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Eastertide Greetings!

I do not think it's an overstatement to say that The Great Fifty Days of Easter in 2021 are filled with the promise of new life. Here at Saint John's, every day contains more evidence that God is with us, helping us to bring the breath of life into aspects of our parish work that have laid fallow during the pandemic; helping us by energizing the faithful for worship, discipleship, and service. The parents of our baptismal candidates have already approached the glorious day of their children's baptisms with remarkable zeal!

I pray that their excitement would become part of our own, beloved. In the months to come, I believe that Saint John's ministry will be marked by renewal and refreshment. Just as the rush of the Holy Spirit's move inaugurated the mission of the Earliest Church at the first Pentecost, let us await the same Spirit to revive what has laid dormant, draw together relationships that have been distant, and empower us as Christ's people to extend his Kingdom!



Evensong Update - This choral 5:30 p.m. Sunday service is now in person (with reservations) as well as online!

The Day of Pentecost - Sunday, May 23 Organ Recital by Adam Pajan at 5 p.m. Choral Evensong at 5:30 p.m.

We will observe Pentecost with a Festive Choral Evensong, which will be preceded by an Organ Recital. For the recital, Adam Paign will perform the variations on the Gregorian hymn Veni Creator Spiritus (Come, Creator Spirit) by Nicolas de Griany (1672-1703). Before each of the four variations, the men of the choir will sing four of the original Gregorian Chant

The words of the hymn Veni Creator Spiritus are usually attributed to Rabanus Maurus (c. 780-856), a monk and theologian who became an Archbishop in the Roman Church. Veni Creator Spiritus is traditionally sung on Pentecost as well as at ordinations and other major Episcopal liturgies.

Family & Youth News

It has been quite a year since we all last saw each other (inperson, that is), but as we are expanding in-person worship I very much enjoy seeing more and more of our families.

Positive updates and changes are now possible as we move our youth and family ministries forward. I will resume overseeing the Nursery, continue Family Fridgys, plan Summer Kids Formation and plan Adult Education.

Last month we offered a Zoom conversation with Father David and myself to discuss the go-forward vision of family ministry at Saint John's. Thanks to those who attended. Some of the topics we discussed in the virtual meeting, or descisions we concluded after, are as follows:

Families and Little Ones

- Most traditional programs will still be on hold until the fall.
- We plan to re-start our nursery no later than June.
- · We will still continue Family Friday videos, but instead of exploring the building we will switch to small, bite-sized topics about Christianity. Some of these videos will have activities, while others will consist of vlogs.

If you know anyone who loves to be around kids ages four and under and who is willing to work on Sundays, we would love to meet them! Let them know to contact me and we will see if they will be a fit for our nursery!

Summer Kids Formation

- · Summer Kids Formation is just our fancy title for outdoors Children's Chapel.
- With several restrictions lifting, we are more able to adjust to a slightly more normal children's program.
- This means we will ask that kids attending during Sunday service leave with me or our volunteer teacher during the sequence hymn. We'll go to the labyrinth to talk about the Gospel and play a game. Concluding, we will follow an acolyte back inside the church for the Peace.
- Of course, masks are currently still necessary for those over six years old.

We are asking for volunteers to work with myself and the kids so that we can make Children's Chapel the most exciting it has ever been! Give me a shout if you are interested!

Adult Formation

We will finish the adult education course, Exploring the Bible, on Mother's Day, May 9. After this, we will go on a two-week hiatus from all adult education. Beginning June 6, Father David will lead a class on Early Church History. We will continue to use the same Zoom link that we used for our Exploring the Bible series, and we will make sure class details go out in the e-news editions when we are having a class.

Most Holy of Mothers Remembering Mary Through Symbolism

Lilies, a crown, hearts, the pear and mystic roses...these are all symbols found in Marian art and architecture. Honoring Mary, the mother of Jesus, through symbolism in buildings, furnishings, windows and weaving has been noted throughout the history of the Christian church.

In medieval devotional verse, the Virgin Mary was sometimes referred to as a "rose without thorns." The five petals of the wild rose have been equated with the five "joys" of Mary. The five key Scriptural moments that gave Mary joy include: the Annunciation, the Nativity, the Resurrection, the Ascension and the Assumption. And, the significance of the number five has also been noted by writers due to the lettercount of letters in her full name, Maria (or in Greek, Mapia).

