever yet sat. Untie it and bring it here. ³¹If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' you shall say this: 'The Lord has need of it.' "32So those who were sent went away and found it just as he had told them. ³³And as they were untying the colt, its owners said to them, "Why are you untying the colt?" ³⁴And they said, "The Lord has need of it." ³⁵And they brought it to Jesus, and throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶And as he rode along, they spread their cloaks on the road. ³⁷As he was drawing near—already on the way down the Mount of Olives—the whole multitude of his disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works that they had seen, ³⁸saying, "Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!" ³⁹And some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples." ⁴⁰He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the very stones would cry out." ⁴¹And when he drew near and saw the city, he wept over it, ⁴²saying, "Would that you, even you, had known on this day the things that make for peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. ⁴³For the days will come upon you, when your enemies will set up a barricade around you and surround you and hem you in on every side ⁴⁴and tear you down to the ground, you and your children within you. And they will not leave one stone upon another in you, because you did not know the time of your visitation."

A complex event

The contrast between Jesus' entrance and that of Roman leaders is culturally obvious. In sum, Jesus' entry is a major statement about God's plan and the nature of his kingship. It is a message some rejoice in, others do not understand, and still others emphatically reject.¹

How one views these events determines how one relates to God's plan.
