As a child, I remember Memorial Day as a much bigger deal than it is, to-day. Of course we were only about a decade past the most devastating war in history. Cemeteries were full of fresh military sacrifices. It seems we've left respect and reverence for our military dead in the dust of these burial plots. In those days an annual visit to the local cemetery was a must. Now, we only go for funerals. I doubt that these days very many people have honored their family dead with a visit, at all. What a shame...

For us, it was a day for our family and friends to gather for a festive meal. Usually, two old doors draped with table clothes, on old saw horses presented the plethora of food. Ham, fried chicken, mashed potatoes, several vegetable dishes and home-made desserts of all kinds were on the menu. You sat where ever you could find a place. For kids that meant "on the ground." Yard games for the kids and smoking, gab and old family stories for the adults, filled the early afternoon. Then...

We would travel to the cemetery and decorate the graves. Flowers, flags and wreaths were for sale at the cemeteries. My dad was a naval veteran who knew many men who didn't return. I was nicknamed Danny, after one of them. Later as a veteran myself, I better understood the sacrifice these men made. It seems that they are like many things in our culture, today... "Use it up and throw it away. Never look back!" As I grow older, I look back at my service years and realize how young most of us really were. Combat is not like the popular video games and movies that glorify battle, today. It is a bloody, brutal business that real men and women endure and if they are lucky, survive. It is a horrifying experience to watch someone fall, next to you... to listen to their last breath... to watch their soul leave their broken bodies. Their blood, again and again pays for our lifestyles. Let us never forget that. Let us raise a prayer of thanks giving for their selfless sacrifice. They gave their all, for so many who seem to care far too little. I pray that at least once a year, we can take the few moments it takes to say a very humble thank you... and ask God's blessing upon them. They, like Him gave the ultimate sacrifice for US.

And then there are those extra events that we want to enjoy like the Kentucky Derby, Star Wars day (May the 4th be with you), Cinco de Mayo, the National Day of Prayer, and the cookouts and campouts that coincide with the unofficial start of summer on Memorial Day. We want to get outside to go on walks, rides, climbs, picnics, and take weekend getaways. But that's not all, there are also all those chores around the house that we have to do in order to get our yards back in shape.

There is so much to do and so little time. We will probably end up with a compromised calendar. One that will keep everyone, including ourselves, happy. One that is the result of carefully picking and choosing what we can do, and what we will have to skip, while trying to maintain some semblance of sanity. By the end of the month we'll be so worn out that we'll be more than ready for a summer vacation.

And God help us if something unexpected prevents us from doing those things we scheduled to do; like catching a cold, or having car problems, or the toilet starts overflowing. We would normally handle these sorts of things with ease, but under the pressure of a full calendar, they might become the proverbial straw that breaks the camel's back.

We might, at such a time, find ourselves crying out for help. "Venez m'aider" is French for "Come help me." The last word (pronounced "May-day") spoken three times in a row is an internationally recognized distress signal. It is what pilots say when the unexpected happens and their plane is going down: "Help me, Help me, Help me."

Martha was overwhelmed with all the preparations of hosting the disciples. Recognizing that there was no way for her to get it all done by herself, she asked Jesus, "Tell her (pointing to Mary) to help me." As far as Martha could tell, Mary wasn't doing anything but sitting around talking. Martha thought that Mary should be helping her instead.

We often feel that way when looking at the people around us when we are overwhelmed. We might wonder why they aren't helping us. We might think that it should be obvious to them that we are in distress, and we need their help. It might appear to us that they're just sitting around doing nothing, when they are actually "sitting at Jesus' feet." We might even ask Jesus to light a fire under them. And if we do, we might be given the same answer that Jesus gave Martha. He said to her, "You are worried and bothered about many things, but only one thing is necessary, and Mary has chosen it." Priorities, priorities, priorities. Our month will go much smoother if we keep our priorities straight. In the midst of all the things we put on our schedules, we dare not let them push off of our schedule those things that keep us at Jesus' feet: prayer, study, and worship. And we dare not let our mixed-up priorities force others to leave Jesus' feet. Of course, there is also a time to immediately respond to a cry for help, and we need to recognize when we need to response that way too.




Let's be Intentional!



From the Elders: The Family of God

I'm so glad I'm a part, of the family of God
I've been washed in the fountain, Cleansed by His blood
Joint heirs with Jesus, as we travel this sod
For I'm part of the family, the Family of God



For those of you that are not familiar with that song, it is one that we often sing when we have a baptism. Similar to baptism, it is a song that is an "outward expression of an inward reality," one that we sing joyfully as we welcome a new member to the Body of Christ, or sometimes when we just need to be reminded that we are one big family, in Him!

The members of the church are often referred to by names we use in a family: child, sister, brother, mother, father, younger woman, younger man, older woman, older man. Each of us may be one or more of these, and we are expected to function as such in God's family. For example, John 1:12 tells us, "but as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God...". If you are a child of God, that means that you have a position and a purpose in the family of God! Our gifts, abilities, and talents are all designed to benefit the church. These are all given to us by God through the Holy Spirit, for the express purpose that we would "..grow up in all aspects into Him who is the head, even Christ." (Ephesians 4:15).

The apostle Paul states it like this in Romans 12:1: "Therefore I urge you, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship." What is your spiritual service of worship? As a member of God's family, you are uniquely designed to be a part of God's plan in how He reveals Himself to the world.

Here are three well known word pictures that God uses to describe His church: the *Body of Christ* - focused on personal / individual relationship with Christ (*cf* Eph 4:13 - 14a), the *Brotherhood of believers* - family focused, personal relationship with the others in the family of God (*cf* 1 Peter 2:17), and the *Bride of Christ* - externally focused, what the world sees and eventually what the church becomes when perfected (*cf* Revelation 19:7). All of these describe the church, and what it is meant to be.

If you would like more information on how our particular body accomplishes being our part of Christ's body here in Los Alamos, please take time to look at our church website: www.lachristian.org, under ABOUT US, MISSION and VISION. You will find a set of slides that provides a short overview on how we are organized and the areas that are available for you to take part in.

It is interesting to note that God did not prescribe a form for the church, only functions for those that make up the church. The only picture that we can draw regarding the form is that there is a head and a body. Ephesians 1:22 is very clear that it is the Lord Jesus Christ that is the head of the church, the rest of us make up the body (cf 1 Corinthians 12:122). We will take a look at the parts of the body in next month's edition of the Holy Post.