From the 12th century, rose imagery grew across Europe with the spread of religious devotion to Mary. Laden with the symbolism of love and sacrifice, the medieval rose became such a strong idea in architecture that it appears in the building of original Gothic and contemporary Christian churches in the form the of "rose windows."

Roses and lilies are not the only botanicals with ties to Marian patronage. The pansy is called the Trinity Flower, because of its three-petaled shape. And likewise, the Irish shamrock (can you find this in our narthex?) represents the Trinity, noted to have been first revealed to Mary. Ivy and periwinkle (sometimes called the Virgin flower) are also attributed to Our Lady, as are the almond and the pear (possibly referencing her womb).

Shapes associated with the Holy Mother are the crown (for Heaven's Queen), heart, star (Mary is sometimes called the Star of the Sea), and the fleur-de-lis. The latter is said to represent her because it resembles both the iris and the Madonna or Sword Lily (again, the triplet shape).

Blue is the color most closely associated with Mary (though pink and white are also notable). Traditionally she is depicted in the royal to cerulean shades of the hue in art and interior design elements.

Here at Saint John's Church, many of these iconic references to Mary can be found, from the finials on the memorial garden's iron spires and the tops of the Bishop's seat (called the cathedra) to the roses carved into our baldacchino (which hangs over the altar). Tiny touches associated with Jesus's mother can be seen in our paschal candle, in shapes and flora designed into our needlepoint kneelers and windows, and abundantly in our altar frontal or pulpit antependium.

Perhaps the most obvious homage to Mary, in addition to her many personage depictions in our magnificent stained glass windows, is the use of Marian blue throughout our church. Our ceiling panels, the pipes of the Schoenstein organ, our windows, as well as our sanctuary and chancel rugs and runners reflect the heavens, the seas, and Mary, the Mother of God.

Hail Mary, full of grace, the LORD is with thee;
Blessed art thou among women,
and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus.
Holy, Mary, Mother of God,
pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death.

Supporting New Hope's Camps for Children of Prisoners

Happy Mother's Day! As you honor the mothers in your life, please join us in remembering and praying for children with a mother behind bars. With more moms incarcerated in Oklahoma than anywhere in the nation, parental incarceration is truly an Oklahoma issue - one we can work together to mitigate and change!

NEW HOPE'S HISTORY

New Hope Oklahoma was founded in 1992 when Episcopalians visiting Oklahoma prisons realized the number one concern of the incarcerated was the children they left behind. A small group of volunteers then held a single summer camp serving six children with an incarcerated parent, and the number of camps and children served grew each following summer. In 2003, New Hope expanded to after-school programming in order to serve more children and maintain positive relationships throughout the school year. In 2007, New Hope became an official 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization. Over the past 28 years, New Hope has grown to serve over 600 children annually through after-school programs, case management, summer camps, and family events!

MISSION


To provide academic, social, and emotional support to youth impacted by parental incarceration through out of school time programs.

VISION

To interrupt the cycle of generational incarceration, one child at a time.

SUMMER 2021

Throughout the year New Hope provides participants access to safe, nurturing, and consistent out of school programs (tutoring, social and emotional learning activities, sports, arts, archery, fishing, and more!) that build self-efficacy, reduce risky behaviors, and increase physical, social, and emotional health. This June to safeguard against Covid-19, New Hope will host a series of full-day day camps in the Tulsa area. New Hope will then work alongside Tulsa Public School's summer programming in July.

Getting to Know Lay Reader Sharon Bell

Recently, Sharon Bell was gracious enough to correspond via email with us from her "get-away" spot in Florida. We hope you enjoy learning a bit more about Sharon as much as our staff did in this Q&A!

Q: When did Saint John's become a regular part of your adult life? A: I started attending when I moved to Tulsa to enter TU Law School in 1982. Greg started in 1984 and we were married here in 1985.

Q: We heard you are back in school. What are you studying? A: I started at Phillips Theological Seminary last year working on a Master's in Theological Studies. I had a lot of questions left over after an Education for Ministry course a few years ago.

Q: Are you still working also? A: I am a semi-retired attorney and had a practice focused on estate planning and probate. For thirty years, I was the Individual Trustee of the Chapman-Walter-Cowles Trusts. I also worked with eighteen charitable beneficiaries in a three-state region.

Q: Who do you most admire? A: My heroes are my late father, William H. Bell, and my mom, Rita Bell (who will be 91 in May and can still take names!); the late Henry Zarrow, who with my father taught me so much about philanthropy; the late Justice Ruth Ginsburg (I had the privilege of hearing her speak once); and the late Malcolm Deisenroth, who was a living example of service to the church. Also my husband, Greg Gray, who sometimes talks me off cliffs and sometimes talks sense into my thick head.

Q: What are you currently reading? A: In addition to books for school, I am reading "Clanlands: Whiskey, Warfare and a Scottish Adventure like no Other" by Sam Heughan and Graham McTavish. (Sam plays Jaime Frasier in TV's "Outlander" and Graham plays the war leader for Clan McDonald.) They now tour the Scottish Highlands in a sleeper van for a show called Men in Kilts.

Q: Sounds like you rode out part of quarantine time near the sea. How so? A: We have a beach house in Mexico Beach, Florida, on the Forgotten Coast of the Panhandle. Mexico Beach was flattened two and a half years ago by Hurricane Michael. Fortunately we are about three-quarters of a mile from Highway 98, because everything between the beach and that highway was washed out to sea. We had some water in the house but had everything put back together just in time for COVID.

Q: You are quite the canner. Do you grow your own veggies? A: Last year we had two raised garden spots and this year we have four. Greg has always planted peppers (mostly chilies) in pots. Now I have a sunny spot for tomatoes, cukes and anything else he is inspired to plant. I make pickles, jams, pepper jelly and salsas, chutneys, and canned tomatoes.

Q: Do you have any advice for others during these challenging times? A: My mom has a saying: "All you can do is all you can do, and all you can do is enough."







Looking for a group to get you outside and walking more often? Maybe you already stroll or hike near your home or on the trails, but would like a new route or buddies to connect with. If so, beginning May 11, Tuesday Trekkers might be a good fit for your lifestyle.

We'll be a "no reservation needed, come as you are, low commitment, bring a friend, family member (or your dog), no cost, leave the politics and gossip behind" sort of gang you can count on.

This merry band of trekkers will take off each Tuesday evening at 5:35 sharp from the Saint John's labyrinth for a "figure eight" walk through our wonderful nearby neighborhoods. Think you only have time or energy for a shorter jaunt? Cool. Trek with us for the first or last 30-minute loop. Love to walk and talk longer? Great, lace up and stay with us for the full double loop (two distinct half-hour routes). We'll conclude at the church about 6:40 p.m.

Dress for the weather, bring a water bottle, be ready to start at 5:35 p.m. (so please arrive 5-10 minutes earlier), and enjoy midtown with new and old friends. There are no age limits, but you need to have good mobility and energy to get the most out of the trek and stay with the group. We request that if kids come along, they can walk the distance or you bring a stroller. No kids on bikes or difficult doggies, please.

Outreach: Edison Middle and High School

This spring, Father David has connected with the faculty liaison for the student leadership cohort at Edison Preparatory School, a community of approximately 1,600 students, 120 teachers and 20 staff members. In a recent meeting with faculty member Susan Griffin, our Rector learned some of the ways the Saint John's parish and people can re-connect with the school.

One of the outreach opportunities right away for parishioners is to sponsor a ticket for a senior to attend the Class of 2021 Senior Breakfast to be held later this month. Due to the pandemic, the senior class has been unable to host the numerous fundraisers they would traditionally hold. Because of that, they are working in other ways to provide wonderful graduation activities for all the seniors, with very limited funding. Senior Breakfast tickets are \$15 per student. If you would like to contribute to one or several tickets to help make the event accessible to all members of the Class of 2021, regardless of their ability to pay, simply email Mary Waller and she will send you back a copy of the donation letter with instructions on how to easily help. Father David has already underwritten five tickets!

We also facilitated other small but meaningful demonstrations of support. Recently, our church provided a few much-needed simple supplies to the school nurse's office. And, in April, Father David delivered donuts to the teachers on two "in service" work days, with notes to express appreciation for all they do. Josh Corsaro will be sharing teacher treats two more dates before the end of the semester. We give thanks to Krispy Kreme Donuts and Reasor's Grocery for their generosity in supporting this gesture of neighborly love.

And, in early May Father David and Josh will attend an Edison student leadership meeting for a lunch and listening session. Our Youth Ministry leaders are very excited to meet these young leaders and learn more about their perspectives on our community's needs and potential collaborations. Eagles helping eagles...that's something exciting to think about!

With in-person services expanding, the church is resuming the opportunities for youth to again serve Saint John's in the important role of acolyte.
